REPORT OF GRAND JURY.

To Hon. L. L. McARTHUR, Judge of Circuit Court of Umatilla County: We the Grand Jury for the present term of Court beg leave to report that we have found nine true bills of indictment and seven not true bills.

We have had complaints made to us of our County Court appropriating county funds for the building of bridges where no county road had been established. We have examined the County Clerk's books and find them without blot or error. In fact a model set of county records and books. We would suggest the propriety of a new cement floor, also a new door for the vault as soon as convenient. We have found the Treasurer's books in good order and so far as we have been able to ascertain correctly and honestly kept. Have examined the jail and find the building very clean, warm and in fine condition, also the prisoners have been kindly and properly cared for. Have examined the Sheriff's books and they appear to be properly kept and we have no suggestions to offer.

We would most respectfully call the attention of Justices of the Peace to the evil of blind men to appear before the grand jury without sufficient evidence to sustain an action, also not placing the bonds of those who are held to answer at a sum sufficient to warrant the appearance. Permit us to say in conclusion that we disposed of all the business coming before us to the best of our ability and sense of justice, and have endeavored to act consistently with the law and charge given us when sworn in, and with all the dispatch a full consideration of the business would permit. Some of these investigations have been long and tedious as they involved the liberty of individuals and the interests and safety of the citizens of this county.

We have concluded our business and beg to be discharged. We desire, however, to return thanks to Mr. D. W. Bailey, our District Atty., for uniform kindness and prompt attention, all of which is respectfully submitted.

EDITOR E. O.—When we penned our last communication the date was Dec. 30th, 1881, but 1881 is gone and gone forever. What is done is done, and done past recall. As 1882 approached the merchant took an invoice of his goods, the banker balanced his accounts and the commercial world generally looked over accounts to ascertain what the profit or loss might have been in 1881. The year has been a prosperous one in this country the north-western country to the farming interest and when the farmer and stock raiser are well remunerated all other branches of business are stimulated to new life and activity, for the farmers and producers are to all others what the springs in the mountains are to the river—its source from which they draw their sustenance.

It is true there has been a great deal of money spent in this country the last year by the railroad people. Now who induced this outside capital to come here? Was it our local bankers, or in other and more appropriate words our Shylocks, that paved the way for railroad construction? We think not—it was the pioneer farmer. We said "Shylocks," and now ask could the original exacter of the "pound of flesh" draw his bond more binding than the Scotch Company does which is loaning money in this county on the following terms: We will say A. B. wants to make final proof on his pre-emption claim and makes that fact known to the agent of the company. The agent will say "all right I will loan you \$500 for five years and take a mortgage on the land with interest at twelve per cent." This seems all very well, but when A. B. makes his proof the agent will take his note (an iron clad one) for \$500 and give him \$400 in surveyor's script (its cash value being about \$360) and this with \$40 in coin is all the the money poor A. B. gets. Reader, please notice it takes \$60 to pay the extra interest on the money for five years. The note we have reference to was given before the ten per cent law was enacted, so it will be seen the Shylocks received at the rate of nearly one and one half per cent counting the \$40

off, on script. Helping the farmers, aint it?

A public officer's conduct is open to public criticism, so we propose to tell our assessors what others think of him, or in other words we would like it if he could "see himself as others see him." We have talked to many of our neighbors and some who could not properly be called such, because they live as much as thirty miles from here. All have the same story in regard to our assessor, viz: That he is a man without accommodation or qualification for the office he fills.
