Wool Report.

Selection from the wool report of Henry Hewitt & Co., Portland Oregon.

The accompanying statements show the increased receipts of wool this year over last—1877. Oregon wools have come forward in good condition, especially Eastern Oregon showing a marked improvement over that of former years, while we regret to say in several parts of the valley wool was carelessly packed, tag locks and sweepings, causing a serious loss to parties handling these wools.

In regard to grades of Oregon wool most favorably received in the Eastern markets, the wool from the valley grading No. 1 clothing or fine wools have met with the best sale, and have brought the highest prices.

The No. 2 or medium wools sell at 2c to 2 1/2c, per lb less than No. 1; while No. 3 or coarse medium is hard to dispose of at 8 to 10c less than No. 1. Of the worsted wools, valley Oregon, the No. 1 Delaine is the most valuable—the No. 2 coming being slow of sale. These wools are not popular with worsted manufacturers, except No. 1 Delaine, and it is a mistake for growers of wool in Oregon to grow or continue raising the coarse grade (Cotswold, Leicester, &c., &c.) as it does not make good worsted wool.

The rapid increase of wools in the Territories and Texas, and the breeding of sheep in those countries with native and Mexican stock, will, for some years to come, furnish to our markets an abundance of coarse or common wool, which sell at a low price; and it appears to us the safest course for the Oregon growers is to avoid the coarse-wooled sheep, and bring their sheep up to a standard of American merino, a long fine, evenly-grown staple, avoiding the greasy black top.

The Eastern Oregon wools are, as a rule, fine enough, and if the coarse sheep were culled out, would give a wool well adapted to the general wants of our manufacturers. The principal objection to these wools is the uncertainty regarding the shrinkage, some loss being very sandy.

Where the wool is in good condition, they are well liked by all manufacturers. The same objection applies to coarse Eastern Oregon as to valley wool; coarse wools from all sections must be sold on a low basis per scored pound, say from 30 to 40 cents, while good medium to fine commands 45 to 55 per scored pound.

We earnestly call the attention of all growers to exercise a vigilant watch over the shearing department, and the care and attention thus bestowed will be amply rewarded, as the brands of the carefully handled sheep will be noted by buyers for future guidance.

The presence of tags and coral take dirt from the fleece of the wool, and when sales are rendered growers are at a loss to account for the disappointing figures, asserting that their wool was first-class, but losing sight entirely of the condition which (in too many cases) is the cause of disappointment.

We would point to the wrong policy of occupying lands to their full capacity, and feel confident that a lesser number of stock, coupled with a more careful selection of blooded animals, thereby enhancing the weight and quality of the wool clip per head, will, in the end, prove the best remuneration to stock owners. Wool growers should be careful and have covering at shearing places so as to keep their wool from getting wet; fleeces that have been shorn while wet by rain or dew, and packed in this condition, will generally become discolored, and render it unmerchantable, thereby lessening its value.

In the meantime we would strongly urge upon owners the necessity of paying close attention to the breeding of their flocks and herds, and by use of sire of undoubted pedigree, reap results which in all parts of the world have ended in certain success.
