Sperry went by the way of the Hopper in order to gather all the facts he could and will go to Salem, procure a requisition and then return.

SHOOTING AFFRAY.

We clip the following from the Standard:

From the Jacksonville Sentinel we learn that on Sunday afternoon an alteration took place between a Negro woman and John F. Earle, which the former was dangerously, if not fatally, shot. It seems that an electioneering party went up to Rafael's wine cellar about a half mile north of town, and while there's political discussion was between Earl and Montgomery, both having drank considerable wine. Montgomery wanted to fight Earl, to which the latter was unwilling to consent. Some of the party held Montgomery and Earl apart from his friends and pursued him. The other party, who were anxious to approach him, which was unadvised. Earl then Montgomery, inflicting a supposed mortal wound. Earl was arrested, and after an examination discharged, as it was proven that the shooting was done in self-defense. Montgomery was spoiling for a fight, and having had one, now pays the penalty of his long career of vice.

ANOTHER BRUTAL MURDER.

It is rumored that another murder has been added to the bloody list, already too long. This time it is reported that a young man, living at least twelve miles above Watsburg, Columbia county, W. T., whose name we were not able to learn, was murdered, and his body burned to hide the evidences of the crime. The unfortunate victim had come from California about a year ago and taken up a ranch, upon which he had built a house and was just on the point of getting married. On the 1st instant, while his friends disengaged, he caused a search to be instituted, and his charred bones were found under the remains of a pile of lumber, near his house, which had been burned. It is supposed the atrocious deed was done for money, as deceased was thought to have had a considerable sum in his possession. It is believed that the guilty parties are known.
