New Land Office of Oregon Territory.

NOTICE TO SETTLERS. THE Surveyor-General of Oregon will cease to receive "Notifications" of donation claims, from and after the 1st day of December next. After such time, on and after the 1st of December, all notices of Donation claims, under the several land laws, all applications for the entry of land claims, as well as for Pre-emption rights, and the evidence of the rights of orphaned, under the last amendment of the donation law, have to be made direct to the Register and Receiver of the Oregon land district all Oregon City. All conflicts of claims, which have not been adjudicated by the Surveyor General, before the 1st of December next, will be transferred to the said Register and Receiver, in conformity with instructions from the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and in pursuance of the Act of Congress, approved July 17, 1851, amendatory of the Donation Laws.
