Enron "E. O." - March 15th 1879.

Having not seen our part of the country represented in your communications, I assume the responsibility of a correspondent and proceed to do things up in the following manner: We have had what a Yankee would term a very bad winter, but what an Oregonian would term a very severe one and indeed it has been when we consider the loss to stock owners which is estimated at 50% in this immediate vicinity.

Conrad Stagle has returned from the Joint Day's where he removed a large number of calves to the fall. He informs us that the loss sustained there is quite as great as here.

For the last two weeks the sun has shone out pleasant and warm and the hills are again assuming their natural coat of verdure which is appreciated by stockmen, and bailed with pleasure by all. We had alternate dances, weddings and shows here this winter, but have to speak of all in the past tense.

March 6th 1879.

FRIEND TURNER - Thinking that an occasional correspondence from your old home - "Wagon Wheel" may not be done to you and the large number of your Umatilla readers who formerly lived, loved and had their being in "Old Park" I write the quilt to furnish you a few lines. Our county is as strongly democratic as ever and the mischievous law which prevented the great valley from abandoning their heresy and becoming close communion democrats.

We have got the railroad fever badly - narrow gauge and broad gauge. The former has reached Pryorville which, from a county cross road in your day has become a town of 100 inhabitants. We expect the iron horse to reach Dallas some time in the future but the good Lord only knows when. The managers of the west side evidently mean business and are pushing forward the survey rapidly, and I trust when you come to visit your old stomping ground next summer, you can commission Portland to Dallas on the car. Dallas has improved considerably the last year, and prospects for some house (Chicago) are flattering. We have had quite a winter here, cold and clear and cloudy alternately. Independence seems to have directed herself for her wedding clothes and is fast putting on metropolitan airs. She will make a vigorous fight for the county seat next election. From Cottage Grove.

March 7th 1879.

Enron "E. O." - On the 2d of the present month we were presented with a snow about three inches deep in the valley and deeper in the mountains. Since then we have had very heavy rains until last night we had another light snow on the hills and in the mountains. We are having very rough weather for this season of the year, more than we have had for several years. Farmers are getting very uneasy; they are anxious to put in their crops. Prospects are gloomy now for farming. There is every indication of continued winter. If this winter continues much longer it will tell on some of our stock here, as we have had about three months of cool, frosty weather which stopped the growth of grass. Fall snow went long ago. The health of the country is good as far as we know. Times are very dull and money very scarce. We have had some high water and the river here is up considerable, but not near out of its banks, and is now subsiding notwithstanding the rains continue to fall.

We have a new butcher in slab town. A new drugstore is in process of erection, also a new school house and one or two dwellings, and soon Whipple Box will commence their new store house. Emigrants continue to come to our town. A young lady arrived here this week from the east, a relative of one of our citizens. Mr. Walker and wife. We are pleased to see that class of emigrants come; there is always room for one more of that class - at least we think so.

We will look after our sidewalk extended to the depot on the railroad, a distance of something over a fourth of a mile from town, so that those wishing to visit our town by rail can pass from the depot to town without swimming or wading. To sum it all up in a few words, Slab Town has an improved tendency.

Last Monday we visited a school meeting at our district school house and during deliberation it reminded us of our boyish days in Kentucky at the annual elections there, when excitement ran high, and it was necessary to talk loud, and all talk at once, so that nothing could be understood. The chairman could not keep order and in his efforts to do so he became confused and the meeting ended in a general row, similar to those on the Umatilla Reservation among the natives.
