The ship, George Anna was chartered a few days since, by about 20 persons, citizens of this place and vicinity, and will sail about the 27th inst. We are about to open a direct trade with the Sandwich Islands; the brig Orbit, having been refitted and painted up, and will leave this port, bound thither, in a few days. Her cargo consists of fish, spars, &c., &c. She will be commanded by Maj. H. A. Goldsbrough, A. M. P.
