The Republican party has now been in power for 20 years, and when we look back over the history it has made us find it proud with fraud and corruption. History no where records such gigantic swindles in official circles as have grown up under Republican power. Revenue frauds, Credit Mobilier and DeGolyer pavement swindles, St. Domingo rings, railroad and public land steals, Electoral Commissioners, organized for the purpose of swindling the people out of their rightfully elected President, and a thousand other political monstrosities have grown up since the national power passed out of the hands of the Democracy. The people are growing sick and tired of such work and are clamoring for a change, and if Democrats are vigilant there will be no doubt about the result of the election this fall.

The Republican party has been in power long enough. Old chronic liars on have been mustered by the party until it is impossible for honest men in that party to get into office. These old chronic liars have had hold of the public seat so long that they refuse to let go, and are so well organized and have such control over the party machinery that there is no way of getting rid of them except by defeating the party which has long since outlived its usefulness. We feel assured that the people will see to it that Hancock is elected, and if elected, inaugurated. But Democrats, a great work is before you. We have an unscrupulous and wily enemy to combat. All the tricks of politics are well known to these wire pullers, and new ones are being invented.

No one who has taken any pains to inform himself in the political affairs of this State doubts for a moment that a fraud was practiced on the voters four years ago and in the late election. We have taken some pains to investigate, as far as we could, and from the evidence before us are satisfied that the ballot boxes were stuffed in many places by unscrupulous judges of election, and that it was done by the use of false keys prepared especially for that purpose and used while the board had adjourned for dinner. In Republican counties, of course, two of the judges were Republicans, and one of them selected with that object in view, as we believe retired with the box, while perhaps the key is given to the Democratic member of the board. We trust that this matter will be looked after at the approaching election and avoid every chance or possibility of any such trickery. The legislature should provide some remedy to prevent such frauds, and, although it is Republican, we trust it will be fair enough to do so.

That Division Line.

The organ of the Division faction—self styled "party"—has come out with its columns half-filled with the proceedings of the "Pendleton Convention," and congratulates the people upon its having humbugged them to the extent of having the Western Ring line adopted by the "Convention." Now to the people of the county at large, and particularly to those living in the extremes of the county, we would explain the attitude of this precinct at least upon the question.

While the late canvass of the county for the June election was in progress the candidates of the Democratic party upon the stump and the EAST OREGONIAN announced to the people of the county the position of the Democratic voters upon this subject—that we favored the division of Umatilla into three counties, provided it was the wish of the majority of the people in the county that such division should be had. The Divisionists announced that they would divide into three counties whether the majority wished it or not. So stood the case.

Some time after the election, to show that we were sincere in our declarations, the voters of this precinct went so far as to hold a meeting and make a proposition for holding a mass meeting of citizens from all parts of the county to consult upon the question of the lines for division. Soon afterwards Mr. George Hayes and another from Weston visited us and amended our resolution so as to provide for a convention of delegates from the various precincts of the county, to which no one should be admitted as a member unless he had been regularly elected in his precinct primary and that no proxies should be allowed. This was acceded to and the day fixed for the 10th of July. On the day preceding, a meeting of the voters of Pendleton precinct was held in the court house—Judge LaDow being called to the chair. After a statement of the object of the meeting had been made it was moved "that we send delegates to the convention to be held on the succeeding day with instructions that they should enter into the deliberations of the body at delegates upon the sole condition that there was a full representation from all the precincts in the county present. Otherwise they might use their own pleasure as to consulting with individuals with those who might be present to attend the meeting." This motion was carried unanimously and Jerry De-

Spain, S. L. Morse, J. H. Turner, Wm. Matlock, L. Blum, T. M. Markey, and J. W. Ellis were elected to represent this precinct. When the meeting was organized on the next day there was found to be but three precincts besides this regularly represented and six with no representation at all. Greenwood had refused to send delegates and was represented by volunteers—Alta and Heppner being represented by one outsider each in place of a delegation of six. They went into consultation and a committee was appointed to report a line; which committee failing to agree, a proposition was made in the convention for a line dividing the county into two and this by the votes of two of the Milton delegates, against the known wishes of their constituents, was adopted by a vote of 16 to 14.

This is a statement of the case and now we would say to the voters of the county, speaking for this precinct, that whenever there is a proposition presented for a division of the county into three respecting the interests of all sections, and this was the only cry heard during the late canvass, we will give it our support should it meet the wishes of the majority of the voters of the county. But we say plainly that as to this measure, which is a detriment and inconvenience to everyone and a benefit to none but the Western Ring Masters and which was only passed by the treachery of two of the delegates to that convention, we know full well that this is not what the people of the county want, we are in no wise committed to it, we shall not support it but on the contrary we shall do everything in our power to defeat it—retaining our assurance that when any just and reasonable measure for a division is presented we shall be the last ones to oppose it.

So stands the matter in this precinct. In the above we assume to speak for the Democratic voters of the precinct in so far as politics has any connection with the matter and have no doubt but the Tribune will speak in like strain for the Republicans.

Sons of Light is the name of a secret anti-Catholic, anti-religious party or society now being organized in our midst. The ostensible object of the society is opposition to the Roman Catholic Church. We are no Catholics, neither do we sympathize with that faith, but we do oppose any secret organization, gotten up to persecute any religious denomination or creed. Let every man "worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience" and "let none dare molest or make him afraid." The people of the United States are too much divided in their religious faith and opinions ever to create any necessity for any such move as is proposed by the Sons of Light. The Roman Catholic Church would, perhaps, if it was clothed with power, cause us all to bow to its shrine; as would the Methodist, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Baptist or any other of the 1001 different churches. The Jewish church would do the same, Spiritualism would not be found wanting in persecution. Such is the lesson taught by the history of the world. But this organization is gotten up for an entirely different purpose, as we have good reasons to believe. Major (T) Sherman is now in Pendleton, organizing a club or lodge or whatever it is called. Several have invested in the enterprise and no doubt there will be men enough induced to take stock to get up a society here. To our Democratic friends we would say look out, it is just before an important election and the object of this move is to get votes for Garfield. It is simply the old known nothing party revived, leaving the prescription of foreigners out. The thing is a fraud on its face if only examined. Where is the evidence that the Roman Catholic Church are endeavoring to capture this government and convert it into a politico-religious institution? None can be found. Catholics are as loyal to our institutions as are Methodists, Baptists or any other religious denominations. In fact we believe if any difference, the Catholic clergy interfere with politics less than any other. Then this cry is all both and the "Sons of Light" is an institution gotten up for some other purpose, as we think will be seen at an early day. Quite a number of our Democratic friends have been approached on the subject and asked to join. We hope, however, but few have been caught. Let the thing alone—severely alone—it is a fraud and those who join it will find it out when the business is turned over to the Garfield interest. This is not the first we have heard of this thing, and it will not be the last we will be able to give our readers. We are making arrangements to publish, for the benefit of all, some of the secret history and workings of the institution, provided we succeed in getting hold of it. We have been advised not to say anything about this matter in our columns and informed that it would be to our interest not to do so, but we propose to attend to our own business and conduct the EAST OREGONIAN to suit ourselves. Those that don't like it can take some other journal, as we are only running the paper for fun and finances.

The Turning of the Political Tide.

(St. Louis Republican.)

A Republican club of sixty-five voters, met last night at the corner of Fifth and Myrtle streets, Edward Crowley in the chair, and adopted the following significant resolutions:

WHEREAS, The Republican party has seen fit to nominate a man for the Presidency in whose integrity we have no confidence and who we believe has no abiding interest in the welfare of the nation only so far as it can minister to his paltry personal ambition; and

WHEREAS, The Democratic party has placed in nomination for the same office a man of integrity, ability and courage; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we, a band of candid Republicans, who believe in adhering to the true principles upon which our Republic can form of government was founded, have served our conviction with that party governed by rings and cliques, and cheerfully pledge ourselves to support the candidacy of Hancock and English during the ensuing campaign, and promise to use all honorable means to ensure their triumph at the coming election.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to Gen. Hancock, the next President of the United States, to W. H. English, the next Vice President, and to the various military organizations throughout the State of Missouri.

They are Going Over.

Hamilton Fish, Grant's Secretary of State, has declared for Hancock, Gen. Pearson of Pennsylvania follows suit, Hon. Frederick A. Conkling, brother of the Senator, is President of a Hancock and English Club in New York, J. H. Bryant, brother of the poet, presided over a Hancock ratification meeting in Illinois, and J. T. Clark made a speech in favor of our ticket—both having been heretofore life long Republicans. Col. Tom Scott has fallen into line, and thus is the campaign progressing. Not a day passes without such marked accessions to our ranks, not to mention the numberless recruits of lesser note, and who have heard of a desertion to Garfield from the Democratic ranks. Such moves in a section where both men are best known are significant, and the Rev. DeGolyer begins to excite our sympathies for fear he will not be able to master a corporal's guard by election day.

"The Indian Wards."

(From the Yakima Record.)

Such is the caption of a large portion of Hayes' Message to Congress. Like previous documents upon the same subject there are no new ideas advanced, but he clings to the same old groove of Utopian phantasies and pious frauds. He seems to entertain the foolish idea that an Indian need only be held to pursue a certain course and he will do it. But the absurd idea which he advances that a few Indians now being educated at the expense of the Government in Oregon and Virginia are to be the means of eventually civilizing the whole Indian race sounds to us much like the tales of Muncie's. Our people know, and so does any man of common practical sense who ever had any dealings with the race, that no Indian of his own free will ever followed the pursuits of a civilized life. He is a treacherous animal, lazy and will not work except when forced. His ancestors for countless ages have pursued the same course, and an old proverb can be aptly applied to his case in this respect: "What is bred in the bone is sure to come out." With other mean traits which the Indian possesses, he is naturally low and cunning, possessing a depth of sullenness which enables him to guard his own weakness from hostile observation, the race as a whole is indolent, dishonest, and without any inducement to pursue a civilized life. There is only one way to civilize an Indian, and that is to render him exceedingly "good" in the Western sense of the term. Do away entirely with the system of feeding, clothing and educating the race at Government expense, make them amenable to the same laws as the whites, let them go to work or starve, and how soon would this lazy question be solved. All the schools in the world would not civilize the Indian and his thrifless vagabonds. Our people and the great Northwest, therefore, look upon the sentiment advanced by Hayes as so much pious trash.

Indian Citizenship.

In prevailing upon Indians to take home-steads and strive to live like citizens, some difficulty is experienced in making them, and while understood that by so doing the Indian does not become a citizen. The difficulty arises from the fact that the declaration made by the Indian, that he has abandoned his tribal relations and adopted the habits and customs of civilized life, and the corroborative evidence required by law, are commonly called, without reference to the propriety of the term "Indian citizen papers;" while in fact they are simply evidences of the Indians' desire to try and live like a white man.

Last April, in the case of the United States vs. Frank Osburn, a case in which the right of an Indian to become a citizen was raised, Judge Deady, of the U. S. District Court for Oregon, held that there was no law of the United States which made Indians citizens. He said:

"There appears to be an impression that Indians, situated as Jim and Joe are, that is, who live off the reservation and among and move or live about the manner of white people, are citizens and voters of the State, and therefore it is no crime to give them spirituous liquors. But this is a mistake. The Indians are not a portion of the political community called the 'People of the United States.' And, although not foreign nations or persons, they have always been regarded and treated as distinct and independent political communities. An Indian cannot make himself a citizen of the United States without the consent and cooperation of the Government. The fact that he has abandoned his nomadic life or tribal relations and adopted the habits and manners of civilized people, may be a good reason why he should be made a citizen of the United States, but does not, of itself, make him one. To be a citizen of the United States is a political privilege, which no one not born to can assume, without its consent in some form. The Indians in Oregon not being born subject to the jurisdiction of the United States, were not born citizens thereof, and I am not aware of any law or treaty by which any of them have been made so since."
