The whole Democratic ticket in this county is elected by a majority ranging from 50 to 300. This is a result we anticipated and are fully satisfied. Some parties were not so well satisfied. Mr. Pennington for the Senate and Mr. Arnold for School Superintendent. One man remarking that these two were his meat and he was going for them. He did so and as a result of his labors, Mr. Pennington received a majority of over 200 and Mr. Arnold 300. If the Republican workers had had two weeks more time they would have elected the whole Democratic ticket by 400 majority. One of the Republican candidates says he helped him a great deal and he feels grateful to us for it. Well he is well come to any aid we gave him and if he is the good man he claims to be he will not doubt come around and see us.

The first of July the new officers will take their positions in the county offices and the county will be blessed with honest and competent officials. We will hear of no more jail deliveries, nor steam boat escapes. Mr. Sperry will faithfully keep and deliver all prisoners put in his charge. Cuyne Reynolds and Lige Taylor affairs under his administration will be unknown. We predict that every man convicted for the next two years in this county will suffer the full penalty of his sentence.

In the Clerk's office the records will be properly kept and no more roads will be defeated on account of the negligence of the Clerk in not recording. Neither will there appear any more a script broker's office in what is set apart as an office for the clerk. These predictions we make for the reason that we are assured that Messrs. Sperry and Keeney, Sheriff and Clerk elect, are both honest and capable. These are the only positions wherein we have heard any intimation of crookedness heretofore.

Our Legislative ticket is elected by a large majority. The only issue that cropped out prominently in the fight on the Legislative ticket was the election of C. S. Senator or rather Mitchell and anti-Mitchell. Here we find an index to the feelings of the people here in regard to Mitchell. Many Republicans united with us against the Republican candidate for the Legislature simply because they were anti-Mitchell, and they did not wish to take any chances on voting for men who would under any circumstances vote for Mitchell. We have not as yet been able to get the full vote from all the precincts in the county on all the candidates but will give a correct table next week. Mr. Searson we understand has put off the canvass of the vote until the last day. This looks a little suspicious especially since we understand he has stated that the vote of some of the precincts would be thrown out for informality. Perhaps another 8 to 7 count is anticipated. The people here will not submit to. The Democrats have elected their candidates for the county offices and those elected will have their places and no mistake.

Preparing For the Oregon Election.

The following from the Hartford Times will explain in a great measure, the recent trip of Crandall, Simpson and Waters to Union county, and the disaffection of the Union County men.
"There seems to be a good deal of anxiety on the part of the Republicans concerning the next election. That they are a party, in a tactical position, is sufficiently plain to be seen by every body; and the wonder is, or should be, not that they are breaking in pieces, but that any political party weighed with such a load of infamy as the conspiracy to change the Presidential election returns, by fraud, can stand up at all. Their anxiety is natural enough, and they are endeavoring to 'plant money' where, in the language of their late lamented Credit Mobilier friend, Oakes Ames, it will 'do good.' As Oregon is the first State to hold an election, and as a Senator is, moreover, to be elected, by the next Legislature, their efforts are now being directed in that quarter. The New York World says: 'The Republican Congressional committee had a meeting in Portland and discussed what it should do to carry Oregon for the Republicans in June. As it is the first election for a Representative to the Forty-Sixth Congress and for a Legislature to elect a United States Senator in place of Mitchell, it was deemed important to secure both. The labors of the committee will therefore be directed to Oregon.'
If by any accident all this money effort should fail to win, what would happen then?"

INDIAN INDIAN WARI

Statement from a Correspondent in the field.

BOISE CITY, June 2.—Mr. Goulier, of the Idaho Statesman, who left here on Friday with Major Collins, sent the following concerning the Indian outbreak and the movements of the troops:

At Abe Corlier's we learned that Captain Boise Jim and several Indians who had been camped at that place had left suddenly upon hearing that the troops were coming. Col. Bernard marched all night, passed Corlier's at daybreak and reached Dixie station on the Rock river road at 4 o'clock Friday evening. The Indians under Capt. Boise Jim, were ahead of the command, with the purpose, it was thought, of notifying the Indians on the prairie of the approach of the troops. Everywhere along the stage road, the Indians were seen to leave suddenly, and along the trails they traveled, they had in their hands scattered buffalo robes and various other articles. Col. Bernard was advised not to go into Camas Prairie with his present force, as the Indians are reported to be in strong force and determined to fight. It is evident that the force under Major Collins, (about 70 men), is too small to offer battle to the Indians. All that can be done will be to watch the Indians until reinforcements can come forward. Twenty armed men from Rocky Bar, with Sheriff Campbell, joined Col. Bernard Saturday morning, and went with him to Camas Prairie.

ANOTHER LAVA BED.
The distance from Boise City by trail to Big Camas Prairie is 75 miles; by the wagon road it is 85 miles. The point in the lava beds occupied by the Indians is at the head of Clover creek, and about 15 miles from King Hill station on the Overland road. These lava beds are parallel with Camas Prairie and are estimated to be full 50 or 60 miles in length. It is here the Indians are encamped, with ample room for natural defenses, plenty of wood, water and grass, and where they will be able to stay all summer, unless a large force is brought against them. From their natural fortresses they can sell out upon the settlements and make the route impassable and the country uninhabitable.

THE PRETENDED GRIEVANCE.
The pretended grievance of the Indians is that the Big Camas Prairie, which they have visited every summer from time immemorial, is being occupied by whites with their herds of horses, cattle and hogs, which trample and root out the camas, destroying one of their main resources of food; but the fact is they have been preparing to go on the war path since last summer, and have chosen this locality for the base of their operations.

CHIEF JOSEPH REWARDED FOR HIS TREASON.
There is a rumor current among the Indians to the effect that Chief Joseph is living in a splendid furnished mansion with servants, horses, fine clothes and every luxury that heart can wish. This good fortune they think has come to Joseph as a reward for his bravery in last summer's campaign, and they are anxious of imitating his example with hopes of a like reward.

THE WOUNDED MEN.
The wounded man Gen. Nesby was taken to Rattlesnake from Porter's. His case is thought to be hopeless. Dr. Kessler received a glancing shot on the head which tore the scalp but inflicted no serious wound. The ball struck his head glanced and struck his horse, which was near. The noble steed, though mortally wounded, carried both men 10 miles, where one of them procured another horse. The other wounded man riding the horse the remaining ten miles to Dixie station. After reaching the station the horse died.

NUMBER OF INDIANS.
It is estimated that there are 200 Indians in the lava beds.

BOISE CITY ARMING—MASS MEETING OF CITIZENS.
BOISE CITY, June 2.—The city is well armed.

A mass meeting of the citizens of this city has just been held at the court house to devise means to render assistance to the settlers along the overland road. The meeting was well attended, Chief Justice Johnson presiding. Several speeches were made, and the resolution of Governor Brayton was adopted. It was decided to go to the relief of the settlers, but with the express understanding they would be subject to orders from the governor of Idaho.

STAGE STATION ROBBERED.
Bannock warriors on Friday last robbed King Hill station on the overland road, 70 miles from Boise City, and drove off the stage coach, 8 horses. The hostler, Mr. Packard, saw the Indians coming, and escaped to the hills.

FURTHER DEPREDACTIONS.
After getting all they wanted at King Hill the Indians crossed Snake river at Glenn's Ferry and captured two large freight teams on the other side. One of the teams was loaded with groceries and provisions for D. Levi, of this city. The other team had a considerable amount of powder, revolvers and cartridges for Cliff and Kennelly, hardware merchants, and Buffalo Horn and his warriors took this ammunition without an executive order. The Indians loaded their horses from the freight wagons and cut the ferry boat loose. The teamsters have not been heard from since, and it is not known whether they were killed or not. There are a great many teams on the road, and the Indians get all the provisions they want. Two hundred volunteers could be easily raised here if the people were willing to recognize the man who draws a salary as governor of Idaho.

MORE INDIAN TROUBLES.—The latest reports of the Bannocks have a more threatening and serious complexion than has anything that has transpired this season. Reports from Altura state they have been committing alarming depredations at Big Camas Prairie; that two white men were shot by them there, and that general conster-

nation prevailed among the settlers, many of whom were abandoning their property and fleeing for their lives. The names of the men who were shot by the averages are neither and Neby. Neither of them were dead at last accounts, but it is stated that one of them would not survive. They were carried to Dixie station on the Rocky Bar road, which is about sixty miles from where the shooting occurred. The Bannocks are camped between Big Camas and Snake River. It is reported that there are two hundred of them well armed, and that but very few squares and children are with them. Settlers counted 60 lodges, and 20 or more are reported to have joined them. It is also reported that they are in the vicinity of Howard's ranch. They have sent messengers to Chief Wampana, near the Malheur Agency, and it is believed that they are trying to get the Fort to go on the war-path. Major Collins has promptly gone to the scene of these depredations, the distance being about 50 miles from Boise City. He took with him a force of 70 men armed and ready for business. This outbreak at Camas Prairie has been threatened for a long time, and it looks now as though there was cause for serious alarm. Big Camas Prairie is one of the richest tracts of land in Idaho, and the averages have long been looking in that direction with wistful eyes. The outrageous conduct of the Indians Agent at Fort Hall is turning these things into a bad case. It can now be seen that the demand of our people to have more troops stationed in different sections of Idaho, is a just one, while the scenes of murder and pillage which have been inaugurated at Camas Prairie show too, as we have often said, that the wretched management of Indian affairs is a disgrace to the Government, and ought not to be tolerated by the people.—Idaho-Idaho.

THE NEW INDIAN WAR.—It is deemed necessary by the military authorities, in view of the news from Idaho, to concentrate troops as rapidly as possible at Boise City to move against the hostile Bannocks. Gen. Howard will command the expedition, and will himself start on Friday. Troops are already ordered forward. Two companies are drawn from Fort Condy and six companies from Vancouver. All those at Walla Walla will be sent forward. In consequence of the somewhat unsettled condition of things in the Indian country on the upper Columbia, no troops will be drawn from Wilsonton's command in that quarter. Altogether the column that can be concentrated at Boise for the movement against the Bannocks will number about five hundred effective men. The distance is so great that it will probably be impossible to get the force on the ground in less than two weeks. It is probable that other troops will be sent from Salt Lake. Gen. Sherman telegraphs Gen. Howard that in the movement to be made department lines are to be ignored. Every exertion will be made by Gen. Howard to hasten operations and chastise the Indians who have repeatedly engaged in this uprising.—Oregonian.

PORTER CITY, May 31, 1 p. m.
The telegraph informs us of an Indian outbreak in Idaho. Some 50 men left Boise City for Big Camas Prairie. A newsman arrived last night at 4 o'clock and reported two sections shot yesterday morning early, one of which is supposed to have been from his wounds. Indians are camped in lava beds between Big Camas and Snake River, which are about 40 miles long and 6 wide. The present summer is limited at 200 warriors, who are said to be well armed and supplied with ammunition. Settlers have reported to have been killed, Buffalo Horse, who was with Gen. Howard, is with them. They are supposed to have messengers on route to Chief Wampana of the Pines, who is camped near Malheur Agency. Soldiers left Boise City for scouting different places at once, under the command of Major Collins.

INNOCENT EXCLUDED.—Probably another innocent man has been hung. The dispatches bring the news of the public hanging of Henry Roberts (colored) in Shelby, N. C., which took place on the 25th inst. He affirmed his innocence and died in hopes of salvation, forgiving his enemies who had sworn falsely against him. It is very rare that a man utters a falsehood when standing upon the scaffold, with one foot comparatively in a grave, and hence if we may reason from nature it is probable that the utterances of the prisoner about to be hung are, and worthy of due credit. Such circumstances present a strong argument against the law of capital punishment. They suggest in unmistakable language the necessity of an improvement of our present laws governing the execution of condemned people. It is lamentable indeed that an innocent man should suffer an ignominious death upon circumstances or upon false evidence, and the law should be severely cautious in cases where there may be a shadow of doubt of the prisoner's guilt.
