Both performed their parts well and everything that was done was done decently and in order. The choir of young ladies also did splendidly; but best of all was the oration of Mr. Bishop. The old American Spread Eagle style was departed from in every particular, and without any hesitation we pronounce it the best, phrasing, most appropriate and cleverest 4th of July oration we ever listened to. It was delivered in a plain, off-hand sort of way, just as one might expect of Bishop. If we can procure a copy we will publish the oration entire next week. The crowd remained but a short time after the exercises were over, owing to the unpleasantness of the day, and returned to town and began preparations for witnessing the Plug-Ugly celebration which took place in front of the Pendleton Hotel. Their procession was formed above town and here they come with all sorts of teams and conveyances. A Horrible Affair.
P. McBAIN BURNED TO DEATH.

From Mr. E. Ingie, living on the Walla Walla river, we learn that on last Sunday morning Mr. Peter McBain, son of William McBain and brother of John McBain, the interpreter for the Umatilla Indian Reservation, was burned to death at his father's house near the Walla Walla river. Deceased came home from Walla Walla about 2 o'clock Sunday morning in company with his brother James, and after eating a lunch retired to bed and lit a cigarette and it is supposed went to sleep with the cigarette burning. Not long after he had retired his father and mother were awakened by the report of a can of powder which was in a box under the bed. They jumped up and ran to the door of the room where deceased had been sleeping, and found his bed wrapped in flames. The fire had gained such headway that they were unable to enter the room. The panic stricken parents hearing the backing of their dog on the outside of the house, rushed out thinking their son had caught fire and run out to the creek to extinguish the fire, but after calling him and receiving no answer they returned to the house and found that he was still in the room and was burned to death. J. D. Laman Esq., accompanied by Dr. J. M. Boyd, came out, summoned a jury and found a verdict in accordance with the above facts. Mr. McBain was a young man of promise, 24 years of age.

Sad Accident.
