To let our readers know how slavery existed in New England in Colonial times, we copy the following from Harper's Magazine. Letters of John Winthrop, Gov. of Massachusetts Colony: "See, Mr. Edmond, and myself have heard of a divorce of women and children [the quaker] in the bay, and would be glad of a share, viz., a young woman or girl and a boy, if you think good. I write to you for some boys for Bermuda."

In the following letter, to the same, written in 1645, a scheme for the slave trade is described: "If upon a just ware with the Narraganset the Lord should deliver them into our hands, we might easily have men, women, and children enough to exchange for Munros, which will be more gainful selling for us than we could have, for I can not see how we can thrive until we get into a stock of slaves sufficient to fit all our business, for our children's children will hardly see this great [Western] filled with people, and the accounts will still desire freedom to plant for the west, and not stay but for very great wages. And I suppose you know very well we shall have a large number of slaves cheaper than one English servant." J. H. Koonce, Umatilla, December 11, 1879. 41304

The Republican today publishes a spy interview with Congressman Belford, of Colorado. After being informed that the Ute reservation embraces about 42,000,000 in Colorado, an area equal to the State of Massachusetts, Vermont, Rhode Island and Delaware.

The reporter inquired - How many Indians are there in Colorado? Judge Belford - Three thousand all told, and each buck, squaw and papoose, if the land were divided per capita, would receive 4,000. A white man in this country can take 100 acres, an Indian 4.000.

Reporter - What caused the outbreak in Colorado? Belford - Agent Meeker plowed two and a half acres of land out of the 12,000,000 and they murdered him for doing it. Reporter - The commissioner of Indian affairs says in his report that miners have made settlements on the Ute's reservation. Belford - That is not true. The statement is wholly without foundation, and I am surprised that the commissioner should have made it.

Reporter - Have the people of Colorado given the Utes any occasion for the late outbreak? Belford - None whatever. Mr. Schurz himself says the Indians were without excuse. Reporter - If the Indians are not removed, will there be trouble next Spring? Belford - I think so. This reservation embraces a valuable mineral land, and the Indians will not work it or allow any one else to do so. No government ever before allowed a large race to stand in the way of development of its mineral resources, and I don't think this nation will long continue to be the exception.

In the course of further conversation as to the policy that the government should pursue toward the Indians, Judge Belford expressed himself earnestly in favor of transferring the control of Indian affairs to the war department, and remarked, "We appropriate millions of dollars for their support. If we feed them there is no occasion for their hunting, and they should be starved. If they desire to hunt for pleasure they can use the bow and arrow. They kill game in Colorado for the sake of it, and trade the skins for Sharp's rifles, and with them kill the settlers." Oregonian.

On Umatilla reservation, for every head of a family there would be allowed them nearly 4,450 acres, and there is cultivated on an average for full grown locks, about one-fourth of an acre, the rest is kept by government to protect the timber and furnish pasture for the Indians stock. Ten miles in the place of all the Indians would be worth more to the country than all the Indians and teachers thrown in.

The greatest thing we know about the South is the increase of its production this year by 500,000 bales of cotton, 12,000,000 pounds of tobacco and 200,000 hogheads of sugar. The Springfield Republican says: "This increase has a total value of \$75,000,000, but at the same time it has cost every ounce of negro labor, the stalwarts say, is taken in current daily fare of the shotgun, the ax, and the bull whip."
