

Is it on the Square?

It has come to our knowledge that parties, to us unknown, are making an effort to secure title to the school lands, situated upon the Umatilla Indian Reservation, in the advance of the probable opening of the Reservation for settlement. It appears that applications have been made to the Board of School Land Commissioners, for the purchase of these lands, and that the County School Superintendent of that county has been requested to make the necessary appraisal, as the law provides, but to his honor, he it said, he has refused to do it.

If our information is correct it is a bold attempt to rob the school fund, for we understand that the lands that are sought at the price of \$1.25 per acre are well worth from five to twenty-five dollars. This is no doubt only a part of the programme to gobble the greater portion of the school lands of the State, which was organized some five years ago. We hold that all such entries will be held void, whenever tested, but whether good or bad, so far as the title is concerned, does not in any way excuse the attempt to swindle the State; the intentions are the same.

We shall take occasion to refer to this matter again as soon as we can give particulars. In the meantime it will be remembered that this journal will ever be found exposing tricks and frauds wherever found.—Salem, Oregon Statesman.

There is no doubt but that an attempt has been made by parties somewhere to gobble up this land, as duplicate application has been made to the superintendent here to appraise the land and a certain party from Portland, we understand has been here two or three times on this business, and some letters have been received from Salem.

THE FUNCTIONS OF THE VICE PRESIDENT.

In addition to providing that "in case of the removal of the President from office, or of his resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the Vice President," the constitution of the United States says, "The Vice President of the United States shall be president of the Senate, but shall have no vote unless they be equally divided." The constitution declaring that "each House shall be judge of the elections, returns and qualifications of its own members," the question arises, can the Vice President, who is only presiding officer of the Senate, have the right to vote and by so doing admit or expel a member? He is not a Senator, has not the rights or privileges of a Senator, and can only vote in case of tie. There can be no question as to his right to vote in case the Senate is divided on all matters relating to legislation, but in the organization of the Senate and in issues determining who are, or who are not members of the Senate, it is a question whether he has the right to do so. To say the least under our form of Government the exercise of doubtful powers ought to be avoided. The record of the proceedings of the Senate afford no precedent, from the fact that it has always been the custom of that body to elect one of their own number president pro tem, as the constitution provides, who has, with few exceptions, presided over the deliberations of the Senate. But in these days of intense partisanship the Vice President is made a convenient instrument, and to all intents and purposes a Senator of the United States, which he cannot be, as that would certainly be holding two offices, which is prohibited by the constitution. By virtue of his office he may preside over the Senate and in an equal division of votes on legislative business may by his vote determine such questions. The constitution expressly prohibits him from voting only in such contingencies. Senators alone can determine who are or who are not Senators. No State can have three Senators, yet if the Vice President votes upon the qualifications of a Senator, even indirectly, some State has the service of an additional vote not provided by the fundamental law. We apprehend that no one would contend that it would be constitutional, were the Senate equally divided as to the admission of a Senator from either South Carolina or Louisiana, that the casting vote of the Vice President should admit or exclude that Senator. It never has been done and we venture the assertion that if it ever should be, the constitution will be amended to strictly prohibit it. The Vice President cannot do by indirect means what he may not do directly. Yet, the other day in the Senate he determined a tie vote indirectly in favor of admitting one and excluding another of the applicants from Louisiana." The very matter that Senators alone can constitutionally decide. The people of the United States have been educated pretty thoroughly in the past decade as to the practices and principles of good government, and they will not permit any party to maintain itself in power any length of time through unconstitutional means.—Portland Telegram.

Pixley on Hayes.

In a recent number of the S. F. Argonaut Frank Pixley, the editor, who has always been a Republican, writes Mr. Hayes up in an exceedingly racy style. He says "he became the nominee of the Republican party because he was small—so small that the shafts of party envy, hatred and malice had not been directed against him. He was elected, but not through the ballot-box, but by an improvised tribunal." We have not the space to give the article entire, but the following is the conclusion thereof, by which the balance, may be judged:

The Democracy has the Lower House of Congress, the Senate will soon be Democratic. There is no Republican party at the South, and soon there will be none at the north. Ohio has drifted away; Indiana is no longer a doubtful State; New York will go by the board. Murton is dead, and Conkling will be beaten; and so perishes a great national party. All its professions of reform are unperformed. The same evils are still in office. Hayes, the great embodiment of a reform within the party, no longer belongs to it. Since Hayes has been President of the United States—now nearly a year—not one thief, office-holder has been removed for cause; not one plundering criminal been detected, indicted, arraigned, tried, or convicted. The whole machinery of the Courts, in active operation when Grant was President, is now arrested. The white-wash brush has been active, but not reform, and no promise or hope of reform. Only jockeying. Let Murton die; let Conkling be defeated; let the Republican party expire; let the Democracy return to power and govern the country. The change will be an improvement upon our present political condition. No party can be more corrupt or contemptible than the present Republican party. No President of the United States can be smaller than the good Mr. Hayes.—E.

President's Message.

The President claims perfect success in attending his Southern policy—favors speedy resumption—opposes reconsecration of silver—reasserts his determination to carry out his views in regard to civil service—asserts that our relations with foreign powers are, with the exception of Mexico, amicable; shows a decrease of \$18,481,622.22 in revenue during the last year—recommends limiting appropriations, and advocates a tax of ten cents per pound on tea and coffee and a repeal of all forms of internal revenue taxation except on whisky, spirits, tobacco and beer, and recommends more vigorous laws for the protection of the revenue and punishment of fraud and smuggling. The President still clings to the old peace policy in treatment of the Indians—supposes he will recommend a cargo of blankets sent to Joseph and his band. Upon the whole however it is a good document and we recommend it to the perusal of our able Hayes Republican friends.

The N. P. R. R. Co. have concluded, so says the Oregonian to build the main line of the road on the South side of the Columbia river, and says the company disclaim all connection with Senator Mitchell's Bill declaring that Bill destructive to the Co's interests. In consequence of this, the Oregonian is jubilant. That paper labors, or appears to be laboring under the impression that Portland is Oregon and that the rest of the State is only a "rural district" that does not need the assistance of railroads at all. What the people in Eastern Oregon & Washington Territory want is connection directly with the ocean and care but little whether the Pacific road is built on the North or South of the Columbia river. We want the Columbia river opened to free navigation, so we can run direct to Astoria, and a railroad via Walla Walla to the Sound.

IMPORTANT DEFENSE.—State Journal: Hon. J. F. Watson has filed his decision in the Underwood tax case. It will be remembered that when the assessment for school purposes was made last June, in district No. 4 which includes Eugene City, the indebtedness was not deducted. Afterwards the Directors affirmed the action of the clerk in refusing to make the deduction. From this decision J. B. Underwood & Co. appealed to the Circuit Court Judge. Watson reverses the action of the directors, orders the indebtedness within the district to be deducted, and adjudges the district to pay the costs and disbursements of the suit.

St Louis Dispatch: Messrs. Patterson and Corcoran having been read out of the Republican party, will of course not be expected by Edmunds and Conkling to vote for the admission of Kellogg to the senate. (But they did.—E.)

Kellogg has been by a strict party vote sworn in as U. S. Senator from Louisiana, and Butler—Democrat—fills the vacant seat in South Carolina. Another Democrat will soon take the place of Patterson from the Palmetto State.

THE EUSTIS CASE.—WASHINGTON, December 1.—The senate committee on privileges and elections to-day, by a vote of 5 against 3, decided to report a resolution declaring J. B. Eustis entitled to a seat as senator from Louisiana for the short term, ending March 3d.

VERDICT.—Standard: The jury in the High perjury case returned a verdict of "not guilty as charged in the indictment." At the first ballot, they stood ten for acquittal and two for conviction. At midnight another man came around and at 3 o'clock on Thursday morning the twelfth juror joined the eleven in favor of acquittal.

ANNEXATION.—Hon. S. S. Penn has presented in Congress a petition from the citizens of Northern Idaho asking to be annexed to Washington Territory. In fixing the boundaries of the proposed state of Washington the counties in Northern Idaho can be embraced, and then there will be little difficulty about communitating the Union.—W. W. Statesman.

W. W. Statesman: Congressman Pacheco has introduced a bill for the sale of timber lands, which exempts from its operations all lands containing minerals and all settlers' improvements. It also reserves all bona fide rights already attached under the United States laws, and in regard to lands hereafter surveyed gives the actual occupants prior opportunities for purchase before offering the lands for public sale. Each applicant purchasing any quarter section already surveyed is required to make oath of his bona fide intention to appropriate for his own use and not for sale, and that he has made no other application and has not agreed in any way to transfer the title.
