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ITEMS BY TELEGRAPH.

Mukhtar Pasha has been appointed Turkish commissioner to Crete. The distribution of prizes at the Paris exhibition has been postponed until October 26th.

The Episcopalian Church built by Americans in Vienna was consecrated Saturday, the bishop of Bosnia officiating. A Constantinople dispatch says 16,000 loads are approaching Batoum to ask Derwisch Pasha what course he intends to adopt.

It is stated that matters have been satisfactorily settled between the Central and Union Pacific railroad companies, and the Pacific Mail Steamship Company. Two engineers have been arrested on the Transylvanian frontier on suspicion of having stolen Russian spies.

Commissioner Reuss has telegraphed the collector of Bosnia Island officiating, to employ for the month, necessary to suppress illicit distillation of spirits in that district. Fresh troops are leaving to replace those ordered home by the Russian government.

The British consul at Adrianople reports that Bulgarian consuls in General and Major Muratovs. A Greek archbishop has been named to the Greek episcopate of Thessalonica. Negotiations between Minister Masala, papal nuncio, and Prince Hohenlohe have led to no result whatever.

The report of the Rhodope commission is signed by the Russian and German delegates. A dispatch from Bucharest says Russia would not be very energetic in demanding the immediate surrender of Bessarabia. The Russian government, which was strongly insistent on the surrender of Bessarabia, is now much surprised at the sudden change of the demand.

The fall of President Gonzalez of San Domingo is considered inevitable. Luperon was arrested at Hayti. Several persons had taken refuge in the British and French consulates. The President's life is being threatened, and a strong guard is maintained over his residence.

Wm. G. Williams, convicted last June of robbing Wells, Fargo's railway express between Ogden and Salt Lake of some \$15,000, has been granted a new trial with bonds fixed at \$20,000. It is stated that since his conviction Williams has made important discoveries implicating others.

Political correspondence says: Most friendly communications passed between Austria and Serbia on the occasion of the celebration of Serbia's independence. Prince Milan that he and the Servians might rely upon the most cordial support of Austria in all matters affecting their welfare.

Vienna specialists mention the precarious position of the Austrian minister in consequence of the Russian and Turkish complications. A Russian telegram denies that the country is threatened, and a correspondent of the Daily Telegraph writes that although Count Andrassy's experience is considerable, his opinion is still supported by the Hungarian ministry.
