VAN CLEAVE HAS SOLD SEVENTY-FIVE HORSES.

Thomas Sheridan Has Sold His Butter Creek Ranch—Alfalfa Crop Not So Heavy as Last Year, But the Quality is Good and Price Better—W. H. Babb Will Ship Horses to Canada.

Echo, July 30.—O. R. & N. Station Agent C. S. Mudge is building on his homestead.

F. B. Van Cleave returned yesterday from Wells Springs where he has been for the past week gathering his hand of horses. He has sold the entire hand of about 75 head to Thomas Sheridan of Butter Creek.

Roadmaster Connel of the O. R. & N. dropped off between trains here this morning.

Thomas Sheridan has sold his fine ranch on Butter Creek to T. B. Van Cleave. This consists of 160 acres, and is one of the most valuable properties on the coast.

D. C. Brownell was in today from Butter Creek. He reports work on the second crop of alfalfa as progressing rapidly with promise of a good yield. The average yield is somewhat below that of last year on account of atmospheric conditions, but the price is much better, which will make the output far above last year's crop.

W. H. Babb came down from Pendleton yesterday and today is moving his household effects. He is also buying horses which he intends to ship to the Canada market in about 10 days.

IRRIGATION COMPANY.

Citizens of Freewater Form a New Organization.

At a meeting of some of the land owners of Freewater and vicinity held not long ago, a new irrigation company was formed, to be known as the Perkins Irrigation Ditch Company. The company was incorporated on the 28th of the month, and the certificate has been returned. The new company has a stock of \$2,750, divided into 275 shares at \$10 a share. The officers of the company are L. E. North, president; John S. Vinson, secretary; N. A. Kennedy, vice-president and treasurer.

The board has been authorized to levy a special tax of 25 cents a share for the incorporation, survey and the platting of the ditch, which is the old one that runs through the city of Freewater at the present time.

The purpose of the company is to secure the equal distribution of the water to all the patrons of the ditch in the proportion that is just to all of the land owners, and is intended to accomplish the same work as the Wright law of 1890, without some of its disadvantages.

BIDS FOR OLD POOR FARM.

None Made That the Court Will Accept—Will Move to New Farm About August 15.

G. A. Hartman left this morning for Weston, where he goes to look after the harvesting of the crop on property owned by him. Judge Hartman says that the county court has advertised for bids on the old poor farm property, but has found none that are satisfactory as yet. Unless it can get a good price for the land it will not sell it.

As soon as the hay crop is gathered from the land of the old farm and the work well slacken up a little, the move from the old to the new quarters will be made. It will be about 10 days or two weeks before the superintendents will attempt to make the move.

Case Was Dismissed.

The case of the State of Oregon vs. Fred Long was dismissed this morning on the motion of the district attorney. This is the case in which Long was accused of attempting to rob Arthur Laffoon one night about two weeks ago. The prosecuting witness failed to put in an appearance, and on that account the case was dismissed. The defense has the time maintained that it was a case of simple assault, he having got into a fight with the witness for the prosecution while they were both more or less under the influence of liquor.

Property Transferred.

A deed was filed today by Joseph Basler and Anna Basler, his wife, transferring to John Schmidt for \$12,250 the south half of lots R and S, and the north 15 feet of lot L, all in block E, of South Pendleton. This is the property sold the other day and upon which it is the intention of Mr. Schmidt to erect a brick building in the near future.

Postal Clerks Reinstated.

Assistant Postmaster Tracy and Chief Mailing Clerk Lowell, in the Baker City postoffice, who were suspended some time ago, have been reinstated. The cause of their suspension was the loss of two registered letters, but as responsibility for the loss could not be traced to either of them, the charges against both were withdrawn.

ROY RITNER WAS ELECTED TO A SALARIED POSITION.

L. B. Reeder Will Represent Oregon at the Great Council of the Atlantic City—James Devlin Is Now Deputy Great Sachem—Next Meeting of the State Council Will Be at Seaside Next July.

The delegation from the Great Council of the Redmen, which has been in session at Oregon City the first of the week, has returned home in good spirits, for they got all they went after and more.

Roy Ritner, who was one of the delegates from the local camp, was elected to the position of general of the records for the state camp. This is the only salaried position of the order and is considered one of the highest honors in the gift of the order. This officer is in charge of all of the records of the order and is responsible for them.

L. B. Reeder, the retiring great sachem of the state camp, was chosen to represent the state at the great council of the United States, which meets at Atlantic City in September. This is a nice bill for the camp year will contain a mileage amounting to about \$300, besides the pleasure of the trip.

James Devlin was appointed deputy great sachem for the Unalash tribe No. 18. This is the local tribe.

The meetings were full of business and were very beneficial to the order, though there was nothing done causing any great changes in the conduct of the order, as it is now carried on. One or two minor changes were made in the constitution and by-laws, but they were not of vital importance to the order. The meeting of the great council for the coming year will be held on the fourth Tuesday in July, at Seaside.

George M. Orton, of Portland, has been elected the great sachem of the state for the coming year.

Twenty-Four Race Horses.

Two carloads of race horses passed through the city this morning for Seattle, where they are being taken to be put on the northern circuit. One of the cars was occupied by the horses belonging to J. Kelly, and they were from Salt Lake where they had been on the circuit of the Middle West and the upland plateau region. They had been at Denver for some time before going to Salt Lake. The other car had in it the string of George Stroble, also from Salt Lake and the Denver tracks. There were 24 horses in the two lots.

STABBING AFFRAY

WARRANT OUT FOR ARREST OF WILLIAM COSTELLO.

Claimed That He Carved Will Davis Without Provocation—Both Men Have Their Parties and the Case Will Be Stubbornly Contested.

Papers have been filed in the case of the State of Oregon vs. William Costello. It is a case growing out of a quarrel in the harvest field, and it is charged that Costello assaulted Will Davis with a knife and inflicted on him severe injuries. Eugene Smith is the complaining witness.

The affair took place on the farm of W. R. Campbell, 16 miles north of the city, near North Cold Springs. It seems that Costello was loading from the header and Davis was driving the wagon. He did not place his wagon in the right position and was told to pull up the load. A quarrel arose about the matter and Davis wanted to fight, but Costello told him to wait till after supper when he would satisfy the cravings of his nature for blood.

The affair ended there for the time being, and the teams were unhitched for the evening. Costello was taking his horses to the barn, and he got to the door Davis stepped out and knocked him down. He fell under his horses, but as soon as he got to his feet he drew his knife and went to the other fellow, with the result that he cut him over the eye, across the bridge of the nose, and dug a small piece out of his side in the region of the short ribs over the heart. Davis ran and the men were separated. Later the warrant was sworn out.

This is the story of Doc Campbell, the owner of the outfit for which the men were working, and he has signed his intention to fight the case. The defendant, however, believed Davis to have been the aggressor. The men on the other side, however, say that it was the other way around and that Costello was the leader in the trouble.

The case was issued this morning, and as soon as they have been served the case will be arraigned and the time for the examination set by the court.

SEVERAL CASES OF ILLNESS IN AND ABOUT ATHENA.

Harvesting Operations Are in Full Progress—Some of the Sick Are Improving in Health—New School House Finished on the Flat—General Neighborhood News.

He found that the crime had been committed in Gilliam county, and therefore turned the case over to the authorities there.

Water and Grass Plentiful on the Headwaters of the Grand Ronde—Maple Brothers' Cattle in Excellent Condition—No Trouble on Union County Ranges.

A. H. Sunderman came down yesterday evening from his summer sheep camp on Meadow Creek, a tributary of the Grand Ronde river which forms a junction with that stream about 80 miles south of Pendleton.

He says the grass is better in that range than usual and the mountain streams are all running full of water. His sheep are in excellent condition and will come out fat for the market this fall. Maple Brothers and Mr. Noble, of this city, have a large band of cattle in the same vicinity and Mr. Sunderman says these cattle are in prime condition.

Mr. Sunderman owns a large body of deer land in that district and is somewhat isolated from the densely stocked ranges of the interior. With three miles of good water on his own holdings, and a large body of deer land as a nucleus, he is not confronted with the ordinary range problems that cause more or less friction in the districts farther south in Grant county.

Mr. Sunderman is pleased to note that there has been no serious trouble at any point this year, aside from one or two reported attacks upon herds of sheep in the interior, the season is passing off quietly.

It is evident that where all parties concerned strictly observe the rules and agreements, the range dispute is a thing of no trouble and within a very few years more the number of sheep will have been reduced to correspond with the range area, which will permanently settle the range question.

Stockmen are acquiring more and more deer land each year, as a nucleus for their summer camps, and it will only be a few years until the range issue will adjust itself, in this way.

RECORDED RECORDS.

No Contagious or Infectious Diseases in the City—Eleven Burial Permits.

According to the records in use of the recorder, the month just passed has been a healthy one. There are no contagious or infectious diseases in the city at this time, nor has there been during the last month.

Burial permits have been issued to 11 persons in the last month, but as many people from the surrounding country are buried in the cemetery here the number of reported deaths show the death rate for the city, for there have been few Pendleton residents die this month.

There is no record in the matter of births as is provided by law, for the reason that the board has not provided the physicians with the blanks called for, and therefore they have not been noting them as they occur.

Colony of School Teachers.

J. F. Nowlin, the county superintendent of schools, has returned from his homestead near Alba, where he has been for the past two weeks. There are a number of school teachers and clerks who he has taken claims near each other in the vicinity of the claim that Professor Nowlin has, and they have formed quite a colony.

This is all manner of game in the neighborhood, and the campers live high while they are on their holdings. Several are camped there at this time.

Trainload of Lambs.

Joe Connolly, the sheep man, will ship a trainload of lambs from Mexham to the Chicago market some time during the coming week. It will take 2,000 head to make the load, and he has them already in view, and the cars have been ordered. The lambs will be sold to the Chicago market.

Transfer Business Sold.

The transfer business owned by Hayne brothers has been sold by the efforts of the real estate firm of Wade and Bryson, to M. L. Williams for \$850. Mr. Williams will take charge of the business at once.

WHEAT AND BARLEY

OFFERINGS ARE LAGGARD, BUT ARE IMPROVING DAILY.

Barley is the Banner Crop This Year—There is no jangling in Umatilla County Between Producers and the Market—Considered That Chances Are Good for Better Prices for Wheat.

It is about the time of year when the people of this city will see the grain wagons begin to string into town with their loads for the warehouses, but not quite. Now and again you can see an outfit on the streets at this time, but they are few and far between, and it will be a week or two before the roads are lined with the fruit of the fields on its way to the storage or the market. But from the indications, when the tide does start for the city it will be almost as large as it was last season, and the wheat will be as good in quality as has ever come into the city.

Advices received from Athena and vicinity say that the harvest is on the whole, as it has yielded better to the weather than last year, and that the grain is plump and hard and well filled in all the fields.
