A SAD BUT TRUE REPORT.—We give in our last issue a hasty account of the report of the drowning of Ed. (properly George) Shannon, a stage-driver, in the John Day's country. We regret to announce that the sad news is true, though his body has not, we believe, been recovered. The casualty happened in what is known as 'Dry Gulch,' in Spanish Hollow, beyond the Deschutes. The crossing, as the name implies, is usually the dry bed of a stream, but the great rains had made it a roaring torrent. Shannon, as before reported, evidently attempted to swim the stream on one of the horses and peck the mall across, but from some unknown cause, got unhorsed and was swept away and drowned; the mall also being lost. The horse he attempted to cross on was found on the opposite side of the stream from the stage and the remaining three of the team with only the bridge and collar on. The treasure box of Wells, Fargo & Co. was found caked under a rock, where Shannon had evidently concealed it. Great solicitude was for a time occasioned here among the numerous friends of John Halsey, Jr. on account of a rumor that he was with Shannon and had shared his fate, but we are happy to be able to pronounce this a mistake, as John is now in the Dallas safe.
