Conditions in Porto Rico are said by tourists to be deplorable. Many people in the interior never taste bread, and live entirely on fruits. It will take many years for the natives to shake off the habits and traits bred into the bone, through centuries of Spanish oppression. If the United States redeems one per cent of these people from indolence each year, the mission of civilization will have been well performed. It is impossible to legislate energy into a race.

The defeat and delay of the building of the Panama canal, proves that Senator Morgan was right in his obstructive measures, in the senate last spring. It will develop yet that one of the most gigantic schemes of bribery and booting in history, accompanied the deal for the Panama route, and it is doubtful if it is ever built. The canal could now be under way on the Nicaragua route, and the domination of the trans-continental railroads would soon be at an end.

That was a beautiful dream which A. S. Watt pictured to the county court, when he outlined the proposed road from Huntington to Portland, down the impassable canyons of Snake river, with no curves to mar the way, and no mountains to climb. If the Harriman system had any immediate intentions in this direction, the vast amounts now being spent in improvements over the Blue mountains would not be thus wasted. Pendleton will always be on the main line of the O. R. & N., the only changes, if any, in future arrangements, to be a line into Grant county southward from this city.

One of the happiest reports made at the recent session of the Woolgrowers' Association at Baker City, was on the wane of the range war in Eastern Oregon. This country is large enough for all its industries, and more. It is advanced far enough to welcome and embrace the advent of peaceful methods of adjustment of all difficulties that accompany the settlement of a new country. Other vexing problems will gradually disappear from the West with as little ceremony as did this one, thanks to the great hearts and minds at the head of the West.

Just what Echo can do with rabbits, Milton can do with fruit. The demand for canned stuff is so great in all the mining districts and non-fruit-producing regions of the Northwest, that this country cannot meet it. Enough money is paid out in freight each year to build a cannery, and much of the fruit that is now wasted by lack of care and facilities for handling it at the right time, would be saved to the producer by the presence of a cannery in the vicinity. This country depends too much upon outside manufacturers. It depends too much upon foreign supply for the very things that enter into the daily necessities of the people. Pendleton uses about 250,000 pounds of butter each year, yet imports every pound of its supply. Milton keeps a stock of canned fruit on her shelves year in, year out, and yet buys this from districts producing an inferior grade of fruit and pays freight on it, commission and other unnecessary charges, which would be saved by the erection of a cannery.

The resolution of the ironworkers, denouncing the actions of President Roosevelt in the Miller case, is one of the first anti-Roosevelt guns of the coming presidential campaign. While the president has shown that he has the highest regard for union labor in the past, he has taken this occasion to announce to union labor that Theodore Roosevelt is president of the United States, and that he will not be bluffed, bulldozed, coerced, intimidated, dictated to, walked over, set down upon nor forced on any occasion. If the labor forces having the settlement of the Miller case in hand could agree among themselves, the president would have found his own position much less difficult than it is. If Miller is a good workman, and the president would the charges against him were the result of jealousy, he was right in insisting that he be retained. This seems to be the case, and the resolutions of the ironworkers will only make the road of union labor more rocky, through the gauntlet of government jobs in future.

THE MORMON INVASION.

The vote of Union county can be controlled next year by the Mormon settlers that have come into Grand Ronde valley, since the advent of the sugar factory, three years ago.

The 1,000-acre tracts of wheat land of that county that were formerly half worked, have been cut into small farms, each one supporting a family. The slipshod methods of farming have been systematized until every foot of land produces something.

In a social way the Mormons have revolutionized Union county. Their church congregations are larger, their Sunday school classes are more vigorous, all the young people attending and taking part. Their sociability is proverbial. Sunday finds them at their neighbors' after church, keeping alive the olden custom of visiting and intermingling. Their Saturday night dances have become a fixture in La Grande. Everybody, from the oldest deacon to the youngest child attends these social events, and no happier, more entertaining functions were ever enjoyed by Union county people than these parties.

While Mormons are no able farmers, or business men than Gentiles, the sentimental bonds that hold them together and causes them to work harmoniously as a body, enable them to accomplish more than the single-handed Gentile. Co-operation is the key to their success. The Mormon merchant will find a market for Mormon produce, and thus encourage the production of the farm. He will hunt out places in which to dispose of excess produce, and thus bind the farmer to him closer than ever by this effort. No Mormon who has anything to sell is sent home from the Mormon store with unsold produce. No matter what the produce may be, it is disposed of, and thus the effort of the farmer supports his family, in whatever line of industry it may be directed.

This method encourages the Mormon farmer to diversify his crop. It causes him to grow a little of everything that the market demands, in order to be ready for any unexpected turn of the market. This is what stimulates the culture of berries, vegetables, all kinds of grain, hay, fruit and farm products. Whatever the market demands, the Mormon merchant can supply on account of the diversity of the crops grown by his patrons.

This fellow-feeling which enters into the business life of the Mormon community is the basis of Mormon prosperity. There is a sentimental consideration beneath it, which no plain, cold-blooded business method can successfully combat. The Mormon farmer is entitled to the fullest protection of the Mormon in business. It is part of the creed to encourage industry, and therefore no man who works and produces something, is forced to take less than it is worth in the market. For this reason the Mormon is a cheerful, happy, buoyant worker. His heart is in his labor, for as long as there is any produce on his farm, there is a sure income. Among Mormons there is no overproduction.

This method in business binds the member still closer to his church. It becomes part of the everyday life of the Mormon to look up to his church as the one great source of his prosperity. It makes his market, furnishes means by which he becomes independent and he stands by its precepts under all circumstances. Every Mormon is a fighter, from a religious standpoint, and there are no paupers nor backsliders among them.

With the winter season staring the poor of Eastern Oregon cities in the face, and the seemingly unjustified rise in the prices of fuel, all along the line, the following from the Baker City Democrat is timely and to the point: "There is a general kick all over town against the rise in the price of fuel in Baker City. No reason can be assigned for the increase in the price of coal, already high, when there has been no change in conditions. It is deemed an imposition on the long suffering public of Baker City that the prices of wood have gone up so sharply without apparent adequate cause. Why should slab wood be sold at \$4 and upwards per cord, and box ends about the same, when the same conditions exist as existed a year ago. In Portland slabs and box ends sell for \$1.50 per cord. This class of fuel is very inferior and always is sold cheap. Straight cord wood is only \$4.50, but if the price is increased, as threatened, on all classes, many people will suffer this winter. To the uninitiated it looks like a hold-up."

From all over Eastern Oregon comes the call for cheaper building material and fuel. Within 30 miles of Pendleton are immense bodies of excellent timber, suitable for both these purposes. The only barrier between the consumer and the raw supply in the mountains is the lack of transportation facilities. The price of lumber and fuel would be cheapened at least 20 per cent by construction of branch lines of road leading from Huron and Meacham into the great timber belt of the Blue mountains.

These spurs could be filled with empty cars twice a week and the loads picked up when ready, and the company and the consumer would profit by the plan. Cheaper material would permit many improvements which cannot now be made. It would stimulate building among the working people, who cannot now undertake it, on account of the great cost. It would invite industries which are barred out by the building material and fuel questions today. These are legitimate commercial issues before the city and must be met sooner or later.

The Donkohors, who created a sensation last winter, by running naked through the Canadian blizzards in search of an imaginary messiah, have decided to become useful to the country, and have accepted the offer of a Philadelphia man to establish schools and begin life in a civilized way. Aside from their religious freakishness, these people are worthy of citizenship in any country. A few years contact with the commercial races of the western hemisphere will make good traders of them. Ideals are all right, but industry is better. If the Donkohors will settle on Canadian wheat land, buy American horses, eat American beef, discard the wooden shoe and use some kind conducive to high kicking and swift moving, the outlandish bundle of eccentricities which they brought from Russia will soon disappear. There is room for more of them in the West. Any man who will leave a country like Russia for his conscience sake, will make a good citizen here.

The Portland plumbers have spent \$2,000 during the past seven weeks fighting for a raise in wages, from \$4.50 to \$5 per day. In this time they have lost \$3,000 in wages through idleness, while the strike has been in progress, and now at the beginning of winter go back to work for their old employers at \$4.50 per day, the same wages they were receiving before. The moral is plain. Their demand for \$5 per day of eight hours' work was unreasonable, and their defeat is not unexpected. The business of the country will not justify any such wages, and the quicker the working people learn this, the better it will be for them. They have sunk \$6,000 in cash and go back under very unpleasant conditions. It costs money to learn.

Walla Walla people will petition the county court to appropriate \$10,000 to secure the Stubbled orphan home in that city. This will be a great institution for the Garden City, and she is showing a commendable enterprise in taking this step. Pendleton would raise the required amount to bring the home here, if Walla Walla should fail.

A runaway cable car in Chicago Monday, smashed two wagons and injured 10 people, none seriously.

GENERAL NEWS.

Seven hundred employees of the Rumford, Me., paper mills have been ordered out, the employers refusing to recognize the union.

Archbishop Kala, of St. Louis, who has been ill at St. Agnes sanitarium, Baltimore, for several months, can live but a short time.

Incendiarists attempted Sunday night to burn the Agricultural building at the World's Fair, in St. Louis. It was nearly successful.

The health of Mrs. Jefferson Davis is improving, though she is quite frail. She is at the home of her daughter in Buffalo, N. Y.

W. S. Statfield, an employee of the American Express Company, at Rockaway, L. I., absconded with \$6,000, but was captured at Chicago.

The transfer of American church property in the Russian Trans-Caucasus to the Russian government has resulted in rioting at Shusha.

In spite of \$5,000 reward offered, search for the murderers of Millionaire O. P. Dexter, at Santa Clara, N. Y., has been abandoned. The murder was in June last.

Six hundred smoking-pipe makers in New York have returned to work after being locked out for starting a strike. All that they gain is recognition of the union.

The pigiron producers of the East, from Alabama to New York, have decided upon a 20 per cent reduction in the output for the coming year, claiming overproduction.

Miss Mameela Flores is mayor of Linares, Mexico, succeeding by appointment her father, who died of yellow fever. President Diaz highly compliments her work.

The value of the tropical products brought into the United States in 1902 was three times as much in 1879, twice as much as in 1875 and one-third more than in 1865.

The wind blew at a velocity of 100 miles per hour during the recent hurricane in the Bermudas. Great losses were sustained by the fruitraisers, and many buildings were destroyed.

President Wainwright, of the New England Cotton Manufacturers' Association, states that speculation pure and simple, does more than all other causes to depress and demoralize the cotton market.

Charles Becker has just been released from the San Quentin, Cal., penitentiary, where he served a term of seven years for raising a draft from \$12 to \$22,000, which he succeeded in cashing.

Five fires were started Sunday last in the basements of Harlem, N. Y., and terror has seized upon the inhabitants of that district. A large number of policemen and detectives were sent to the scene.

Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, speaking of the city hall, says: "If I could fire all the men I suspect of grafting, they would be jumping out of every window in the city hall. This hall is full of graft. I have 15 months left, and I will get some of them yet."

Because the Southern Pacific cut Ventura, Cal., off the map, that city and tributary territory boycotted the road in August, and September 29 the road gave up the fight and reopened its station. The diverted travel and freight is said to have cost the company \$10,000.

It has developed that for every Russian soldier withdrawn from Manchuria and contiguous Chinese territory, a railroad or other "laborer" is sent into the same territory. Almost invariably the "laborer" has a full complement of arms to protect himself while following peaceful pursuits.

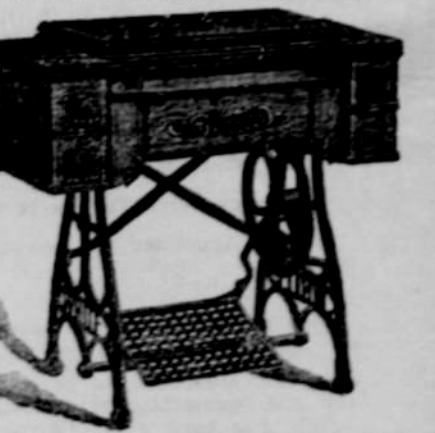
