

CORRESPONDENCE.

VAN DYKE, Oct. 13, 1881. EDITOR E. O.—Mr. Villard said last week that he would see that all the wheat taken away from the several stations along the line of the railroad as fast as delivered this year. Mr. Villard has not kept his promise in this matter. Perhaps he estimated the wheat crop of this county a little too low, as all stations along the line are filled up and agents refuse to receive or receipt for more wheat. All space along the line of the switch at Cummings Station is piled up with wheat sacks seven high and farmers have commenced to pile up on the ground and take chances on much of it being damaged, besides having to pay three cents extra to have it put on the cars. This is a bad state of affairs. At present there is not more than one-half the good wheat land in cultivation and the railroad can't take the crop away. What may we expect in five years from now when there will be double the amount to export?

What we need is the opening of the Columbia river at the Cascades, then with free navigation we will have free transportation to the sea which is nature's highway and cannot be controlled by land sharks. If we had free navigation on the Columbia river what would be worth seventy-five cents instead of sixty-four per bushel—the latter figure is the price at Cummings Station now.
