

OPPRESSING THE JEWS.

A short time since a paragraph was current in the press describing the quarter assigned in modern Rome for the occupation of the Jews. Of late years the barbarous intolerance which compelled the Jews of Rome to reside in the noisome pile of ancient buildings known as the Ghetto, and its surrounding dwellings was relaxed, and the Ghetto was soon vacated for more healthful and pleasant quarters. Since then, this monument of ancient bigotry has been condemned and is to be removed to make way for improvements. While thus the dictates of reason, humanity and justice were asserting their sway, all the old-time cruel disabilities and unjust restrictions were being removed from the descendants of Israel. Suddenly and most unexpectedly a backward step was taken. Intelligence came from Germany that a number of persons had conceived a dislike for the Jews. It declared that their presence was injurious, and proceeded to petition the authorities that steps be taken in some way to limit or discourage the increase of Jews in Russia, with much more to that effect. The petition was presented, but no action taken on it. Since then an occasional item would appear, of some actions proceedings, against the Jews, but of little importance. Therefore, it was giving way to common sense, and unreasoning dislike to fairness and justice. Late telegrams, however, bring the intelligence of the disease or mania breaking out over in Russia, where some superstitious fanatics attacked the Jews while celebrating the ancient festival of the Passover. The dispatches state that one wretched man fell a victim to the fury of the misguided populace, and a number of others were injured, besides considerable property destroyed. Reading these occurrences would almost make one think that the black pall of the dark ages was again to be thrown over the civilization of the day. However, though the civilization of Ancient Rome, Greece and Alexandria was almost extinguished during the somber nightshade which enveloped Europe during the dark ages, it is not probable that bigotry and superstition will again accomplish another such conquest. The world is too far advanced and men are being judged for what they are, not for what their fathers were.

DISPATCHES FROM Washington, bearing date of the 16th, containing the startling intelligence that the two Senators from New York, Roscoe Conkling and T. C. Platt, have sent in their resignations as United States Senators. This fact assumes great importance when it is remembered that this gives the Senate into the hands of the Democrats until the New York legislature either re-elects Conkling and Platt or their successors. The telegraph says the double resignations fills the city with excitement. Senators refuse to talk and evidently feel that the crisis has been reached. When Blaine heard the news he turned ashy pale and was speechless for some time. These resignations will bring the issue squarely between Garfield and Conkling. If the New York legislature re-elects Platt and Conkling, they will go to the Senate prepared to fight the Administration to the bitter end on every point.

In reply to a report that the O. R. & N. Co. had bought the stock owned by President Billings in the N. P. R. R. Co., Mr. Villard in conversation with a reporter of the New York Evening Post, on the 14th, paid the following deserved compliment to President Billings: "While it is true that negotiations have been progressing between the two bodies with a view to a mutually satisfactory arrangement, no agreement has yet been reached. The published version of details of the proposed agreement is incorrect in the most essential particulars. No officer of the O. R. & N. Co., except myself, has been cognizant of the details of negotiations. I deem it due to President Billings to state that there has been no desire on my part to bring about his retirement or that of a majority of the present board of directors. On the contrary I have myself offered to Billings support all of the stock I represent, as I deem it of vital importance that one so long identified with the enterprise should continue in his position. I would add that in the present as in former negotiations Billings has acted with the utmost loyalty, both to the interests of the Northern Pacific railroad company and to those who have been associated with him so long in his management. He has always subordinated his personal interests to the protection of what he considered to be the interests of the company, and he has steadily insisted that in an agreement between the two parties the first consideration should be a policy that would assure him the best prosperity of the company, before even considering personal questions."

SENATOR EDMUNDS created quite an excitement at a session of the Republican caucus on the 14th inst. in a speech on the consideration of the nomination of Wm. E. Chandler as Attorney General. He declared that Chandler was not a lawyer, that he was a bold unscrupulous lobbyist, a man of ability, but notorious for his close relations with nearly every prominent jobholder before Congress. Edmunds declared that if Chandler was confirmed he would resign as chairman of the judiciary committee. The Democratic Senators are solidly opposed to confirmation.

THE postal frauds have thrown the dead-lock somewhat in the shade, and is now the all-absorbing topic. Ex-Senator Dorsey, one of the Republican leaders and chairman of the National Committee is inextricably entangled and every day bring out the names of men high in the Nation's confidence, who are connected with the affair. It promises to surpass the Credit Mobilier or whisky steal.

THE third annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Press Association will be in San Francisco Tuesday June 7th. We acknowledge the receipt of an invitation to attend.

Speaking of the recent postal "star route" funds, the New York Times says: "When Brady was assured that Princeton, Wasco county, Oregon, with a population of 150 people and a steady increase every day was exiled a distance of 120 miles from any place of note, he easily proved the necessities of a daily mail from the Dalles and proceeded to provide it. So urgent was the case that he felt justified in paying \$17,000 a year additional to a contractor, accepting as one of his bondsmen DeWitt Clinton Wheeler, of this city, then or shortly after confessed bankrupt. When petitions for expedition over the daily line came the clerk reported that the net revenue at Princeton was \$263."

James E. Bourne, an old and highly respected citizen of Walla Walla died at this residence at that place last Friday.

C. D. Burkhardt an old and esteemed resident of Lion county, died at his home near Albany last week at the age of 60.

The Albany Exchange Hotel, Portland, was damaged by fire last Sunday morning to the extent of \$3,000; covered by insurance.

A man named Simon shot and instantly killed his brother-in-law, Carter at Cedarville, Lake county, last week. The row was some family trouble.

Mr. Studebaker of South Bend, Indiana, and maker of the wagon of his name, is in Portland, and intends to visit Eastern Oregon before his return.

S. H. McLaughlin, who has the contract for carrying the mail between Weston and Summerville is going to put on a stage line for passengers between those two points.

W. H. Odell, State Printer, laid down one day last week and went into a trance remaining in that condition 52 hours. He was alone in the house during the entire time.

Louis Behrens a brakeman on the O. & C. R. E., was caught under the wheels Sunday morning at Salem and instantly killed. He was 19 years old and had relatives in Eugene.

While Marshall Tanner and H. G. Baley were chopping wood near Jacksonville recently, the latter's ax slipped and struck Tanner on the right shoulder inflicting an ugly wound.

J. W. Stevens shot and killed Hon. J. M. Hedrick, on the Potlatch, Idaho Territory, last week. They had a quarrel about a money settlement and Hedrick tried to obtain the money by force.

Charles Evans, a conductor on the N. P. R. R. had both legs broken below the knees last week while engaged in coupling cars. It was his first trip as conductor, having been a brakeman several months.

The peril of salmon fishing this season have been somewhat remarkable. Not a week has passed without its record of fatality on the Columbia river. Last week one of the Occident Packing Co.'s boats was capsized near Fort Conby and the boat-puller Andrew Haake, formerly of Vancouver, was drowned.
