

and in the account of each seat. The postage on the paid, new papers and pamphlets is to be placed at the foot of each account of new paper and pamphlets received.

§ 15. The post-office is to arrange that they will have to make up but one mail for all letters and papers addressed to other offices. Separate each parcel of letters into such as are to be packed and sent. Separate each of the letters into such as single, double, triple, quadruple, &c., enter their number and amounts in that order, under the proper heading in the post bill to be sent with the mail, having written the post office at the top of the bill, and the amount. Having completed the post bill, enter in a separate column the amount of money to be sent with the bill, and the office to which the mail is sent.

§ 16. You are always to be remembered in your accounts for a certain number of days, and the mail when it arrives, to send the post bill at all possible intervals.

§ 17. When you open the mail, you are to leave separate sets of letters of new paper, &c., in a separate place, and to send the same to the proper authorities.

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and be answered, in any court of law or equity in Oregon; and when any suit shall be commenced against said corporation, the first process shall be a summons, a certified copy of which shall be left with the Recorder of its absence, with the Mayor, at least ten days previous to the return day thereof.

§ 5. That the Mayor, Recorder, and Trustees, or a majority thereof, of whom the Mayor or the Recorder shall always be one, shall have authority to make, amend, and publish all by-laws and ordinances, not inconsistent with the laws of Oregon, as they shall deem necessary and proper for the promotion of morality, as well as for the good regulation, interest, safety, health, cleanliness and convenience of said Oregon City and the citizens thereof; they shall have power to fill vacancies that may happen by death or otherwise in any of the offices herein named; they shall also have power to appoint a Treasurer, Marshal, and such subordinate officers as they may deem necessary to perform their duties, and require security for their faithful discharge, to remove them at pleasure, and to substitute in the room of all officers in the corporation, not established by this act; they shall have power to impose fines for the breach of their ordinances, but no fine shall be imposed on any one person, for any breach of any one ordinance, of more than ten dollars, which fine may be recovered with costs in suit before a justice of the peace, by action of debt, in the name of the corporation. All fines collected in pursuance of this act, shall, by the officer collecting the same, be paid over to the Treasurer of the corporation.

§ 6. It shall be the duty of the Recorder to keep true record of the by-laws and ordinances, and of the proceedings of the Council, which record shall be accessible to all persons for the inspection of the citizens of said City; and the Recorder shall preside at all meetings in the absence of the Mayor.

§ 7. That the City Council shall have power to assess and collect taxes for purposes of municipal government, and to lay out streets, and to erect public buildings, and to do all other things which may be necessary for the good government of said City; and they shall have power to grant and collect licenses, assessments, and other taxes, and to do all other things which may be necessary for the good government of said City.

§ 8. The City Marshal shall be the chief officer of the City, and shall have power to execute all process issued by the City Council, and to keep the peace, and to do all other things which may be necessary for the good government of said City; and he shall have power to appoint and remove all subordinate officers, and to do all other things which may be necessary for the good government of said City.

§ 9. That the City Council shall have power to regulate and improve all streets, alleys, side ways, drains, and sewers, to make and keep in repair public wells, cisterns, and regulate markets; to grant licenses within the limits of said corporation, and to appropriate the proceeds of such licenses for the benefit of the City; they shall have power to fence and regulate, or prohibit, all snow and public exhibitions. Provided, however, That the power hereby granted shall not be so construed as to conflict with general laws now in force regulating the same.

§ 10. That every corporation shall have power to establish and organize a town government; to procure engines, ladders, hooks, and other implements for use in the arrest and extinguishment of fires.

§ 11. That the by-laws and ordinances of said corporation shall be posted up in some public place in said City, fifteen days before the taking effect thereof, and the certificate of the Recorder upon the City records shall be sufficient evidence of the same having been done; and every annual election herein authorized, shall be preceded by five days' notice thereof, put up in three public places in said City.

§ 12. That the Mayor, or a majority of the Council, may call a meeting of the City Council whenever in his or their opinion the same may be necessary. The Mayor and Trustees shall receive no compensation, unless the same shall be authorized by the inhabitants in legal meeting assembled.

§ 13. Any future Legislature may alter, amend, or repeal this act.

CITY ORDINANCE

ORIGON CITY CORPORATION
