SELECTED A NEW FACULTY AND CHANGED SALARY LIST.

Board Compliments Professor French

Highly — Buildings Will Be Remodeled in Expectation of a Largely Increased Attendance—College Has Bright Prospects.

The board of regents of the state normal school, met at Weston yesterday, at which time they transacted the routine business for the past year and straightened up the accounts, besides electing officers for the board and providing for the faculty of the college.

Faculty Selected for Next Year.

The full corps of professors were elected, but the board declines to make the list public until after the adjournment of the school for this term, in order to promote harmony at the institution.

The salary list was cut down owing to the action of the last legislature in scaling the appropriation to \$16,000. The salary of President French was not altered, but reductions were made in the compensation received by Professors Peebles and Kitter, their salaries being reduced to \$600 per annum. The salary of Professor Bruce was raised from \$765 to \$800 per annum, while all the other teachers will receive \$600 for their year's effort.

The board found the college in very good condition, with a fine spirit of enthusiasm and progress in evidence.

Compliment Professor French.

They wish to especially commend the effort of President French in rebuilding the school and for the systematic record of his work in advancing the interests of the institution and its students.

The buildings will be remodeled and put in first-class shape during the coming vacation in expectation of a very successful session the coming year.

During this summer an active campaign will be carried on to secure an increased attendance for the fall term. President French will spend his vacation in endeavoring to build up the roster of students. There are at present 45 students in daily attendance at the school, and this number is sure to almost double.

It is not thought by those in touch with the management of the institution that the decreased appropriation will work any hardship on the work for the future. Those who have studied the question are confident that, with a careful and judicious administration of the funds at the disposal of the college, the work can be carried on as well as before. If economy is practiced the work will be as well done and the service as good as it has heretofore been.

ITEMS COURT DECISIONS

FIVE OPINIONS GIVEN THREE WERE REVERSALS.

Final Dispositions Made of Interesting Litigation Which Had the Last Hearing in the Late Session of the Supreme Court at Pendleton.

Major Leo Moorhouse, the clerk of the supreme court in the Eastern district, has received the decision in five of the cases argued and submitted to the court at the session held here not long ago.

The case of the Union street and Railway Company respondents, vs. The First National Bank of Union, Judge Bean reversed the decision of the lower court and granted such writ and the cause dismissed.

The decision of the lower court was reversed in the case of V. C. Belknap, appellant, vs. Thomas Whitmore, respondent, and the cause dismissed.

The decision was written by Justice R. S. Bean, and the attorney for the respondents was V. G. Cozad.

L. O. Case, appellant, vs. E. C. Berry and Joseph Harried, respondents, an appeal from Union county, was not allowed. The lower court was affirmed by Justice Wolferton, and the cause dismissed.

D. Slater was the appellant's attorney, and N. C. McLeod represented the respondents.

Justice C. E. Wolferton reversed the lower court in the case of H. Maynard, respondent vs. the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company, and remanded the case for a new trial. This was an action brought to recover damages for injuries received, and was argued by James S. Wilson and Attorney General F. H. Crawford for the appellants and Le Roy Lomox for the respondent.

In the case of Fred N. Nodine, respondent vs. the City of Union and Fred Allen, appellants, the judgment of the lower court was approved by Chief Justice F. A. Moore. This was a suit brought to enforce the opening of a highway, and was handled by C. E. Cochran for the appellant and Le Roy Lomox for the respondent.
