# MALHEUR WILL

GOVERNMENT PUSHING THE PRELIMINARY WORK.

Monster Reservoir Will Be Six Miles Wide and Twenty Miles Long-Dam in the River at Be 200 Feet High and the Lake Will Be Eighty Feet Deep in Places-Fifty Miles of Canals to Carry Water to the Land.

The Baker City Democrat, speaking of the progress of government irrigation in Malheur county, says:
Alf Johnson came back from Malheur county yesterday and gives some very interesting facts in regard to the government work now in progress there in irrigation reservoirs

and ditches. Uncle Sam is spending \$150,000 this season in Maineur. The work is very comprehensive and is in charge of some 20 or 30 government engineers

and linemen. The main reservoir, now under construction, is about 46 miles southwest of Ontario at a place known as

Harper, on Malheur river. The reservoir will be six miles wide, 20 miles long, and will hold an average depth of 80 feet of water. The dam in the river will be 200 feet high. There will be two main canals to carry the water from the res ervoir to the lands to be irrigated, each 50 miles long. These canals will be tapped with laterals and smaller

The reservoir and ditch system wil reclaim 150,000 acres of virgin land and furnish water for all the lands now irrigated in that county by pri- hereafter. vate enterprises.

This scheme will revolutionize irrigation in Malheur and will increase the area of irrigated lands, increase the number of farm homes and generally subserve and add to the prosperity of the county as no other prop-

It is a notable fact that your government has demanded that the large ranches be split into 80-acre tracts in order to increase population and intensify cultivation of the land. There is no richer land in the United States than this and it is estimated that 40 acres will comfortably support a family of five persons. This land will produce three crops of alfalfa a year, raise all kinds of fruit and at the least poss ble labor.

The government is advancing the money for all of this work and acre for 10 years, when it is estimat ed that the first cost of the reservoir and ditch systems will have been repaid or practically so. After that the enginers estimate that it will cost only five or 10 cents an acre per year to keep up the works and utilize the waters from these storage reservoirs. The government engineers are running the lines for the main ditches and are boring several artesian wells to test the formation of the substrata in order to more efficiently irrigate these lands. The local option law provides that when a petition signed by 10 per cent of the voters in any community is lled with the county clerk, he shall order an election to be held in the listrict in which the petition origin ated and that a majority vote shall lecide whether the sale of liquors hall be permitted or denied.
