LIVERPOOL, Feb. 13.—The London correspondent of the Courier says: Assurance is given to me that the statement that it is the intention of Baroness Burlett to devote £2,500,000 to the amelioration of distress in Ireland is true. The money will be invested in the purchase of lands in the district of Connaught, county Galway, to be let on long leases, and at moderate rents.
