PENDLETON POSTOFFICE AFFAIRS ARE PROSPEROUS.

Receipts for the Past Year Were \$100 in Excess of the Previous Year-Total of Year's Profit Was \$7,819.66 -Mail May Be Delivered Outside of the City Limits-Another Carrier Will Be Needed Next Fall.

Charles French, the assistant postmaster, has finished his report to the department of the work done in the Pendleton office for the year, which shows the office to be in the best o condition and prosperous.

The total receipts for the year have been \$13,687.43, which is an increase of \$150 over that of last year. Dur ing the year the box rent has amoun ed to \$1,355.40, the revenue derive from the newspaper postage is \$252. 60, and \$12,079.43 has been taken it through the windows in exchange for postage stamps and stamped envel

The expenses of the office, incluing the rent, light, fuel and the sal aries of the postmaster and his office force have been \$5,941.56. The free delivery system has cost \$1, 878.10, which includes the salary of the delivery clerks, the post box expenses and all of the matters in con nection with the system.

The total gain to the department for the year has been \$1,819.66, which represents the total profit of the lo cal office of the postoffice depart ment. This is not quite so much profit to the department as in the last year, but the shortage is due t the raise in the salaries of the post master of \$100 a year, and that of his first assistant and mailing clerk o the same amount. Owing to other small increases in expense for vari ous improvements, the surplus ha been cut lown so that the prosperor condition of the office is not shown by the face of the reports unless one understands the details of the office

Owing to the satisfaction given by the carriers and by the increase in work caused by the decision which went into effect the first of the year in relation to their increased territory the office has recommended the department that their salaries b the department that their salaries be increased \$250 a year each.
