SOME FOR WHEAT.—Jerry Despain has left with "Uncle George Webb" a bunch of wheat, grown to all appearance from a single grain, which we will pit against any other man's bunch in the State of Oregon or elsewhere. Our bunch contains 132 stalks each bearing a full head of wheat. What was taken to be an average head shell out 63 well developed kernels—hence that mother grain has yielded 8316 fold. A finer specimen both in quality and quantity we have never seen. This wheat was raised on Mr. Despain's ranch four miles from Pendleton.

RAILROAD NOTES.—The force of workmen employed on the Pendleton section of the O. R. & N. Co. road having completed their work of grading have been transferred to the Dallas division. Rock workers are blasting away the obstruction at Jerry Barnhart's ranch, seven miles below Pendleton, and when this is accomplished the grading will be completed between the latter point and Umatilla. The forces will then all be transferred to the upper route and the road completed from Dayton, W. T. to Grange City, after which the track will be laid from Umatilla to Pendleton and the road put into active operation.

LUMBER! LUMBER!—On our recent trip to the John Day country we crossed the mountains wherein are situated the numerous sawmills which are so rapidly building up our town and the surrounding country. One of the nearest to our line of march, although we could not visit it, was that of Messrs. Shull & Bean. We learn that these gentlemen are doing a business second to no man who ever undertook to saw lumber. They have the nearest and most accessible mill to Pendleton and this portion of the country, have built a fine road leading up to it and are cutting out from 10,000 to 12,000 feet a day. They supply J. H. Sharon & Co. regularly with a large amount of lumber but have lots more of it on hand to sell to all that thirst.

EXCELSIOR.—Pendleton to the front! We venture to say there is no town of its size on the northwest Pacific Coast that is making anything like the rapid progress that Pendleton is. Two large brick yards were established here last spring and have been steadily at work but cannot grind out building material fast enough to supply the demand. Alexander & Frazer are now building a large brick mercantile establishment. Wm. Switzer is building a warehouse which will be occupied by Mr. J. M. Lezer of Umatilla, as a tin-shop and hardware establishment as soon as completed. W. F. Matlock is building one alongside. G. W. Webb & Son have erected a large frame building south of town which they will use temporarily in their business while a brick building is built on their present location—this will commence in a few weeks now. Dusebury Bros. of Walla Walla and San Francisco will build a brick on Main St. in September and open a large store, while Mr. L. Blum and several others, we understand, will brick themselves at an early date. In short the fever for brick buildings is as catching as the California gold fever in '49 and the result is that Pendleton will soon exchange ordinary wooden houses for substantial brick edifices in all business portions of the town. The tide of immigration sets in as hotly and eagerly as the Israelites rushed into the Promised Land after they had emerged from the wilderness. Switzer's Addition on the north side of the river has three new houses now building and quite a town will soon spring up there.

FOUND.—Tom Hopper last week advertised three horses in the E. O. that had been lost two months. After one insertion he ordered it discontinued as he had recovered his property. HELIX, July 21st, 1881. EDITOR E. O.—I see a letter from Sage Brush Flat from Mr. Acorn, whose he gives vent to his feelings, because he can't have a road across every man's farm in the county. If we have to give every man a road, we had better give it all and be done with it. It costs something to fence a half mile or a mile of road. I am not surprised at Acorn's laying out all night on the road from Pendleton or any other town. I suppose Mr. Acorn will soon put some plan on foot to fence Cold Spring or Greenwood, if he does not get his road.

FROM CAMAS PRAIRIE. EDITOR E. O.—Farmers are busy hay ing, hounding and preparing for Winter. Six immigrants wagons arrived from California last week. We give them a hearty welcome and hope after remaining here for a while they may be better satisfied than they seem to be at present. We know all about the beauties and fascinations of California, and sympathize with them accordingly.

There are many warm-hearted, whole-souled people in Eastern Oregon, and next summer will not have to remain here long to find them out. On the 15th, at the residence of Elder Gilliam, Mr. Beasley of Beasley's mill, and M. S. Bartholomew, a clearing of Camas Prairie (recently from Kansas) were married. We understand they will please their friends at the hot springs by making their appearance among them this week. May every thing good, pleasant and agreeable attend their path way.

We are glad to hear again from your lady correspondent from Little Butte Creek—Merry loves company—and we too have been laboring under disadvantages, but they are beginning to disappear. "Like mist before the sun" I have no complaint to make about the energy of the people. Few of them have been here longer than a year and could not be expected to accomplish much in so short a time. We now have quite a large force for the country, and who have a past office as well as official position. Two head of cattle have been ordered and a third is contemplated. Sabbath school is kept up regularly. Preaching every fortnight. We don't believe there is another settlement anywhere that could have done more in a short time.

Most of the people living here contemplate raising stock of some kind. Everything in that line is well here. Hens are plentiful in this vicinity this season. The boys here have been ordered and the whole flock. There are two we hope they will let live if they ever see a fair appearance in Camas Prairie, for they are badly needed here. They are heard of no more.

What has become of you brave Monitor House, Robert Bruce, etc., will we hear from them no more. LAC.

VAN DYKE, July, 1881. ED. E. O.—The short nights and long days are the only excuse we have for our non-appearance lately. We thought we would drop a few lines about the "fourth," as we always take an interest in the way the boys enjoy themselves on that glorious day. Of course the attempted assassination of the President marred the celebration of the day to a great extent, but some of the boys seemed to enjoy themselves very well considering the circumstances. We noticed "Billy" and "Frank" as they started to the two W. W.'s looking extremely happy. We will not try to describe how the fair ones looked—as Shakespeare says, "It's idle to gild refined gold or paint the lily." We don't know what the hard meat but Billy knows. There was a certain limb of the law from Pendleton (we don't know his name and would not give it if we did) who seemed to be getting away with some of the boys.
