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A FORGER CAUGHT

PASSED A CHECK FOR \$2250 AT WESTON.

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BARBED WIRE TELEPHONES.

Umatilla County Has the Longest System in the State.

Umatilla county has one of the longest barbed wire telephone systems in the state. It reaches from Pendleton to the head of the Cold Springs, almost 20 miles.

It was inaugurated during the past summer and worked to perfection until wet weather set in, when some trouble was experienced. While it is not impossible to talk over this line covered with snow as it was a few days this week, it is impossible under such conditions to carry on conversation.

Water is a good conductor of electricity, and when the ice coats of wire are covered with snow the electricity is carried into the ground instead of over the wires.

Another difficulty with the barbed wire system is its tendency to cause sparks. It takes very little to cause trouble. A crossed wire completely cuts off the circuit and any object lying over the wire impedes a conversation.

LATE WHEAT NOT UP.

Farmers Fear That the Seed Will Rot Owing to the Unusual Amount of Wet Weather.

Some farmers who were persistent in sowing their wheat this fall and put it in the ground late are now wondering if they will have to re-sow. The town is full of farmers who are in conversation with them many express themselves as being afraid that the late sown wheat would never sprout.

Wheat that was sown early in the season is up nicely and a good stand is reported, but this is a very small amount of the whole. Most of the wheat that was sown late is now in the wet fall and a great deal has not yet come through the ground. Fear is entertained that it will rot before it sprouts.

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WHEAT IS CORNERED.

If December Wheat is Held at Chicago It Will Affect the Coast Market.

The probable market value of wheat at the close of December is as problematical as that of a "dollar" in the Orient. The present uncertainty as to developments in the wheat situation up to the close of the month is a source of much regret to the holders of wheat in the Orient.

One hand, there are those who predict a slump, on the ground that millers are in a position to buy wheat at a low price, and on the other, a sky-scraping market, due to a corner in December, is held to be a probability amounting to a certainty. The result is that conservative growers are covered with snow and electricity is carried into the ground instead of over the wires.

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
