Corney goes with them and will not doubt make them hear, salute and patriots. Would it not be well to have some white men go along so as to be able to represent the whites in the parades that will be held. We will all be represented as cut-throats, red ruffians, cut-throats and robbers, and every word Corney says will be sucked in, swallowed and fully believed by the white-headed sentimentals of the East. We suggest the propriety of selecting a man to stand on the platform, and have heard several men say that they would give \$50 to assist in defraying a man's expenses and uphold in our opinion, he does and that without delay.

FAST TIME.—Hon. John Whitaker, congressman from Oregon, has arrived safely in Washington, so the dispatches inform us. He has made the "fastest" country "cord" from his home to the national capital. Mr. Whitaker left his home in Lane county on Saturday evening, March 8, at 7 o'clock. He arrived at Portland by special train Sunday morning at 3 o'clock, and sailed on the Elder for San Francisco two hours later the same morning. He reached Astoria about noon Sunday, but owing to the roughness of the bar was compelled to lie there until Monday morning. The Elder experienced strong head winds all the way down, and arrived at San Francisco Wednesday morning, March 12th, at 10 o'clock A. M. Crossing the bay to Oakland, Mr. Whitaker was placed on board a special train and hurried across the continent as rapidly as steam could drive him. Salt Lake, Omaha, and Chicago were successively passed, and Oregon's congressman was borne to the national capital in triumph yesterday—arriving there at 10 A. M. Some idea of the speed of the cordery with which Mr. Whitaker was hurried toward his destination by the run made between Omaha and Chicago—a distance 500 miles, accomplished in 12½ hours—at the rate of 40 miles an hour. He was about 207 hours in making the trip.

ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION.—From Prof. J. C. Arnold, our efficient County Superintendent of schools, we glean the following: No. districts in the county 54; No. reported, 40; No. not reported, 14; whole No. of children reported in the county, 2,250; amount distributed per school, \$1,100; whole amount distributed, \$2,475.00. Pendleton district reports the greatest number of children, 250, while Weston, which has heretofore been the poorest, reports 221. This is owing chiefly to the fearful ravages of the diphtheria in that district during the last year. The 14 districts not reported will of course lose their proportion of the school fund and then the Superintendent will be compelled to turn out to be a fine imposed on school district clerks for neglecting their duties, and they should be required to pay to their respective districts the amount lost thereby by their negligence. It is not right that a whole district should suffer on account of a want of attention to business on the part of one who happens to be clerk. Of course there are a few of these districts that have lost their organization, but quite a number have not, and at least 200 children are left unprotected and without receiving any of the benefits of the public fund. This should not be so.

EDITOR "E. O."—Being, as Agent Corney, and his pets have gone to Washington it is to be presumed they will give an account of the many broad acres under cultivation on the reservation by the Indians. Wouldn't it be well to have all the land cultivated by the Indians carefully surveyed by the county surveyor, or some competent surveyor, and a survey to make affidavit to the exact number of acres, and forward it to the Department at Washington by telegraph or otherwise. Of course it is well known the Indians farm on a very small scale, but is not known at the East. So it behooves our citizens to look well to the East and govern themselves accordingly. J. L. BLUE MOUNTAINS, March 24, 1919.

EDITOR "E. O."—The blue bird is with us again, and his cheerful notes tell us the happy spring time is soon to follow. The snow has left the valley and is fast receding up the mountain slopes. The ring of the woodman's ax and the crash of falling timber is heard all along the timber line. Several places have been started up in the last few days of late snow under the auspices of our beautiful mountain valley. The past severe winter has taught them a lesson. They know now how dangerous it is to the loss of capital invested in sheep or cattle to attempt to keep them over winter in this high altitude without having an abundance of provisions and a large area of shed room. Next winter will find the farmers with extended hay racks and grain stacks. The coming summer will note much needed improvement in this valley. Maj. Magoon has selected a site for a grist mill on Wallawa river, some two or three miles from where it leaves Silver Lake. He contemplates building at once. This will be a great saving to the settlers as they now have to haul their flour from Grand Ronde Valley. Mr. Cochran put up a saw mill on Hurricane Creek last fall. So, instead of dirt floors, many of us now have plank. The mill is strapped up again a few weeks ago under the management of inexperienced sawyers. A Brother's Farewell.

Eugene Avery, alias Archie Brown, who was hanged at Portland on Friday received a letter from his brother at Minneapolis. The brother is a respectable citizen, a man of family and a commercial traveler. His wife and child are very sick and consequently he found it impossible to leave his home to visit his brother before his death. The letter is published in full in the Portland Standard, from which we make the following extracts:—

MY DEAR BROTHER EUGENE:—Your long and pleading letter was received yesterday and forwarded with one from me to our unhappy parents in Watertown. I read and re-read your letter, Eugene, and am glad indeed that hope is so strong within you. Mother writes that she came very near starting last Wednesday, she may go yet. I wish I did not have today, Eugene, that it is almost absolutely impossible for me to go to you. * * * I have no doubt about there being a great deal of sympathy here for you and this other man. There should be, not that crime should go unpunished, but to hang a man here and there occasionally in those States that have not yet become civilized enough to do away with capital punishment and the enormity of whose crimes is too times greater, is getting so common we see it in our daily paper almost every day. * * * It shows how sickly sentimental it is for people to say, "the law must be enforced." When they have a new trial down, and can put the halter around his neck and launch him into everlasting misery and despair. No matter how many innocent children and babes unborn have it thrown at them in years to come that their father or uncle was hung.
