

turn to it, are acts which have brought upon herself the suspending of her rations and we cannot see in what way Major H. can be either legally or morally responsible for the consequences resulting to the soldier's family. Looking at this whole matter, then, divested of all else save justice and impartial candor, we do not regard it as furnishing means for the relief sought, nor as a case of misfortune. And we can view it in no other light than that of a contract for honorable service, with a government of his own choice, made in a part of the United States where the rewards of labor are smaller than in Oregon, and now sought to be avoided after getting subsistence and transportation at the public expense to a distant Territory, where, from causes unlooked for at the time of enlistment, wages are greater, and labor is in high demand. Such conditions, based upon such grounds, can never receive favor from tribunals whose duty demands that their decisions shall be regulated by principles of rational policy and the encouragement of honesty and faithfulness in public no less than private engagements. The Complainant is, therefore, ordered to be remanded into the custody of the Respondent.

State Government.

We find the opinion that Oregon should be immediately erected into a State much more prevalent than we had anticipated. And as the approaching meeting of the Legislative Assembly will afford an excellent opportunity for mentioning the subject we will say a few words in relation to it. In this connection we will refer to the fact that we rarely see Oregon mentioned in the papers except from the States, while California, Texas and New Mexico engross a very considerable portion of the entire public press. None of these Territories are so much as advertised in Oregon papers of substantial interest, and fixed population, while in point of natural advantages we are equal to the best of them.

There can be no other reason for this difference of attention than that the others are strenuously urging their claims for admission into the Union as independent States, while we are supposed to be resting upon our laurels. It would be but speedy advancement in population and a vigorous movement we should make an efficient effort to rally the waning interest of the people in our behalf.

We have already evidence of the great interest one person willing as the representative of our Territory in a Congress can command. And we are a strong advocate of the advancement of so much, what an accumulation of good would be effected by the presence in Congress of two more of our most talented and influential citizens. But there is another thought connected with this view of the subject. Our Territory is destitute of the salutary influence of a State. He is better than a body member. It is in the representative of a State his presence there would be much more distinctly felt. Having the right to vote on all questions, he would be sought by the friends of particular measures for his aid in behalf of their wishes. This state of things would greatly strengthen him. But there is still another thought on this point. It might so often that our Delegates might neglect or unduly present a great interest of the Territory. In this case, two Senators there could supply the deficiency at correct the error.

But situated as we are, remote from the General Government, it is all important that the people should have the choice of their own officers, both executive and judicial. This, indeed, is one of the most distinguished features in our form of civil government. So widely different is the state of society in the present case, from that in the other side of the continent, that no government, if matters not long since, while removed to the distance of Washington, can merit the respect and study the demands of a people circumscribed as ours.

We have heard but two objections, and they are not so much objections as difficulties. The first has reference to the expense of sustaining a State Government. It is apprehended that our taxes would be increased to an enormous extent, but if any one will carefully consider the subject, he will readily perceive that the occasion for additional taxes, are, really, very few. As a general fact, the taxes levied upon a Territory by the State government, is scarcely sufficient to support the great national interests, and to maintain the courts and the military.

The other difficulty that we have referred to, relates to the matter of population. It is thought that a certain amount of population is requisite to sustain a State Government. It is true, as we have seen, that the population of Oregon is not yet sufficient to sustain a State Government, but it is not necessary that it should be so at once.

crease the number of its representatives without a compliance with the ratio of representation. But this provision does not apply to the admission of a new State.

In a word, the longer we contemplate the subject, the more firmly are we persuaded that now is the time for us to make a stride. The elements of rapid progress, and of future greatness are accumulating; and the influx of population during the coming season, will be such as to require the most efficient system of civil government.

The Coast Survey of Oregon.

The following extract from a letter addressed by the Hon. S. R. Thurston to Gen. A. L. Lovejoy, reveals one feature in the system of neglect, which Oregon has hitherto enjoyed. All we know on the subject is that the marine party were enjoying themselves at the Sandwich Islands at the latest date. As for the land party, it has most probably expatriated at the head of the Rio Sacramento.

In the estimates of additional appropriations required for the service of the fiscal year ending June 30, 1850, and the fiscal year ending June 30, 1851, laid on our tables this morning, I find the following in a letter from A. D. Bache, Sup. U. S. Coast Survey, to the Secretary of the Treasury, to wit:

"Instruction for commencing sect. 10th, the coast of Oregon, were given by the Treasury Department, in July, 1848, and in the course of the summer a land and Hydrographic party were organized to proceed to Oregon. The land party is complete within itself for all the operations of the survey. The very unexpected change in the relation of the western coast, has, of course, interfered materially with the usefulness, and added greatly to the expense of the party. At the last advice however, the schooner *Unadilla* had arrived at San Francisco, having passed through the Straights of Magellan, under the command of Lieut. Washington A. Babbitt, Lieut. Comdr. M. Arthur, U. S. N., the chief of the Hydrographic party had also after many delays and difficulties, not to say dangers, reached the same point. And, thus Assistant Jas. S. Walker and Joseph H. Bull, and William Humphreys, Esq., were furnished with the means of transportation, which had been entirely wanting before, to reach the coast of Oregon. I have no doubt, should our rigging prove adequate, to be able to give a good account of these parties."

The above letter bears date Nov. 1849. How it happens that this corps, being sent to Oregon, one part by land and the other by water, should both meet at San Francisco, as if by concert, I have not been able yet to learn. It seems that we have nothing to do, under the present law, by way of improving our coast, until this corps shall have made a survey of our coast, and reported their findings, &c. The neglect, then, of this corps to do any thing, as they have, is a matter highly remarkable, and about which we have good right to complain.

Strong fears are entertained that the whole band will have perished by starvation, ere they can be reached with provisions.
