

Several vessels are in port loading wheat and flour for foreign account. and some good size parcels have gone to California, since the beginning of this month. On Puget Sound there is a decided dullness manifested, as there are no vessels on spot for load ing grain. The wheat trade will have quite a spell of dullness. Crop reports show but little change over our previous advices, and it is hardly ada forecast at what the size of the crop will be. From the most conservative people in the trade in the interior, we have advices estimating a decrease of fully 20 to 25 per cent of that of one year ago. 
