The law provides that the commissioner shall have power to make, under the power of the secretary, "diligent investigation into the organization, concourts and prosecuting attorneys and duct and management of the business of any corporation, joint stock company or corporate combination engaged in commerce among the several states and with foreign nations, except in the common carriers subject o 'an act to regulate commerce,' aproved February 4, 1887, and to gathenable the president to make recommendations for legislation for the regniation of such commerce, and to report such data to the president from time to time as he shall require."
