OREGON LIVESTOCK

ONLY ONE-HALF OF THE
SURPLUS WAS SHIPPED.

Shipments Are Expected to Increase This Fall—Large Shipments of Horses to Meet Foreign Demand—California Demand for Oregon Sheep.

C. J. Mills, O. R. & N. livestock agent, came down on the morning train to Portland to discuss the Oregon situation with the Oregon Eastern Oregon points, where he has been for a few days in the interests of his department. He leaves in the morning for Portland on the Washington division.

Following the large shipment of horses from La Grande, last week, to Alberta, other shipments of a like nature are expected to be made from Oregon points, soon, to meet the great demand for American horses, in Canada.

There is no local movement of calves, as yet, and many Texas cattle are coming north, many of which will find their way into Oregon country. There are no other large developments in the mountain districts of late years, is the gradual seeding of

large fields of mountain uplands to timber, by the chance of a forest fire, seed by teamsters and animals. On every moist part, no matter what the altitude, timber grows luxuriantly, and in many places could be cut with a moving machine.
