OREGON CITY, MAY 15, 1847.

In pursuance to adjournment the citizens of Clackamas county met at the City Hall in Oregon City, for the purpose of nominating three candidates for Representatives, three Justices of the Peace and one Assessor.

Mr. Parker in the chair (who from indisposition was excused,) and Capt. W. K. Kilborn chosen as Chairman and J. S. Rhinearson, Secretary.

On motion of D. Hanon, a committee of five were appointed, consisting of Messrs. Hudson, White, Hedges, Price and Comfort, for the purpose of placing before the convention names as candidates for Representatives, which committee retired and in a short time returned reporting for the consideration of the convention the names of John Fleming, J. S. Rhinearson and Mr. McSwain.

On motion, the names of each candidate was considered separately and accepted by the convention.

On motion, the House nominated Col. McCune, A. Cornelius and M. Crawford, as candidates for Justices of the Peace.

And a further motion was made to nominate a candidate for Assessor, which resulted in the nomination of E. S. Comfort.

On motion, the convention then adjourned.

We hope it will be remembered that the people south of the Santiam deserve to be profitably represented the ensuing year, therefore, they are willing to confide in the persons they have chosen.

On motion, it was ordered that the proceedings of the meeting be handed to the Editor of the Spectator, with a request that they be published.
