IMPORTANT SALE.

On Wednesday last W. S. Byers, the original and energetic proprietor of the Pendleton Flouring mill, sold a one-half interest therein to Messrs. Livermore & Beagle, the consideration therefor being \$7,500 cash down. This mill has proved itself a grand success, and as we have heretofore remarked, contains some of the finest machinery connected with the manufacture of flour. The handling of all wheat is automatic, and it is nearly so with the flour. Mr. Byers has done well in bringing the gentlemen alluded to as his assistants in the management of the business which has grown to ponderous proportions; they have the tact, energy and necessary qualifications to increase the already large business of the establishment, and maintain the high reputation the mill has acquired. The business will be carried on under the firm name of W. S. Byers & Co. We learn from the proprietors that it is the intention to run the mill to its utmost capacity during the next one hundred days or until the close of navigation on the Columbia river. Upon promises, and by the decision of a council of relatives, the first wife was again received to the bosom and confidence of her dusky lord, and the second wife sent away lonely and alone. On the two wives meeting, the last one put away went for her more lucky sister in a masterly style, using a piece of elk horn constructed into a whip, with which she was wont to pound her cayuse charger. With this instrument of torture she punished her adversary till many a ghastly gasp was made about the unfortunate one's head. Luckily John McBlane was near by, and as soon as possible removed the maddened maiden of the forest to a safe distance from the theatre of war. At last accounts the beaten squaw was doing well and her wounds healing. If some of our Eastern scribes, who never saw a live Indian, could have seen this encounter, all the Indian romance in their minds would have been changed to an opposite feeling.
