The investigation into the disaster on the warship Missouri in which 31 Americans lost their lives, proves that the general order and supervision on that vessel was deficient. While gunners are supposed to know their business and be able to act judiciously, it is evident that the excitement of the target practice led them to risk their lives and the safety of the vessel and the official supervision was not strict enough to check them in their disastrous enthusiasm. The explosion on the Missouri was caused by the ignition of a charge of powder put in the gun too soon after the previous discharge, and while the gun was yet smoking hot from the rapid firing. Strict discipline and able supervision on board would have foreseen this perilous practice and prevented it. Captain Cowles was proven unfit for the position in the collision between the Missouri and the Texas some weeks ago, and although he is a brother-in-law, President Roosevelt should not have raised his hand against his dismissal or retirement to a position of less importance. GENERAL NEWS.

The republican territorial convention of Hawaii has instructed for Roosevelt.

The last semi-annual dividend of the Anaconda Copper Company was 50 per cent.

The executive committee of the American Federation of Labor is in session at Denver.

The civil service law will be amended fixing the age of compulsory retirement at 70.

New Mexico demerits, after a brief fight, instructed for Hearst by a vote of 79 to 77.

The Globe Securities Company, of New York, has failed. Liabilities, \$366,600; assets, \$512,000.

The city and suburban handicap was won at London by Robert La Diable, with stakes of \$10,000.

James S. Vancouver, a wealthy New Yorker 66 years old, has just married his fourth wife, who is 40 years old.

The Petrovlovsk was a 10,960-ton vessel, with 14,000 indicated horsepower, and had been finished six years.

Mrs. Anna Valentina has been sentenced to hang in New Jersey for the murder of Mrs. Rosa Salza, whom she stabbed 16 times.

H. R. Hertzberg, dramatic editor of the New York Journal, fell nine stories down an airway shaft, was not killed, but cannot recover.

Dr. Charlotte Black Brown, the leading woman physician of the coast states, is dead at San Francisco, of apoplexy, aged 58 years.

Ignatz Romanoski and Thomas Taglio, Austrians, quarreled over a girl in Chicago. The former fatally shot the latter and then blew his own brains out.

The works of the Fore River Ship Engine Company at Quincy, Mass., are tied up by a strike of 2,500 men. It delays work on the battleship Rhode Island.

President E. H. Harriman, of the Union Pacific system, is for Roosevelt, and has elected a delegate to the national convention from New York.

The liner Gaelic, just arrived at San Francisco, narrowly escaped being sunk by two submarines on different dates, east of Japan a few hundred miles.

The 600 striking coal miners at Red Lodge, Mont., have gone to work pending negotiations suggested by H. J. Horn, general manager of the Northern Pacific.

The referendum vote of the Lithuanians of the United States and Canada indicates that the strike will soon come to an end, practically on the terms of the Lithuanians.

Minnie Martin, a married woman, committed suicide Tuesday by taking strychnine. She was but 11 years of age and took the poison without cause, other than curiosity.

C. S. Kittle, a New York broker, being sued for \$10,000 by a servant girl, as the price for making love to her against her protests. Kittle is a married man.

Morrison street bridge, Portland, is barred to pedestrians and vehicles and only street cars can pass during the repairs to the bridge. The closed period will last eight months.

A suit involving the ownership of 36,000 worth of Baker county mining stock, the actual value of which is about \$100,000, has been begun in the courts of Portland.

Because he failed to win the hand of a fair grass widow, Mrs. Belle Jones, of Portland, Charles S. Menach, a steamboat fireman, committed suicide at Portland, Tuesday.

James Grubb, janitor of a New York apartment house, tried to poison his six children. His wife is dead, and he himself half insane over her care.

After years of maneuvering, the Washash rail-road has finally accomplished a terminal at Pittsburg, Pa., and will be running regular trains into and out of that place by June 15.

The first motion to quash the indictment against an alleged hoodlum in the Kansas City Kan. city council, has been sustained. Nine other indictments are expected to go the same way.

A man held up a saloon at Berkeley, Cal. The men all complied with his orders, but the saloonkeeper's wife, 79 years old, tried to get hold of a pistol. The robber shot and mortally wounded her and made his escape.

A suit has been begun to compel an accounting of receipts against the American Spirits Manufacturing Company (whiskey trust), by stockholders who claim to be snubbed and frozen out. Over \$135,000,000 is involved.

President Smith, of the Mormon church, has fumed in his enthusiasm for "the whole truth" since his return to Salt Lake and refuses to use his influence to induce Mormon witnesses to appear before the Smoot investigation committee.

The authorities of Kansas City, Kan., backed up the civil rights law, and under police protection the 70 colored pupils are attending the public schools. Some white children have been taken out of school, but not a teacher or member of the school board has resigned.

DEMOCRATIC STATE PLATFORM.

The platform adopted by the democratic convention is as follows:

"The democrats of Oregon, in state convention assembled, believing that in the present, more than at any time in the past, the people should insist upon a return to the principles of democracy as enunciated by its founder, Thomas Jefferson, of equal rights to all and special privileges to none, and present these reasons for such opinion:

"The republican party, entrenched behind the corporations and trusts of this country, not only refuses to attempt to nullify and destroy the laws enacted in the past for the protection of popular government and the privileges incident thereto. We insist that but a casual reading of the history of the past, and observation of the present conditions should convince the people that the democratic party is the shield and bulwark that must protect popular government from the fires of radicalism on the one side and the grasping greed of the few on the other.

"The keystone of republican power is what they call 'protection,' which we denounce, as now administered, to be a fraud upon, and a robbery of, the people by the trusts and tariff magnates, who supply their votes to the people of foreign countries, and the people of our own free land are made to pay extravagant prices.

"For many years the republican party has claimed that it would remedy this evil by what is called 'tariff reform' and other such promises, but instead of treating with other governments, that party has made treaties of reciprocity only with the trusts and the protected interests, and the evident attempt to retain the tariff in return for campaign contributions to be used to corrupt the legislatures, the press and corrupt the American people through the powerful lobby that is constantly maintained at the executive offices of the government.

"This system is destructive of individual effort and puts a premium upon both cunning and corruption in the political and commercial life of the nation. It is destructive of the moral of our political organizations, and the example created is the inspiration of the greater part of the political corruption in our state and municipal governments where such exists. In our opinion the reform of the politics of the nation must begin at the foundation of the state and municipal governments where such exists. "The republican party has of late been compelled by the vigorous efforts of the democrats to make a pretense of enforcing the national anti-trust laws. The insincerity of the republican party is conclusively shown by its striking from such law the criminal provision providing for imprisonment as a penalty for its violation. In its last platform it has cowardly ignored the question, believing that contrary to the opinion of Abraham Lincoln, that it can humbug all the people all the time."

"The last republican legislature accepted the suggestion of the last state platform of this party, and passed an act for the protection of employees upon railroads by modifying what is called the 'yellow-slave' doctrine. We favor the extension of that law to other occupations, and also the enactment of a law that will afford protection to the lives of those engaged in mining and other hazardous occupations."

"We believe the time is come when the best interests of the state require the reasonable regulation of railroad freight rates, and we favor such law."
