OBITUARY.

Died—After a short illness, in west Tualatin Plains, Feb 24, Sarah wife of Thos. G. Naylor, in her 32d year, leaving an infant son, a husband, five other children, the oldest but 14 years old, the church, relatives and numerous friends to mourn their great loss. She was born June 16th, 1821, in Cook County, State of Tennessee. She was a child of poor parents, and at the age of 15 years, herself became poor, and was led with the Union Presbyterian church, of which her parents were members. In 1843 she removed with her husband to Oregon, and finding a church of her own denomination, with her husband, united with the first Congregational church, in which she continued a devout member unto her death.

Perhaps a brief sketch of the Christian character of our departed and deeply lamented sister in Christ, may prove a blessing to some who are yet toiling between hope and fear in this vale of sorrow and will certainly gratify her more intimate friends and relatives.

Having embraced religion at an early age, she had advantage over many of her sex, who spend a precious portion of their short life not in qualifying themselves for its stern realities, but actually do, qualifying themselves, consequently she had the Spring and Summer with their general influences to purify and chasten her affections and imagination—to consolidate her growth in piety. Thus was she fitted for the duties to which she was called in providence to perform as a Christian wife and mother; and as a member of the church of Christ, with that decision and any old devotion which was in her exquisitely characteristic in every day life. As a Christian she bore the toils and privations incident to the establishment of a new country with fortitude and cheerfulness. In adversity or prosperity her countenance was calm and resolute, showing clearly an elevated state of piet. Happy in herself, she sought to make all to around her, often to the sacrifice of her almost worn out strength. As a member of the church she was firm, considerate, kind and charitable, without ostentation to perform. As she trusted in the promises and grace of God in life, she found them verified in the trying hour of death. She depressed herself herself definitely, that she trusted alone in the righteousness of Christ. The day before her death she said, "I did not know but when death came near there would be terror, but when I thought I should not live ten minutes there was no terror. Although she suffered most excruciating pain, she was so assisted by the grace of God that not a moment was spent, her faith was firm, and she passed down the steps of death supported by the rod and staff of Him who has promised to be with his people even until death. The church and community, and especially to her bereaved husband and children, the loss is incalculable but she has gained more than we can lose. It is ours to improve the solemn call, and with Christlike resignation, say, thy will O Lord, be done.—Com.
