

ous assaults of the savages; nor the well-known Indian character, in the deep seated treachery and revenge of their hearts, nor the demand, in certain circumstances, for the proper punishment of offences.— Yet, knowing that provocations leading to acts of savage depredations have often originated with the whites, and having reason to believe, even in those recent occurrences, remotely, this may have been the fact, we cannot refrain from an expression prompted by humanity, if not a sense of equity, of deep regrets that so summary a vengeance should have been visited upon these ignorant though depraved men. Often have we had occasion to observe, in the treatment which the Indians of California have received at the hands of individuals or small parties, a most reprehensible disregard of their value, rating them no higher than the inferior animals. We refer here to instances of cold-blooded murder of these people, by those claiming the reputation of civilized men. May such things be no more repeated, for civilization and humanity's sake, on the soil of California.

What shall be done for the preservation and welfare of the Indians of California? We cannot for one moment entertain the thought that they must be at once and entirely exterminated. We think much may be done, and with good effect, to save them, both from the vices of our nature and a violent extinction. Let the suggestions made by the Presbytery of California, at its sessions in Benicia, in February last, which also accord with the views and recommendations of Mr. Ewing, Secretary of the Interior, be promptly and efficiently carried out, and the results, we confidently believe, will be most happy. The plan proposed, contemplates the gathering of the aborigines into ranches, with the patronage of the general government, and under the immediate control of persons qualified to train them in the principles of Christianity and all the useful arts. But as to wholesale butchery, the universal cry of our people is, or should be, Shame, oh horror!

THE NEW YORK ARCTIC EXPEDITION.—Mr. Henry Grinnell, the gentleman who with such generous liberality has procured and is now fitting out two vessels to proceed to the polar regions in search of Sir John Franklin, has petitioned Congress that the expedition be put under naval laws for its term of service, and that a call for volunteers from among the sailors in the navy, to the number of thirty should be made, to man the two vessels, such persons to receive their pay from the government.

While the paramount object of the expedition will be to aid in the discovery and rescue of Sir John Franklin, the officers in command will be instructed to use all diligence and zeal in the exploration of the frozen regions to which they are bound, and it is earnestly hoped that they may in some degree be instrumental in solving the long disputed question of the existence of a northwest passage from the Atlantic to the Pacific.—[Boston Journal.]

CONGRESS.—The result of the State election in Connecticut, on Monday week may be briefly summed up as follows. There is no election of executive officers by the people, but the democratic candidates have a plurality; both branches of the Legislature will be decidedly democratic, securing to that party their State officers, A. U. S. Senator, in the place of Roger S. Baldwin, and the legislation of the State for the ensuing year.

RHODE ISLAND.—The election for State officers, members of the Legislature, &c., was held on Wednesday of last week. Henry B. Anthony, (whig) editor of the Providence Journal, is re-elected Governor by a majority considerably larger than that of last year. The legislature will be whig, thus securing the election of a whig to the United States Senate for the term commencing on the 4th of March next, when the time of Hon. A. C. Greene will expire.

THE SCHOOL SYSTEM OF IOWA.—The School System of Iowa, like that of most of the new States, is based upon the grant of lands, and upon the per cent. of all lands sold in the State by the government of the United States. These consist of every sixteenth section in each township, or 640 acres of the 360,000 acres granted by Congress in 1841; and of five per cent. on all sales of public lands in the State, by authority of the general government to which the Legislature of Iowa have added the property of persons dying intestate, and without heirs, and the proceeds of military exemptions and penal fines in the several counties. Such is the school fund of the State for common schools.

This is to certify that Mr. Wm. This case was submitted to a jury, not because those best acquainted with the circumstances believed the accused was guilty, but because, from the unfortunate circumstance of the two above named individuals sleeping together on the night of the murder—public opinion had become much exasperated, even to such a degree that both the honor and safety of the aforesaid Mr. Bold required a trial by jury.

This is of particular interest to our merchants, as the old channel round Tongue Point has long been one of the greatest difficulties in our river navigation.
