Ed "E. O."—Times are about as usual for this time of year. The present month has been favorable for farming. A good many of our farmers are doing well for the Spring. They are about a month earlier this Spring than they were last Spring, although we are having changeable weather; more frost and freezing than usual. Wheat is beginning to look well, notwithstanding the cold frosty nights. Stock are unusually poor; but not as great a loss in stock as was anticipated. One of our cattle buyers here, Mr. Wm. Shroeder, from Eastern Oregon, bought up quite a band of cattle and two year olds, during the past winter, of which the most of them were very poor. Many of them were sold to prevent losses to original owners, and the consequence is that Mr. Shroeder lost about 75 head, not having had to keep them after collecting their money. One store house is completed, and our new stock of goods will be here in a very few days. The business will be conducted by the Luthers from the same stand formerly owned by them. The present building is a good one. Mr. H. Walker, our former tailor, is now running the Cottage Grove Hotel. The right man in the right place. Another new dwelling under completion here in town. Supreme Court.

SALIDA, March 24, 1880.
Full bench court met at 1:30 o'clock P. M., a full bench being present excepting Judge David Coffman, plaintiff vs. William Robbins, defendant, appeal from Umatilla county. The court held on being called upon to settle the rights of the parties, both having appeared, and both having been injured, neither should recover damages, and the decree will be modified in this respect. Appellant will be entitled to costs in this case, and respondent in the circuit court.

Opinion by Boie, J.
Syllabus.—1. Where a stream of water which passes through the lands of different persons is divided by them by a grant agreement, and each party purports to divide and receive, and for his share of water such agreement will be enforced to a court of equity.

2. Where one buys land is presumed to buy with notice of the water rights in or on the premises.

3. When a stream of water flows through the lands of different persons in a well defined channel, the lower owner on the stream has a right to have the water flow through his lands undisturbed, except so far as the upper riparian owner may use the same for the use of his premises for domestic use and stock and for recoverable irrigation.
