GOVERNOR'S MESSAGE.

We publish the most important part of the retiring Governor's message, leaving out much that is a repetition of matters recently published in the newspapers of the State.

Under the Constitution of Oregon it is made the duty of the Governor to give to the Legislative Assembly information touching the condition of the State, and to recommend such measures as he shall judge to be expedient.

Hon. I. F. Grover having been elected at the last session of the Legislature to a seat in the United States Senate, resigning the office of Governor on the 1st day of February, 1878, and the same thereafter devolving upon me under the Constitution, I immediately entered upon the discharge of its duties.

The care of the insane and idiotic of the State is one of the most sacred trusts confided to you as legislators, and will doubtless receive your early and earnest attention.

It is regarded as one of the first and most sacred duties of a State to make sufficient provision for the education of its youth.

There has been a steady, rapid and healthy growth in the common schools of the State within the past six years.

It is hardly necessary to repeat upon the members of the Legislature the importance of our public school system, and the necessity of making them the object of a particularly tender and fostering care.

In dealing with the Indians in this State it would not be safe, in every case, to treat them as savages.

Under existing treaties they frequently have a right to the same lands as the white people in the matter of fishing, hunting, etc.

During the past two fiscal years there have been paid from the treasury on account of outstanding warrants \$2,645 23 principal and \$42,576 13 interest out of funds derived from the special tax authorized to be levied by the last Legislative Assembly.

There has also been paid of this class of warrants \$4,728 77 principal and \$2,411 00 interest out of the general fund.

There are also warrants of this kind outstanding that have been advertised for payment, which have not been presented, amounting to \$4,451 23, to be paid out of the general fund, and the cash remains in the treasury to be applied to this purpose.

In addition to this last amount there is the sum of \$475 06 in the treasury for the payment of advertised warrants of this character to be paid out of the outstanding warrant fund.

As the statement of disbursements for the past two years the amounts paid on accounts of old and new warrants and interest are included. The report of the Treasurer will contain a statement of these disbursements in full, and respectfully refer you to his report and also to the report of the Secretary of State for full information as to the financial transactions for the past two years.
