The average cost of maintaining the office of county assessor in Umatilla county from 1895 to 1902 was \$5,063.75 per year. In 1903, the first year of Mr. Strain's term, the cost of maintaining the office is \$4,142, or a saving of \$1,843.50 for the two years of his term to the taxpayers.

The people of the east end of Umatilla county are entitled to the county commissioner this year. That portion of the county pays a large proportion of the taxes. Improvements are badly needed in many places and they should have representation in the county court. William Lloyd of Milton, who is candidate for county commissioner, was the unanimous choice of his locality for that position and in justice to that section of the county which is not represented on the county board, he should receive a handsome majority.

The activity of Japanese torpedo boats, at the beginning of the war, was a surprise to the world, and now the fighting qualities of the little men on land will also be a surprise. In the face of a galling fire, these lately civilized Asiatics charged the Russian troops Saturday and Sunday, and at the point of cold steel put the czar's troops to utter rout. And these Japanese were no amateurs, and were not blessed by Moscow priests. The battle is not to the strong alone; but to the vigilant and active, and these Japanese, who do not boast of heraldic ancestry and have only in the last 20 or 30 years adopted western civilization, possess some excellent elements as fighters. It will now be in order for all the Greek churches in Russia to proclaim days of fasting and prayer, and for the priests to bless some more ikons and send them to the army in Manchuria.

Situated as she is in the heart of the arid district of Oregon, Umatilla county must send some practical irrigators to the next legislature. It is an age of utility and not of ornamentation. The government stands back, because the laws of Oregon will not admit of the advance methods of irrigation being instituted by the national government. The laws of this state are a barrier, in their present incompleteness, to the reclamation of the state. Umatilla county, being the principal center of activity in the surveys of arid land for reclamation purposes, must take the initiative in promoting irrigation legislation, and the first step is to send practical irrigators to the legislature to advise with the state irrigation commission on the formation of a progressive irrigation law, that will meet the needs of the state and make national irrigation possible. "Let us fill this valley with ditches" is the slogan on a campaign card, which meets with hearty response from every interested citizen.

"No matter where you have been nor where you are going, you are now in the best country you may ever expect to visit." These are the words of G. W. Rigby, an old friend from Kansas, as the O. R. & N. train stopped at Athena, yesterday morning. Taking a brief survey of Athena, it is easy to agree with the statement, and if anything, make it even stronger. This little city of 1,000 people in the heart of the wheat belt of Umatilla county, has made more substantial progress during the past two years than any other district in the West, and statistics bear out the statement. In that time Athena has spent \$4,000 on crushed rock streets and is now making further expenditure of \$5,000 for the same purpose. In the past year she has dedicated two of the most magnificent church buildings in the entire Northwest, at a combined cost of \$25,000, every cent paid or pledged, ready for payment when due. This means a total expenditure in the past two years, or since the first street improvement was made, for public and religious benefits, of over \$35 per capita for each man, woman and child in the town. There is no record to compare to it in the Northwest.

Don't forget to tell your neighbor that Pendleton, the county seat of the richest county in Eastern Oregon, the county that produces one per cent of the wheat crop of the United States, will hold a farmers' institute on Thursday, May 26, on the court house grounds. It is the first of a series of annual institutes that will be held hereafter, as long as the county is on the map. It is for free education.

The 3-year-old child of Charles Snow, of Torrington, Conn., fell upon his baby sister, 11 months old, and beat her with a stick until she died as the effect. The child was inspired solely by jealousy because his grandmother bestowed more attention upon the babe than upon himself.

WHY STATE TAXES ARE HIGH.

The republican majority in the Oregon legislature is always 60 to 70 on joint ballot. The condition is unfortunate for the state, and a positive detriment to the republican party. So enormous a majority naturally tends to make the legislative body extravagant. Appropriations are proposed, and the majority, carried on with a mad consciousness of its power and perpetuity, yields to every demand, and the aggregate sum that is finally appropriated is simply enormous. It is a crime that so small a county as Benton should be compelled to yield up \$25,000 a year as its part of what the legislature appropriates. It would be far better for the republican party, and for the state, if more democrats were elected to the legislature, and the overwhelming republican majority in that body reduced. It would make the majority party more careful and economical in its appropriations, and save dollars and dollars to every taxpayer. It is a question of business as well as a question of party safety for republicans themselves to help reduce this majority. This is emphatically true in this non-political year, when there is no United States senator to elect. Corvallis Times.

GENERAL NEWS.

Russia lately borrowed \$100,000,000 for three years, which is to draw 5 per cent interest.

Twelve horses ran at the Chester, England, handicap, May 4. It was won—\$12,750—by Sand Boy.

The threatened street car strike in San Francisco, has been averted by a compromise. Mayor Schmitz was the principal mediator.

Four bandits were recently garroted at Santiago de Cuba. These were the first executions by this method since the Spanish occupation.

Two labor union men and one policeman were killed, and about 100 union men wounded in labor riots May 1, at Buenos Ayers, Argentine.

A 40-year boundary squabble between Chile and Argentina has just been settled by a hard and fast agreement to the result of a joint survey.

Drew College, a pioneer educational institution for women, at Carmel, N. Y., was destroyed by fire. Loss, \$100,000, with not over \$25,000 insurance.

J. E. Waldeck, the well known theatrical man of Los Angeles, Cal., tried to suicide with "rough on rats" but took an overdose and may recover.

H. S. Ringi was drowned near Chicago by his automobile overturning into a ditch. He was thrown beneath it and his head held beneath the water.

Mayor Ballinger closed every pool-room in Seattle, Wednesday morning, and will make a closed town of it if he is compelled to double the police force to do it.

The Canadian government has entered actively upon a policy of colonizing British North America just as far northward as people can be induced to locate.

Lowell Ellis was convicted at Canyon City, Col., of train wrecking. His companions, Myron Aldrich, and William Denton, were acquitted. All are under 18 years of age.

Brazilian troops are being mobilized along the Peruvian frontier upon the presumption that Peru will undertake to hold by force the disputed territory.

Five-year-old Sarah Greenberg fell five stories sheer out of the window of an apartment house in New York. She struck on her back and was not seriously hurt.

President Mellen, of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad, has figured out to his own satisfaction that the labor unions are the cause of the trouble.

James C. Cook is dead at Milford, Mass., aged 87. He had been a practical printer 72 years, and was well known to all the craft in the Eastern and Northeastern states.

The action of W. D. Chamberlain in declining a third term as county clerk in spite of a strong following in the convention, endeared him to the people of Umatilla county as nothing else could have done. His services as clerk had been so highly satisfactory, that his friends were willing to brush aside the third term bugaboo, in order to continue such an efficient man in the clerk's office, and Mr. Chamberlain's unselfish action in refusing to listen to their solicitations, guaranteed him a handsome majority as representative. The same efficient, public spirited, tolerant policy will mark his career as representative that has so prominently characterized his terms as county clerk. His knowledge of the needs of Umatilla county gleaned from his close contact with county affairs especially fits him for some good service in the legislature in the interest of his county and state. Two stronger men could not have been named than William Blakeley and W. D. Chamberlain, for the legislature.

T. D. Taylor, the efficient and popular sheriff of Umatilla county, enjoys the distinction of having won in the election of 1902 with the largest plurality of any candidate in the field, his plurality being 727. His able services during his term has increased his popularity until this plurality should be doubled in 1904. Notwithstanding the fact that the new tax regulations made it necessary to employ more help in the sheriff's office, Mr. Taylor has conducted the office on less expense than formerly required. These facts must be borne in mind by the taxpayers. Economy and efficiency cannot be lost sight of in county elections.

Charles Paulson, a tramp logger, who with a gang of toughs has been infesting the neighborhood near Colfax, was killed by officers Tuesday while resisting arrest.

Suit will be started against I. H. Taff, the fisherman who refused to sell the right of way to the portage road to the state portage commissioners, at The Dalles.

A tooth of a Mastodon has been found at Puyallup, in a race from the Dalles to Portland, over the Spencer, by 33 minutes, Monday. The time in which the Dalles City made the run was six hours and 32 minutes.
