Retiring of Greenbacks.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Western Republicans very generally agree with the great body of Democrats in condemning that portion of the currency act which provides for the retirement of the greenbacks, and it is perfectly evident that the president's advice in this particular will have no effect during the existence of the present Congress, except possibly to make party capital for the Democrats.

Terrific Explosion.
REYNOLDS, Wis., Dec. 1.—The boiler in the Reynolds lumber company's planing mill exploded with terrific force this afternoon, killing Engineer Hopkins, Foreman Hoskins, and a teamster named Gallagher. The force of the explosion was so great as to be felt all over the city, and fragments of the wreck were scattered for blocks distant. Several other employees were severely injured. A jury is holding inquest over the dead bodies to-day.

The Work of the Senators.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—Senators and representatives to-day in discussing the outlook for the session generally agree that it is likely to extend into next summer, that no very great amount of legislation will be accomplished, but that each party will be kept busy watching the other and taking up as good a position as possible for the presidential year. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 3.—The Democratic delegate elections to-day were attended with much disorder. The Fifth ward convention was broken up by a mob from the Fourth ward, and several of their men were shot, one Bernard Kelly dying on the way to the hospital.

White river trip.
A special dispatch to the Denver Tribune says that the White river trip came into Los Pinos last Saturday and went before the commission. A new plan of examining witnesses has been adopted, and a number allowed to enter the commission room at once. They all wear coats, trousers, and hats. Stocks Must Tumble.
NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—James Keane is reported as having said to-day that he thought Vanderbilt had done well in his sale of Central and West Virginia bonds, which are entirely too high. By the middle of next month the Grand Trunk will have completed its line to Chicago and taken at least a half of a million from the Central's business. The value of all stocks are too high. WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The report of the committee appointed by the Supervisors to investigate the management of the Milwaukee house of correction, states that the charges have been substantiated in that city, oppression, incompetence and filth have prevailed, and that prisoners have been shamefully mistreated. Haze and Kennedy, inspectors and wardens, are condemned severely, and recommendation is made that thorough reconstruction of the system be made.

The Maine Question.
ARIZONA, Me., Dec. 3.—The Governor and Council have been in session all the forenoon and till 1 o'clock, when they adjourned. They allowed the returns of the county officers to be examined by Senators and Representatives-elect, or their attorneys, and therefore it would be no use to exhibit them.

Honest John Holds His Seat.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—In the case of McDowell vs. Walaker, Democrat, of Oregon, no evidence or briefs have been presented and it will be dropped.

Vote to be Removed.
The bill introduced by Belford to-day for the removal of Utah, provides that the president shall have the right to remove any member of the territorial assembly with them for their peaceful removal. The bill proposes an appropriation of \$200,000 to meet the expenses of removal.

Congressional Caucuses.
The Republicans of the Senate met to consider the bill of the vacancy on committee caused by the death of Senator Chandler.

Democratic Senators met and concluded that no changes were necessary in formation of committees, sending word to Republicans that the vacancies caused by the death of Chandler were at their disposal.

Senator Baldwin, of Michigan, will probably fill Chandler's place on Senate committee.

Appropriations to be Barred.
The House appropriations committee to-day were unanimous in desiring an early completion of the appropriation bills. The deficiency appropriation bill for the pay of marshals and their deputies will doubtless be the first provided for. It was thoroughly discussed.

The Texas Way.
GALVESTON, Dec. 4.—A New special from Waco last night says in the country near where a dance was progressing, Ned Wood and Miss Grace Stanford to dance, which she declined. Wood became angry and demanded that the dance cease. Wood then followed Will Currie into the back room and provoked a fight. Currie knocked him down with the long. They met outside of the house and had a duel with pistols. A dozen shots were exchanged. Currie was wounded in the hand, a bystander was wounded in the leg, and George Wood was shot in the thigh. Ned Wood then went where Miss Stanford was talking with Albert Crook, and made two attempts to shoot her, given remarking to Crook, "You are a friend of Currie," shot Crook dead and escaped.

Prisoners Taken to Tilden.
ARIZONA, Dec. 4.—In answer to recent publications A. H. Stephens telegraphed to this city as follows in relation to Grant and the next president: "I have said, and I now repeat, that the South might go further and fare worse than to take him. I have said that I entertained for him personally a very high regard and esteem. I have said, and I now repeat, that I prefer him to Tilden for president. This is no change of opinion on my part. A letter from Gen. Grant was read promising to preside over the meeting at the Cooper Institute if it did not interfere with his other arrangements.

New Haven Goes Democratic.
NEW HAVEN, Dec. 3.—At the town election to-day the Democrats elected all the officers by a majority ranging from 500 to 800. The common council is Democratic for the first time in three years. The Greenbackers voted with the Democrats.

Death of Gen. J. C. Davis.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—A general order has been issued by Gen. Sherman officially announcing the death and commending the services of Brig. Maj. Gen. Jefferson C. Davis. Gen. Sheridan will give the orders necessary to mark the respect in which this honored soldier is universally held by the army.

Latest from the Utes.
DENVER, Dec. 3.—A special to the Denver Tribune says Chief Caloway appeared before the peace commission at Los Pinos on Monday and testified that he took part in Thorpe's fight, thus corroborating the statement already made that he and Jack led the Indians in the fight. He states that the fight was an accident. The troops were trying to avoid the Utes by taking the trail instead of the regular road through Milk river canon, and while the Utes were doing the same thing to avoid the soldiers they were surprised when the command came and began the fight, quite unexpectedly to themselves. Caloway swore positively that the Mormons had promised to assist the Indians in any way with the United States troops. The commission is now much more hopeful of accomplishing something than formerly.

Rawlins, Wyo., Dec. 3.—The mail from White river this morning brings news that the Ute Indians attacked and drove in the territory in charge of a herd of beef from which the command was supplied with meat at the White river camp, and drove off the entire herd.

Nicaragua Canal and Railroad.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The United States commercial agent at Corinto, Nicaragua, is dispatching this morning Judge Drexler to the treaty of construction of a railroad intended for internal communication, but which may be made inter-oceanic by canalizing and locking the river Tigris.

It is entirely a government enterprise and will cost less than two million, and its completion depends wholly upon the political state of the country. If peace can be maintained it will probably be completed in six years. Rails, locomotives and rolling stock have already arrived for sections of the road which are nearly completed.

Senator Gordon is preparing a charter for the Nicaragua canal to submit to the Nicaragua government.

Freedom of the Press.
ST. PETERSBURG, Dec. 1.—Publication of the Gork newspaper has been suspended for five months.

Distress in Ireland.
LONDON, Dec. 4.—An appeal from Cardinal Manning for subscriptions to alleviate distress in Ireland was read in all the Catholic churches of the metropolis yesterday.

It is stated that in the west of Ireland such hunger, poverty and want are now to be seen as has never been known since the great Irish famine. A general collection for this purpose is appointed for Sunday next.
