Overdoing the Pension Business.

and representatives are more discreet in their appropriations of the public money the pension business seems likely to break down of its own weight. The rate of appropriations for pensions is sufficiently enerous already, and yet is rapidly increasing every year. The increase in the amount appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1881, is \$3,038,000 over that for the present year. At the end of the present fiscal year the commissioner of pensions estimates that there will be 250,000 appliections for pensions pending and unacted upon. The pensioners upon the rolls to day number 241,755, so that the applicants even yet outnumber the actual beneficiaries. The pension roll was increased by 18,757 names during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1879, and at the same rate for next year it will be increased between 30,000 and 40,000 names, even without new legislation to increase it. As Senator Davis of [West Virginia has said, "Within the next decade, if the same rate of increase continues, the pension roll will be doubled, and it will require from \$60,000,000 to ated for pensions." It is submitted that for the entire annual expenses of the government during the first fifty years of our existence, including the cost of the war of 1812. The appropriation for pensions for the single year 1881 covers more money than the entire revolutionary pension roll from first to last. Between 1791 and 1860 the total appropriations for pension account were \$78,-602,925 Ol. Between 1791 and 1833 the same appropriations aggregated years we have paid \$234,169,522 42 for pensions, being more by \$13,000,000 praces, than was paid in all the previous years ments for pensions now amount to 15 per cent, of the entire revenue of the
