LOCAL AND OTHER INTELLIGENCE.

PENDLETON.

The County Seat was moved from Umatilla to this place in the Spring of 1869. At that time there were but two houses here, a hotel and dwelling; in the short period of seven years our town has grown to its present limits.

A protracted meeting under the management of Reverends Crowell, Davies and Pruett, has been going on for a couple of weeks in the Methodist Church. It will continue next week.

HORSE RACE.—We hear it rumored that a horse race, for \$250 a side, will be run at Fred Ganger's on Willow creek next Saturday. Gilchrist's racer will be one of the animals that will run.

A prominent citizen of Walla Walla was fined \$5 for carrying a concealed weapon. The expenses of the city government could be paid by such fines if all who carried arms were arrested.

Dr. Hunter, that clever gentleman and accomplished physician and surgeon, paid Pendleton a visit this week. His old friends were really happy to see him. He expressed himself highly pleased with our town.

Messrs Morse and Switzer are experimenting this season by sowing ten acres of grain on the high land, three miles north of Pendleton. If the experiment proves a success, thousands of acres will be sown next season.

The proceedings of the County Court, for the session just closed, are so long and important that the publication thereof must be deferred until next week, so that the entire doings of that body can appear in one issue of the paper.

THE OTHER SIDE.—The wind blew in a terrific manner Wednesday last in Grand Ronde valley about the same time it did here. It fairly shook the houses from their foundation at Oro Dell. An ice gorgo moved down the Grand Ronde river with irresistible force and took out the dam of Mr. Snodgrass' mill. Quite a loss.

J. B. Gerking, Birch Plat, near Weston—Cattle, half circle over G on right hip, split and under tin in left and under bit in right ear.

L. S. Carney, Bear creek; Cattle brand SC on left hip; square crop of right ear and swallow fork and under bit in the left ear. Horse same brand on the left shoulder.

George Coggan—La Grande, Oregon; Horses C on left shoulder.

J. H. Keeney—Birch creek; Cattle, J. K. connected on left hip. Horse same on left shoulder.

Joe Morrison—Weston; Cattle, B. encircled by a C on either hip. Horse, same brand on left shoulder.

C. A. Blinn—Lower Willow Creek; Cattle, B. on right hip; under bit in left ear and right ear lopped. Horse, B. on right shoulder.

A. S. Wells, Heppner; Cattle, double row lock on left side, crop of right ear and split in left ear. Horse, same brand on left shoulder.

Wm. Lee, Birch creek; Cattle, thus J. on left hip; swallow fork and under bit in left ear. Horse, the same brand on left shoulder.

A. Gillette, Bear creek; Cattle, A-G on left hip; slit in each ear. Horse, same brand on left shoulder.

R. J. Oliver, Heppner; Cattle brand, two six on right side, crop of right ear, hole in right. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

T. W. Ayers, Butter creek; Cattle brand, J. on right hip; crop of right ear. Horse, same brand on left shoulder.

J. M. Hicks, Birch creek; Cattle, three dawsaps, crop and hole in left ear. Horse, 7 on left shoulder.

G. F. Thompson, Butter creek; cattle brand O T on left side, crop of right ear and split in left. Horse O T on left shoulder.

M. Wills, Pendleton; Cattle brand, horse shoe on left hip, right ear cut off. Horse, B. O on right shoulder.

H. E. Johnson, Pilot Rock; Cattle Brand, chain lock on right hip, crop of each ear and under crop of right ear. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

Crockett & Loyd; Cattle C. L. on left side, swallow fork and under bit in each ear. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

S. L. Rogers, Weston; Cattle brand B on right hip, short crop of left ear, and under crop of left ear. Horse, B under half circle on shoulder.

W. W. Broadfield; Cattle, figure 5 under row lock on left hip; crop and split in right ear, under slope in left. Horse, B under half circle on shoulder.

E. Welch, Pendleton; Cattle brand, T in diamond on left hip, crop of right ear and slit in left. Horse, T on left shoulder.

Neil Hopper, Happy Canyon; Cattle brand, a double cross on left side, and crop and slit in right ear, and crop and under bit in left. Horses brand B on left shoulder.

S. J. Laws, Pilot Rock; Horses, L. O. on right shoulder, cattle, same on right hip, and waddle on neck.

F. Nail, Pilot Rock; Cattle, mule shoe on right hip, upper half crop in left ear. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

John Cummings, Pilot Rock; Cattle, L. U. on right side on three and four year old steers, stock cattle same on left hip.

J. L. Gullford, Butter creek; Cattle, crop of right ear and under bit in left ear, under bit in left ear, and waddle on left jaw, brand, J on left side and G on left hip. Horses, G on left shoulder.

Wm. T. Stanton, Butter creek; Cattle, T. S. on right hip, split and under bit in right ear. Horses same brand on left shoulder.

J. J. Haley, Meadows; Cattle brand, B in a circle on right hip, and crop of left ear and slit out of right, dewlap down.

J. J. Baumgartner, Umatilla; Cattle 2 on side, crop and slit in left ear. Horse same brand on thigh.

R. M. Angell; Cattle, nose split, lower part hanging down; brand seventy four united. Horses same on left thigh.

Nelson & Inghery, Butter creek; Cattle brand in shape of pistol on left hip, crop and two dits in left ear. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

H. H. Elliot, Butter creek; Cattle brand in the shape of five rings on left side, under bit in left ear and slit in right ear. Horses brand figure 2 on left shoulder.

G. H. Grant, Pilot Rock; Cattle, slit in right ear and upper and under slit in left, brand, O. L. on left hip. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

F. Ringert, Cayuse; Cattle, crop of left and under crop of right ear, brand F on right hip. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

H. A. and J. W. Salisbury, Butter creek; Cattle, crop of left ear, brand, figure 3 on right side. Horse same brand on right shoulder.

D. H. Leatherman; Cattle, upper bit in left ear; figure 2 on left hip and neck the dawsaps. Horse same brand on left shoulder.

Louis Tractor, Heppner; Cattle, swallow fork in each ear, brand, O T on left hip with the T directly over the O.

Geo. Barnard, Heppner; (Cattle in shape of Louis Tractor). Close crop of left ear, brand, H. L. J. on right hip.

Bald Bruce, Pendleton; Cattle, B on left hip. Horse same.
