SENATOR HOAR'S VITALITY.

The New England constitution is not less tenacious than the New England conscience. This inherited ability is an uncertain factor in the general sequence of things, but inherited vitality can hardly be questioned. Senator Hoar's survival for days after he had given up the struggle for life is a case in point, which exhibits the physical tenacity that results from simple, regular, temperate and virtuous habits of life extending over many generations. "The simple life," that Pastor Wagner preaches has been an established fact in New England for more than two centuries. While only the fittest may have survived the rigors of the climate and the absence of what is commonly called "comforts," their descendants have inherited bodies in which all the vital organs are strong, healthy and harmonious. It is this inheritance which enabled Senator Hoar to resist death through the long weeks in which dissolution has been inevitable. The simple life accumulates tremendous powers of resistance to disease and decay—a truth that is too commonly disregarded in a strenuous age.

As an evidence that the proposed irrigation law published in the Daily East Oregonian of last Saturday, and in the Semi-Weekly of today, is to be thoroughly studied, it might be mentioned that already about 20 requests for copies of the papers containing the law, have been received at this office. This is certain evidence that the practical irrigators of the country are going to have something to say in the formation of the coming irrigation law for Oregon. The irrigation commission invited discussion. The East Oregonian invited its readers and patrons to make suggestions for improvements in the law, discuss its weak points and show up its deficiencies, for Oregon is surely going to pass some kind of an irrigation law this winter. If it is not perfect, if it does not meet the needs of the irrigated districts, and provide for a wise and just distribution of the waters of Oregon, the practical irrigators of the state will be to blame, for they are now invited to give suggestions for such a law. The Weekly and Semi-Weekly editions of this paper will contain the law in full this week, and the farmers and irrigators of Umatilla county are urged to read and study its provisions and make suggestions.

It cost the people of the United States, on an average \$24.71 per head for food in 1897. This year it costs \$52.58—an increase of over 51 per cent. In other words, it takes \$1.51 to buy as much food as a dollar would buy seven years ago. A man earning a dollar a day was better off then, as far as that part of his living expenses went, than one earning \$1.50 a day is now. And according to Commissioner Wright, of the department of Labor, food absorbs over 41 per cent of the total expenditures of the average family. The increase of \$17.87 per head in the cost of this item represents an increase of \$39.36 in the expenditure of the ordinary family of five. Adding \$18.98 for the enhanced cost of clothes, we find that a workman's wages have to stretch \$107.44 further now on two necessary items of expense than they did in 1897. Where have wages increased to any extent in the last seven years?

George W. Bell, for seven years American consul at Sydney, Australia, and a student of economics has just written a book on New Zealand, in which he has reviewed that unique and wonderful government in the form of a romance, in order to "wrest from the reader the memories of the daily struggle with hard facts," as he says. Frank P. Sargent, commissioner of immigration, is expected to visit Portland October 7.
Tillamook county will advance tax rates for several years in the attempt to get out of debt.
The 3-year-old son of R. W. Utt, of Palouse, was crushed to death under a log, Wednesday.
A regular four-year course has just been established in the agricultural college at Corvallis.
Arthur Conklin, editor of the Grant's Pass Mining Journal, has been found guilty of libel.
The central labor committee of Montana has endorsed the state and national democratic tickets.
Creed Harris dropped dead in Grand Ronde valley, Monday, while working with a threshing crew.
McLean's salmon cannery, at South Bend, Wash., will start up October 6, with Chinese workmen.
The O. R. & N. has made a rate of 50 cents per 100 on Kansas and Nebraska oats shipped to Oregon.
An anonymous postal card threatening his life has been received by Sheriff Word, of Multnomah county.
The latest news picture in theater is a reproduction of the burning of the Slocum in East river, New York.
The first house erected on the present townsite of Eugene was destroyed by fire Wednesday. It was built in 1846.
The Pacific Coast Coal Company, of Seattle, gave miners a 15 per cent raise in wages, Wednesday, as a surprise.
Large quantities of Grand Ronde fruit have been sent to the St. Louis fair this week, the best of the crop being now ripe.
A burglar secured \$1000 from the residence of Mrs. A. D. Shepherd, of Seattle, Wednesday, while she was visiting next door.
Mrs. John Johnson, of Portland, attempted suicide by swallowing carbolic acid, Sunday. This is her second attempt in two weeks.
A dairy barn collapsed from the excessive weight of hay in San Francisco, Wednesday, killing 45 fine dairy cows. Loss, \$18,000.
George Hostetter, a farmer residing near Oregon City, was crushed to death by a falling hopper from a cider mill on his farm, Tuesday.
Two masked highwaymen robbed the Thomas saloon at Wallace, Idaho, Tuesday, securing but \$10 and leaving behind a roll of bills containing \$2000.
A grand jury has been named for the October term of circuit court now in session at La Grande, Sunday closing and gambling cases will be considered.
Walter Abbott, a passenger, was killed by the overturning of the Ashcroft, E. C. stage coach, Sunday. F. Peters, the driver, was perhaps fatally injured.
A revival of the interest in the oil prospects in Malheur county is now being experienced. An Idaho man has just bonded 1200 acres for experiments near Ontario.
H. F. Erickson, of Clark county, Washington, was fatally wounded by his son, Tuesday, through the accidental discharge of a pistol, which they did not know was loaded.
The report of the commissioner of labor of Oregon, shows that the state last year produced 2,402,000 young fruit trees, 98 per cent of which were sent out of the state at nursery stock.
R. C. Watt, justice of the peace at Cuprum, Idaho, has become demented through political excitement. He has a candidate for probate judge before the republican county convention, and since has acted queerly.
Portland wholesalers have received notice that the Maine corn crop has been injured by frost and only half of the big orders will be filled this fall. Much of the choice sweet corn used in the market comes from Maine.
A colony of Trappists, an order of industrious religious enthusiasts and vegetarians expelled from France, will found a colony in Oregon near Albany, six priests of the order having recently purchased land there for that purpose.

GENERAL NEWS.

Bon Voyage, a 2-year-old trotter, from the \$1000 futurity purse at Lexington, Ky., Wednesday.
It now seems probable that Attorney General W. H. Moody will succeed Senator George F. Hoar.
Fourteen hundred rubber workers of Chicago have lost their strike and are returning to work on any terms.
The scarcity of water in Port Arthur is occasioned by the destruction of the condensing plants by Japanese shells.
President Loree, of the Rock Island Company, has resigned and Robert Mather has been elected to the position.
John C. Peters, a pugilist, was killed by a knockout blow delivered by Patrick Dormanly, at West Bergen, N. J., Sunday.
An American company has paid \$5,000,000 for the volcano Popocatepetl, in Mexico, and will work the sulphur deposits.
The widow of Sir William Harcourt has agreed to accept a baronetcy in honor of her dead husband, and a gift from parliament.
The London stock market now shows a more cheerful tone than at any time since the beginning of the Russo-Japanese war.
The genuine expressions of regret at Harcourt's death are more abundant than at any English death since that of Queen Victoria.
A Russian steamer used in clearing the harbor of Port Arthur of damaged and disconnected mines, struck a mine Sunday and was sunk.
Jesse W. Crosby, a Mormon, has resigned from the republican electoral ticket in Wyoming. It will switch the Mormon vote to the democratic electors.
Two sets of campaign buttons have been ordered by the democrats, one set with silk background for Nebraska and one set with gold background for other states.
President Smith, of the Mormon church, has advised his people to refrain from selling their homes, and severely condemns the roaming proclivities of the faithful.
It is said that John Redmond, member of parliament and Irish patriot, now working for the Irish cause in America, is one of the largest landholders in Ireland.
George W. Earl, of Howell, Mich., father of Della Earl, the girl arrested as a hobo in male attire in Portland last week, does not wish her to return home. He says she is getting much needed experience.
The effect of the machine guns in defending the forts inside Port Arthur, is said to have been awful. Hundreds of headless bodies of Japanese soldiers have been found hundreds of yards from the trenches.
