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NEW CITY COUNCIL

THEY WILL BE SWORN IN NEXT SATURDAY NIGHT.

Mayor Matlock Will Announce the Committee That Night—Question of Successor to Marshal Scheer Is Yet Unsettled, Though the Statement Is Authorized That It Will Not Be Mr. Wilson.

As stated last night the members of the new council met in the private office of the city recorder for the purpose of taking some steps toward the organization of the council and to canvass the situation as regards the appointment of the city marshal.

It was decided that the members would meet again on Saturday night for the purpose of qualifying, at which time all of the members will take the oath of office. At this time it was also the intention of Mayor-elect Matlock to announce his committees for the next term, so that when the council meets on the first regular meeting of the new term there will be no needless delay in organization and the attention of the body can be given entirely to business from the start.

The question of changing the date of the meeting also came up at the caucus last night, and this was decided when the aldermen met on Saturday night. Several are in favor of axing the time of the meetings on Wednesday evening. This night is more convenient to a majority of the new members and it will in all probability be named as the date for future meetings on Saturday evening.

Who Will Be Marshal?

Though the caucus was a secret affair, the foregoing account of the doings and intentions was given this morning, as there was nothing secret in that part of the proceedings; and besides the fact one was miles from the caucus, and that was the information that Bert Wilson was not the choice of the caucus for the position of marshal; that he had not been selected last night as head of the police of the city for the next term, and that if the members all stood by their pledge given last night he would not be selected at any meeting in the future.

That Mr. Wilson would make a good officer was acknowledged, but that he would be asked to fill the place was denied in the most emphatic manner. Who the man is that the council will select, however, was not divulged; but that Mr. Wilson was not the man was freely admitted by the council members.

It was given to correct an unauthentic and false impression spread abroad and in order that the people might not be misled by irresponsible rumors.

W. E. POTWINE WILL LEAVE CHURCH OF REDEEMER.

Will Take Charge of One of the Leading Episcopal Churches in the Hawaiian Islands—Will Tender His Resignation at Next Business Meeting of the Church.

Rev. W. E. Potwine, who for many years has been the rector of the Church of the Redeemer in this city, and who is the one to whom the people of the city owe much for his services, has decided to leave here for one other person the establishment of the church and the strengthening of the Episcopal congregation in the Hawaiian Islands.

The matter has been kept quiet for some time, but has now been made public by the resignation of Mr. Potwine. He stated that he would tender his resignation at the annual meeting of the parish, which convenes one week from tonight. At that time he would present to the parish his official resignation, though he was very sorry that the matter became public before he intended.

The church to which Mr. Potwine has been called is one of the largest in the world, having 100 members in its congregation. It is one of the leading and most influential congregations on the island, and the friends of Mr. Potwine will be regretting to learn his departure from this city, but he will be pleased to learn that he will be so well placed in the event of his change.

"DRY LAND" ALFALFA.

Demand for Seed of the New Plant Is Going to Be Extraordinary.

Colonel R. C. Judson made arrangements with T. C. Taylor to take orders for the "dry land" alfalfa seed which the O. R. & N. industrial department is introducing into Eastern Oregon. So many applications have been made for the seed that Mr. Taylor will order twice the amount that was thought would be sufficient for the first year.

He will probably order a ton of the seed in small amounts to be parcelled out to his friends of the alfalfa. It will grow and make a good crop on the dry land, giving drought, hot weather or flooding, and if it does prove successful through out the dry section of the state, Colonel Judson feels that the question of rejuvenating the ranges has already been solved.

FALLS FAMILY ILL.

One Sick With Inflammatory Rheumatism and Four With Typhoid Fever.

The family of M. C. Falls, who lives in the west end of town below the Walters four mill, is almost entirely out of commission with sickness, each year, and possibly while on with typhoid fever, is just recovering from a severe attack of typhoid and Mr. Falls himself is confined to his bed with a severe attack of inflammatory rheumatism.

Mrs. Falls is about the only well member of the family left to care for the sick. Mr. Falls is a member of the G. A. R., and that order has visited and cared for the family this week, but further attention must be given them by their friends.

STOCK MARKET BETTER.

Prominent Portland Buyer in the City Today Says Cattle and Hogs Are Demand.

E. E. Willard, formerly a resident of La Grande, but now living in Portland, one of the well known pioneer stockmen of Eastern Oregon, was in the city today on route from Portland to Pomeroy, Wash., where he goes to look over the stock situation.

Mr. Willard says the Portland market for fat hogs and cattle is growing more brisk every week, as the early supply is about all in, and the winter feed stuff must now be drawn upon. He looks for a very active market before spring, and says the growers throughout Eastern Oregon have sold off heavily, leaving very few profitable cattle in the country. The weather has been favorable to feeding all over the Inland Empire and the stock that is being fed is in prime condition.

Mr. Willard covers every point in Eastern Oregon from the Dalles to the farthest corner of Walla Walla county, and is probably more familiar with the different sections of the country than any other buyer operating in Eastern Oregon.
