THE COLORADO STRUGGLE.

The true animus behind General Bell's persecution of the Colorado unions has at last come to the surface. He could conceal his motives no longer.

In a long interview furnished to the subsidized and muzzled Associated Press, he says the whole trouble in Colorado was caused by the socialist tendencies of the Colorado unions; that the principle of socialism is anarchistic, and therefore no crime is too black for it to commit to accomplish the ruin of the mining corporations.

General Bell willfully tells a falsehood in his review of the situation to prejudice the public against the socialist party that is growing up as a result of the oppressive policy of corporation government. It has been proven time and again that hired thugs in the employ of the Miners' Association, of which Bell, although a general in the Colorado militia, is the subject, too, are guilty of some of the most terrible outrages charged to the union miners.

The bloodhounds sent on the trail of the hired thug of young McGee went directly to the door of a detective of the Miners' Association and the same bloodhounds did the same thing in trailing the man who discharged the dynamite under the Victor depot, last week, killing 11 non-union miners and wrecking the property.

Instead of arresting these hired thugs in the employ of the mine owners, Bell calls off the dogs and immediately arrests, under the most ridiculous pretenses, all the union miners in the vicinity.

Colorado is a workingman's state, and the socialist party will carry that state, it is thought, within a very few years. This persecution of union miners by the military power of the state is simply a campaign of annihilation against socialism.

Bell is working under the direction of the mine owners, whose murderous thugs are wrecking the mining industry of that state, in the attempt to break the force of the labor organizations. If the organizations all stand by the miners, as they should, against the corporations' iron rule, the common rights of the working people may yet be rescued from complete destruction by the millionaire mining trusts.

The subsidized press of Colorado tells only one side of the story and the public mind is poisoned against the miners, without knowing their cause, nor their actions. Every particle of news sent out of that state is doctored to suit the mine owners and the military authorities, which are one and the same thing, as far as the persecution of the workingmen of Colorado is concerned.

Sympathy with unionism in the zone of the trouble is now sufficient cause for deportation, without judge or jury. County officials of Teller county, who were elected by the people of the county, have been deposed, and deported from the state, because they dared to say that they believed in the principles of organization among laborers, just as capital organizes.

Families have been torn asunder, the mothers and children left destitute and the fathers deported like criminals, because of membership in the union, and yet the mine owners are organized, and half the crimes of the past six months in Colorado have been traced to the doors of this organization, which is using the state militia to suppress organization among workingmen.

Until the miners' story is told, no one will know the horrible atrocities committed in Colorado under the cloak of justice and law.

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UNFAIR TO PENDLETON.

The following unjust and untrue statement, printed in the Sumpter Miner was taken from a sensational report in the Tribune of the alleged actions of the liquor dealers of this city, and it has given Pendleton a black eye all over the Northwest.

It has not only placed Pendleton in an unfair light before the business world, but it paints a picture of Pendleton liquor dealers which they will not enjoy, when in their right minds.

Quoting from the Tribune's scurrilous report of a quiet meeting of a few liquor dealers here one afternoon, the Miner says:

"Pendleton opens the acrimonious fight for which the local option law in this state is the declaration of war. The Retail Liquor Dealers' Association has organized for the campaign against prohibition there. To begin with, all contributions to churches are to be stopped, the Salvation Army is taboed and nine business houses whose proprietors advocated local option were placed on the black list, as also was the Portland Journal. Saloon men say during the past year they have contributed more than \$1,000 to local churches, besides a great amount to charity. Like most things in this world designed to give the other fellow the worst of it, local option is going to work both ways."

There is not a word of truth in the entire statement, except that the liquor dealers formed an organization. Not one cent has been withheld from charity; not one business house has been boycotted; not a word has been uttered against the Oregon Daily Journal, looking toward placing it on the unfair list and not a ruffian has been caused in Pendleton by the passage of the local option amendment, further than to call forth a few remarks from capitalists who had money invested in buildings, as to whether they were safe to depend on renting to saloon men, in view of the fact that prohibition might prevail.

The public wonders what brand of men the Pendleton liquor dealers are, on reading that they have boycotted legitimate business institutions and withheld their money from worthy charitable objects, because the foreign voters of Unadilla county cast their votes according to the dictates of their conscience!

That hasty, angry baldpateh furnished the Tribune by some head in the list of gentlemanly liquor dealers of Pendleton, has done the city irreparable injury.

The states of Utah, Wyoming, Kansas, Nebraska and the territory of New Mexico have each warned Colorado not to dump her deported miners in their borders.

The only thing left for Colorado to do is to hang them, which she will proceed to do, if common sense doesn't step in and check the murderous career of the millionaire mine owners.

GENERAL NEWS.

Aurelio Herrera knocked Benny Yanger down and out at Butte in the eighth round.

An insurrection has broken out in the province of San Luis, Brazil, and the governor has been imprisoned.

Archibald Price, the best known contractor in Montana, was found dead in his room at Butte. Heart failure, or apoplexy.

The accidental discharge of blasting powder in the Potrero quarry at San Francisco, killed Michael Griffin and Andrew Quinn.

Frederick Warren, of Buffalo, N. Y., lost \$2000 cash in 10 minutes in New York at a game called "English faro," and then squealed.

A fire in the business section of Spooner, Wis., did \$60,000 damage as being stopped by blowing him several buildings with dynamite.

With the avowed purpose of reducing expenses, the Erie railroad has during the past four months discharged 4000 men, but now calls a halt.

Ground was broken for the Erie canal July 4, 1817. A recent appropriation provides for its enlargement until it will float a 1000-ton barge.

Race rioting has taken place at Canton, O. Clifford Boylen, a white man, is dying from the effects of a beating at the hands of negroes.

A St. Louis paper describes Bristow (fourth assistant postmaster-general) as being 30 years employed by the United States congressmen on top of him.

Vincent Kerens, son of Republican National Committeeman Kerens and a prominent society man of St. Louis, was fined \$2000 for disorderly conduct.

Dr. George C. Rambo, at the head of the Pasteur Institute in New York, had his right leg badly shattered by the accidental discharge of a shotgun.

Sudden and violent rain and hail-fall around Brush, Col., has done damage estimated at from \$75,000 to \$100,000. Many young animals were killed by hail.

General Stephen D. Lee is slated to succeed General John B. Gordon as commander-in-chief of the ex-Confederates, but strong opposition has developed to him in Texas.

There is a general hitching out from all over Missouri of all Christians, who anticipate much trouble as a result of the reaction following the Percutis kidnapping affair.

Morris Menges, attorney, sued the Western Maryland Railroad Company for commission on its sale, and secured judgment for \$100,000, which includes interest for 23 months.

Samuel Faulkner, of Butte county, California, went over a grade with an ore crusher weighing 12,000 pounds. Together they fell 400 feet with Faulkner squarely beneath the crusher.

The cruiser Tacoma has left San Francisco in search of the steamer Comananch, missing since January last and supposed to be lost off Cape Horn, with 46 men and a cargo of sugar.

Several heavy failures have occurred lately on the New York petroleum exchange. Observing critics of the situation point to Standard Oil stocks raised a point or two with every failure.

John D. Rockefeller is credited with organizing a plan to consolidate into a trust all the principal iron and copper mines of the United States, with the possible exception of the Hecla Copper Company.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

By a recent ordinance all the clerks and officials in city offices of Portland are given a half holiday each Saturday.

President Joseph F. Smith, head of the Mormon church, will visit Portland after returning to Utah from La Grande.

The government will cooperate with Douglas county in building a few miles of specimen good roads, leading out of Roseburg.

Strawberries are coming to the Salem fruit cannery at the rate of 12,000 pounds a day, where they sell at 2 1/2 cents per pound.

All of Salem's saloons remain closed on Sunday now, as a result of a crusade by Professor Drew, of Willamette University.

John Rees, an elevator boy, was instantly killed at Salt Lake Monday by falling six stories. He stepped into an empty shaft.

The accidental or criminal poisoning of the chief of the Crow Indians of British Columbia, is creating great local excitement.

William Phillips died at Lewiston June 14. He had lived in Idaho since 1863 and took part in every Indian war in the Northwest since.

The first vessel of the second fleet to sail for Nome this season, was the Valencia, which carried 200 passengers and left Seattle June 15.

THE MINERS' SIDE

SECRETARY HAYWOOD TELLS OF COLORADO WAR.

Millionaire Mine-Owners Have Hired Thugs to Commit Crimes to Be Laid at the Door of the Unions—Bloodhounds Traced a Hired Detective From the Victor Explosion to His Own Home, But General Bell Promptly Called the Dogs Off—Situation is Appalling.

Recognizing the unfairness and bias of the colored Associated Press news being sent out of Colorado through the millionaire mineowners, W. D. Haywood, secretary of the Western Federation of Miners, has been requested to write the true story of the strike and the causes leading up to it.

The following impartial letter from Haywood appeared in the Denver Post of last Saturday:

The cause of the strike of the Western Federation of Miners in Colorado is one of long standing and involves the failure on the part of the mine managers in various parts of the state to live up to their own written agreements.

As far back as 1884, as a result of the strike at that time, the mineowners agreed that eight hours should constitute a day's work, that the minimum daily wage should be \$3 and that there should be no discrimination against union men in the hiring and discharge of labor.

At the outset of the present trouble Massey & Co., of the Standard mill at Colorado City, peremptorily discharged 45 men, members of the Western Federation of Miners, for no other reason than that they had been union men. All of these were old employees of from two to six years standing. Millmen are affiliated with the Western Federation of Miners and are the enforcement of the 8-hour day, the right of men to organize in the unions and to prevent discrimination against union men of all kinds.

The responsibility for the lawlessness connected with the control rests on the shoulders of the mine operators, the Citizens' Alliance and their allies, backed up by the ready power of the state government.

The responsibility has been placed on these persons and organizations by District Judge Theron Stevens, who denounced the military usurpation in Telluride in strong language from the bench by District Judge J. W. Dixon, republican, who openly condemns Gov. Peabody and severely criticizes his acts involving the deportation of men from the state without trial or other chance of hearing; by ex-Governor Charles S. Thomas, who plainly points to the Miners' Association and Citizens' Alliance as being responsible for the many outrages committed on the persons of helpless and innocent miners; by the recent democratic state convention, which denounced in unambiguous terms the line of policy pursued.

Crimes Upon Citizenship.
The events of the present week in the Cripple Creek district justify every accusation contained above. The following crimes upon citizenship have followed swiftly upon one another:

The resignation of Sheriff Robert, of Teller county, forced by a mob at the point of the pistol and the roll of the rope, the enforced resignation of Coroner Doran of Teller county, of the city marshal of Victor, of various aldermen and justices in the district, the entire official directory of the city of Goldfield, assault upon and demolition of the Union hall in Victor, forcible entrance into the four union co-operative stores and destruction of the contents, destruction of the Victor Daily Record by an armed mob, invasion of Danville, outside the military lines, by an armed force under military command, arrest of men at their work and incarceration within the military lines.

Hundreds of men confined in unsanitary buildings, forcible shut down of the great Portland mine, employing union men, by order of the military commandant on the plea of military necessity, and subsequent deportation of men therein employed.

Concerning the explosion which wrecked the depot, Independence, the price of the railroad was not covered by the price of the mine, it is necessary to say that the self-confessed trainwrecker, McKinney, in the employ of the Miners' Association, had a few days previously been released from custody at the behest of the attorney for the association, and that this same McKinney was observed going down Potosi canyon in the immediate vicinity of the wreckage only a short time after the disaster, and that the bloodhound went directly to a house occupied by a detective in the employ of the Miners' Association and was promptly called off.

McKinney was under cross-examination during the trial of the union miners who were accused of the attempted train wrecking that he and other detectives did, that for a money consideration he would pull spikes and wreck a train.

The Photographs.
Photographs of marked miners referred to by General Bell who he claims were marked for death, must absolutely be an invention of his own brain. The photographs in question are those of strike breakers and were kept for the purpose of publishing a scal list with the pictures of the men accompanying their description, so that members of organized labor all over the country would become thoroughly acquainted with these men who have committed treason.

These pictures are nothing more than those having charge of the strike in the district have publicly used for many months.

Charges that miners are not allowed to vote on questions of strike are utterly absurd. As a matter of fact, according to the constitution of the Western Federation of Miners, it is absolutely impossible for the executive board to call a strike of its own volition.

The present strike is the result of a direct vote of the members of the various unions in the district which left the matter entirely in the hands of a specially delegated authority for adjudication and settlement.

The twelfth annual convention recently held in Denver, appointed a special investigating committee, consisting of Malcolm Crillis of Butte, Mont.; H. B. Seaman of Roseland, B. C.; and R. E. Allen of Dillon, Wyo., which committee made a personal investigation by a visit to the Cripple Creek district only last week, and reported to the convention that the constitution of the Western Federation of Miners had been observed in the minutest detail during the entire prosecution of the contest.

Absolutely no deaths have occurred during the contest for which the Western Federation of Miners can or ought to be held responsible.
