From Weston.
NOVEMBER 5, 1877.

EDITOR E. O. - Perhaps a few items
from this section, be of interest to your readers, and more especially to those living in distant parts of the State. It is hardly necessary to say anything in regard to the crops in this section, as it is a well known fact that this country can best any country in the state according to the amount of land under cultivation.

The roads from Weston to Walla Walla
and also from Weston to Pendleton, have been lined with teams hauling wheat, for the last two months.

We are having some Webster weather
now, and wheat hauling will no doubt cease for this season. Our farmers are taking advantage of the wet weather by plowing and sowing for another crop.

Our merchants are receiving their
winter stock of goods, which they offer to sell at Walla Walla prices.

The work on our new school house is
progressing well. It will be the best house in the country, and will be a great addition to our town and neighborhood.

Several dwellings are being built,
and other improvements were it not for the scarcity of timber and shingles.

Several deaths have occurred in the
vicinity of Weston lately, mostly from diphtheria. One of Judge Waldron's sons was buried a few days since, and a little child of Mr. Wm. Killgore was buried yesterday.

The health of our citizens is generally
good, except Uncle Tom Lestallien's, his weight is reduced down to about 240, that is his fighting weight.

Mr. A. Steel and Mr. Wm. Mize are not
married yet, but the old settlers predict a hard winter, and they are making considerable inquiry in regard to the widows, and I may have a wedding or two to report in my next letter. [The above correspondent also sent us a marriage notice which will be seen in another column. - Ed.]

Eastern Washington Territory.
James Benton informs the Walla Walla Statesman, of a recent date, that he counted one day, enclosed persons heading for Colfax, Eastern W. T. that nearly all the bottom lands are taken up, but back toward the mountains there is any amount of good lands open to settlement. They have five sawmills on the Palouse, three of them operated by steam power, and yet such is the demand for lumber that the mill refuse to take new orders. Four floating saws are now in operation, and 1250 more mills will be ready for grinding in a few weeks. Immigrants now coming in have means, and many of them desire to purchase improved farms. As a rule the settlers are satisfied with their claims, and it is very rare that a man is found willing to sell. At the present rate of progress Wallman will soon be the empire county of the Territory.

Strains county. The Palouse Gazette
says this county comprises almost an empire within itself, embracing an area of 16250 square miles, or more than ten million acres of prairie and table land. The Columbia river flows through it and receives several large tributaries as it passes. Stock raising is the principal industry just now, but the time will come when this county will be as rich and populous as the State of Ohio. The yield of wheat, oats, potatoes and onions, are equal to that of any country, and from the display of the Moscow exhibition, five miles from the Falls, we are satisfied that no better apple country can be found. The country about Four Lakes is especially adapted to stock raising, and the climate is no colder than New York. The products of the St. Joe, Pen dentle and Cor. d'Alene valleys and agricultural lands, in Idaho and Montana, find their way to the Columbia via of Spokane Falls. Thousands of acres of rich, agricultural lands await settlers who will "sweep them, out those who would secure good farms should not delay too long, as good opportunities will not long last. Fort Colville is the county seat.

A CLERICAL VILLAIN - The Reverend
A. Fred Thompson, pastor of the Primitive Methodist church of Egin, Ill., was, on the 10th inst., in General Sessions, sentenced by Recorder Hackett to five years imprisonment in State prison at Sing Sing for swearing. Last spring his church granted him leave of absence to go to Europe for his health, on the return voyage he became acquainted with a fascinating lady, a Mrs. Cobham, the wife of another clergyman. Upon landing they stopped at the West Side Hotel, and she claims that he went to her trunk and robbed her of her money and jewelry. He claimed that she presented it to him, and asserted that the relations between them had been very intimate. "Do you mean to say," inquired Recorder Hackett, "that your relations with her were improper?" "Well replied the clergyman, with a leer, "we all do such things more or less." "And are you a minister of the Gospel?" "Yes," Mrs. Cobham, upon being recalled, denied the improper relations. When sentence was pronounced, the Recorder said, "stand up and be sentenced: Will, sir, a more filthy beast I never met with, and a more depraved clergyman I never saw. I am sorry I cannot give you a severer sentence than five years in the State Prison at hard labor." The Rev. Alfred Thompson snuffed grimly as he retired between two officers. - Ez

TRouble at LEANING - Lebanon had a
shooting scrape last week, but fortunately nobody was hurt. Drs. Ballard and Richardson were subsequently arrested for shooting at Dr. Foley, and upon preliminary examination before Justice Powers, Ballard was discharged and Richardson held to answer in \$500 bonds. The grand jury this week indicated Richardson for assault with a dangerous weapon upon Dr. Foley and upon arrangement Richardson pleaded guilty to simple assault and His Honor, Judge Bole, fined him \$300.

SEND THE STAMPS - When you want a
copy of a newspaper send the value of it in stamps, then you will not be disappointed. If you are a correspondent or have an advertisement in the paper, you are entitled to a complimentary copy of the paper containing it sent to your postoffice, at the time of publication; if it takes to hunt up a copy three or six months after it is published, and time costs money in a printing office, so send enough stamps to pay the publisher for the paper and time required to hunt it up. Another hint: When you write to a man for your own information and benefit, and which you are satisfied would be of no interest or benefit to him, inclose stamps to pay both postage and the value of the writing material used, and you will very likely, get the information desired. - Astorian

TWO FOOLS - A young man of twenty,
one named Boyer, lately drawn in the army conscription at Besane, in France, was in despair at the thought of being separated for five years from a young sewing girl to whom he was betrothed, and retired with her to Verjas on the river Saone, where they agreed to drown themselves. With his carnal he tied her right arm to his left, her left arm being thrown around his neck over his right shoulder. The handkerchiefs of each were then linked together and tied around the bodies of both. They walked steadily toward the center of the stream until the rapid current carried them away, and their bodies were found, still enlaced, at some distance below.

TEACHERS' SALARIES - The average
monthly wages of teachers in New York City are: men, \$175; women, \$90. In Massachusetts they are: Men, \$94.33; women, \$34.84. In New Jersey, Men, \$65.77; women, \$38. In Utah, Men, \$40; women, \$16. The Cherokee Nation, the district of Columbia and Nevada, pay the highest salaries of all, those of the Cherokee Nation being: Men, \$255; women, \$200. Nevada, Arizona, Wyoming, Maryland, Louisiana Florida, Tennessee and New Mexico, pay women the same wages that they do men; South Carolina Mississippi pay women a few dollars more than men.
