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REPORT OF MILES

Hints That American Army Officers Have Been Cruel and Inhuman.

CONDEMNNS CONCENTRATION CAMPS IN PHILIPPINES.

Islands Have Been Devastated and the Natives Are Much Depressed—Prominent Citizens Complain of Harsh Treatment.

Washington, April 27.—Part of General Miles' special report, based on his recent inspection of the Philippines, was made public today.

It hints that the army officers resorted to cruel and inhuman torture of the natives and the concentration camps are condemned.

Attention is called to the sale of food to the natives confined there at good profit. Some portions of the island traversed appeared to be devastated and the natives are depressed.

He heard complaints of prominent citizens concerning the harsh treatment. They told Gen. Miles that they had been concentrated in towns and had suffered great indignities.

They also reported that 15 of their people had been tortured by the water cure and one man was burned to death. These atrocities Miles was told, were committed by a company of scouts under Lieutenant Hennessey.

Many Died of Suffocation. Citizens claimed that in one concentration island 600 were crowded into one building. A physician said he was ready to testify that many died of suffocation.

Annulled Court Orders. In order to correct such erroneous and dangerous impressions and to prevent such acts in the future, he addressed to the division commander virtually an order dated February 28, calling attention to the reports of atrocities and directing that any orders or circulars of personal instruction which would inspire or encourage any act of cruelty to be immediately annulled.

Judge Advocate General Davis, in a letter to the secretary of war, replied to the acts complained of in Miles' report and says the incidents have been made a subject of special investigations. In some instances by court-martial, whose orders have all been annulled.

The Moro Question. In that part of the report devoted to the Moro question he says the problem of control is not apparently difficult. He says the insurgents are poorly armed and have no means of withstanding mounted artillery and field mortars.

He made a personal inspection of the scene of hostilities around Lake Lanao, and found that the forts have very slight resistance powers. He advises the establishment of permanent stations there at strategic points and objects to the employment of American soldiers in road making without extra compensation.

Summing up the observations throughout the island he comments upon the unhealthy condition, as setting that very few escape the debilitating effects of the climate. He complains of the attitude upon their earnestness and faithfulness and regards the discontinuance of the liquor as a bad feature, as he thinks the can- tans are benefited.

Evidence of Hostility. "While it is claimed," he says, "that the people are pacified, evidence of hostility toward American sovereignty is apparent. Daily accounts are received of detentions, hostilities and disturbances."

He severely criticizes the occupancy of the churches by troops and recommends that at least one church in the vicinity of Manila be fortified beyond the possibility of capture by a foreign fleet. Much space is devoted to the impoverished condition of the natives by reason of war, pestilence and famine, which he thinks should receive immediate and serious consideration. He further recommends that the transports be utilized in carrying corn and wheat from the Pacific coast for the relief of the Philippines.

FEARED THE MAFIA. Coroner Has Hard Time Getting Jury to Hold Inquest of Madonia. New York, April 27.—Fear of violence at the hands of the Mafia caused a general disappearance of the coroner's jury which was to hold an inquest this morning into the death of Madonia, whose body was found in a barrel and for whose murder 12 Italians were held. When the coroner called the cases at strategic points, only a few jurors were present. It was learned that over half of them disappeared when they learned that they were expected to serve on a Mafia case. The case was adjourned until this afternoon.

New York Labor Situation. New York, April 27.—A cessant of the labor situation makes it appear that there will be no strikes here May 1. The labor situation is more peaceful than it has been for years.

Severous trouble is brewing in labor circles in Sumpter over the boycotting of places hiring Chinese and Japanese.

SAYS GOD HELPED HER FORECLOSE A MORTGAGE.

Richest Woman in America Attributes Success in Suit Against a Church to Aid From Divine Being.

Chicago, April 27.—A dispatch to the Inter-Ocean from New York says: Mrs. Hettie Green has appeared in the supreme court in Brooklyn as the defendant in a suit brought against her by Abner L. Lutz, an administrator of her husband's estate. The suit was to recover about \$10,000 commissions for the alleged sale of bonds to the Inter-Ocean.

Before Justice Gaylor, and when the plaintiff failed to appear Justice Gaylor dismissed the complaint. "God seems to bless me in my suits in court," said Mrs. Green before she left the courtroom. "I had a case in Chicago, where, as administratrix of an estate, I sued a Presbyterian church to foreclose a mortgage. They tried to freeze me out, and even the ministers preached against me, but before I got through with them I managed to get \$1,000 more than I asked for in the first place."

WAS UNSUCCESSFUL. Russian Ambassador to Turkey Failed to Impose Russian Will in Regard to Balkans.

Berlin, April 27.—A Constantinople correspondent of the Tagblatt says the recall of Russian Ambassador Sinovieff may occur in the near future, due to his lack of success in imposing the Russian will on Turkey, relative to the Balkan reform.

Takes Tyner's Place. Washington, April 27.—Charles Robb, assistant attorney-general of Vermont, was this morning appointed assistant attorney general for the postoffice department, vice General Tyner, who was summarily dismissed on the ground that his wife had abstracted official papers from his department.

French Commissioners Arrive. New York, April 27.—Six members of the French commission to the St. Louis exposition arrived here today on the liner Gargonne. They include several architects.

Going to Rome. Naples, April 27.—King Edward left for Rome today aboard the royal yacht. All ships in the bay joined in a farewell salute to his majesty.

ARE DISFRANCHISED ASSESSMENT BASIS

SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS THE LOWER COURT.

By This Decision the Treatment of the Negroes' Franchise is Left to the State Department With Opinion.

Washington, April 27.—The supreme court of the United States today in the case of the negroes of Montgomery county, Alabama, who complain under the new constitution their names were not registered on the voting list thus excluding the black race from voting, declared that the circuit court was right in dismissing their bill. By this decision the treatment of the negroes' franchise is left to the state department.

Harlan Dissented. The opinion of the court was read by Justice Holmes. He was followed by Justice Harlan, who delivered a strong dissenting opinion. The majority opinion of the court held that it would be an unheard of and extraordinary extension of the equitable law to political matters. Brewer, representing his own views and those of the dissenting majority, declared that the circuit court was right in dismissing their bill. The case should have been remanded for further trial.

PAYS HIGH COMPLIMENT TO J. STERLING MORTON. Says the School Children of the Land Have Cause to Remember Him for His Arbor Day.

Grand Island, Neb., April 27.—President Roosevelt began a strenuous day by turning the first tree on the Carnegie library. He made an address in front of the high school building. The train left here at 9:15.

Urged Tree Planting. Hastings, Neb., April 27.—President Roosevelt in his speech here, urged the people to continue tree planting. He paid a high tribute to J. Sterling Morton, the man who was secretary of agriculture in Cleveland's cabinet, and father of the Arbor Day movement. He said that millions of acres of trees have been planted since the first Arbor Day.

President's Visit to Des Moines. Des Moines, Iowa, April 27.—The capital city of Iowa is putting on holiday attire in honor of President Roosevelt who is to be here tomorrow. Visitors are already arriving and it is expected that the crowd will be one of the largest ever seen here.

BROWN IS REMANDED. Self-Styled Prince of Athrobald Says He Was Forced to Marry Countess Russell.

London, April 27.—William Brown, the self-styled Prince of Athrobald, who married Countess Russell, and was recently arrested on the charge of making a false assertion, was today remanded for a hearing in the June assizes. Further testimony showed that Brown informed the countess that he was the son of the Emperor of Austria, "a wicked old man who is trying to keep me from my money."

Brown says that after the countess believed him to be a prince, he was literally dragged into a marriage and had no idea of committing an offense.

ELEVEN MEN KILLED AND 25 ARE INJURED

All But One of the Dead Were Greek and Italian Laborers—Missing of Orders Caused Wreck—Four More Will Die.

Buffalo, Kan., April 27.—By the wrecking of the north-bound Missouri Pacific stock and work train last night 11 men were killed and 25 were injured. The dead are Greek and Italian laborers with the exception of the work boss, Fry, who is an American. Of the injured four will die. Missing of orders caused the work train to back rapidly into the stock train on a curve. The flat cars and cabooses were broken into kindling wood. The injured men were removed to the hospital at Coffeyville.

BALKAN SITUATION.

Secretary Cranborne States That the Russian and Austrian Ambassadors Are Urging Turkey Towards Reforms.

London, April 27.—In the house of commons this afternoon Cranborne, replying to an interpellation regarding the Balkan situation, stated that fresh and earnest representations urging the promised reforms in Macedonia had been made in the last few days by the Russian and Austrian ambassadors. The ambassadors, supported by the other powers, he added, had also urged the appointment of European officers to reorganize the gendarmes.

The official announcement is made here this afternoon that the Chinese government has refused to grant the Russian demands relative to Manchuria.

EDWARD AT ROME. Is Given an Ovation by the Populace—Greeted by King Victor.

Rome, April 27.—King Edward arrived here this afternoon. He was given a reception by the populace. At the Quirinal he was cordially greeted by King Victor and several dukes. When they appeared outside the palace the streets were jammed and they were given a rousing ovation. The mayor presented the king with his respects and afterwards in the great hall of the Vatican he was received by the queen.

FOR WAGON ROAD. Over \$1000 Has Been Raised to Build a Shorter Route From Fruita to Joseph.

Fruita, Ore., April 24.—Over \$1000 has been raised in Fruita and Joseph for a wagon road from Fruita to Joseph. The Big Sheep creek divide summit, the object being to get a short wagon route from this part of the Innahua country into the Snake river valley.
