PROSTITUTION AND POVERTY.—A case was lately tried in the United States District Court for Oregon, before his Honor, Judge Deady. Nicholas Greigovich had obtained a divorce from his wife, and was by the California courts awarded the custody of his child, a little one aged five years. The mother subsequently stole the child and removed to Portland, and the father, following, found her with the child in a house of ill-fame. The scene of separation between the mother and child, as related by an eye-witness, was heart-rending. Evidently, so long as times are so badly out of joint under man-made rule, that women can earn more money by one hour of prostitution than by a week of honest work, or even year, of household drudgery under some lawful master, just so long will there be found "divinities" who cannot resist the golden temptation. When the weaker sex assert their power to make the laws that vitally concern their personal well-being, these houses of ill-fame, that flourish under the pay and patronage of men, will languish and die for want of support. Then we shall have no more of women who desert their husbands for the excitement of prostitution.

WILLAMETTE RIVER IMPROVEMENT.—Respecting the improvements of the upper Willamette river, the Oregonian has the following: A few days since Major Roberts, accompanied by the officers and directors of the People's Transportation Company, made a trip up the Willamette from Canby to Corvallis, for the purpose of examining the bars and to devise the best plans for improving them. The appropriation for the improvement of the upper river is \$10,000, and in the opinion of Major Roberts and the gentlemen of the P. T. Co., this sum will be amply sufficient to clear out all the bars as far as Corvallis. The plan is to dredge the bars with a peculiar sort of scoop to be handled by a steamboat. The success is to be put in the dry dock in a few days to be fitted for this service, and work will be actively commenced as soon as the plans can be approved at Washington. Steps have been taken to secure immediate attention to the report of Major Roberts, and to have the decision of the proper authorities telegraphed, in order that the work may not be delayed.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.—W. S. Ladd, Henry Felling, D. C. Lewis, Thomas L. Elliott and J. C. Alinsworth, as Trustees of the benevolent institution known as The Home, filed articles recently at the office of the County Clerk incorporating the same. The object and business of the Association shall be the exercising of benevolence and charity, and the relief of distressed and needy persons, and providing homes for the destitute. The sum in which the benevolence shall be administered shall be determined from time to time by the ladies who associate themselves as members of the Home. The value of the Home is estimated at \$2,000. Its sources of income are, interest on money loaned; rents on such property as it may possess; fees for membership, and voluntary contributions. The Trustees are to be five in number. The Home is to be located in this city.

RAILROAD MATERIAL.—The Bulletin of a late date says there is a large amount of railroad material on route to the Columbia river at this time by passing craft. Some of this is for the Northern Pacific Railroad Company, and will land at Kalama, but by far the greater portion of it is for the Oregon and California and Oregon Central railroads, of which Ben Holladay is President.

Three large ship loads, including three large locomotives, are now daily expected at San Francisco for him overland. Then there are five others, exclusively loaded for these Oregon railroads, on the route from Newport, England.

ELECTION.—The annual election of the Willamette Valley and Cascade Road Co., says the Albany Democrat, came off on Tuesday, the 11th inst. There was a full attendance, and the following gentlemen were elected directors to serve for the ensuing year: Luther Eklina, A. Hackleman, M. Luper, A. Cowan, Jason Wheeler, John Settle and Jas. H. Foster.

TIME OF CONFERENCE CHANGED.—The Advocates office has received from Bishop James the following notice, dated New York, July 14th: "The time of the Oregon Conference is changed from the 10th of August to the 9th of August, 1911. Please give notice to the preachers as soon as possible."

SOAP FACTORY.—Carrington & McCord, of Albany, have got their soap factory at work, and last week they made eight hundred boxes of soap, or about fourteen thousand pounds. Hereafter they expect to be able to turn out this amount of soap every week. So says the Albany Democrat.

IN DENAHEN.—Laboring men at present are very much in demand. The Northern Pacific and Oregon and California railroad companies advertise for laborers; also, the company engaged in the construction of the locks at Oregon City.

CONTRACT FOR RAILROAD TIES.—The Eugene City Guard says that Mr. Hall has let a contract for ten thousand rail road ties to a man named Zimmerman. They are not to be got out at various points along the line between Eugene City and Oakland.

MORE VISITORS STILL.—In addition to the distinguished visitors we mentioned last week, Justice Miller, of the U. S. Supreme Court, and Hon. Horace Maynard, member of Congress from Tennessee, are now in our State.

NEW COAL BANK.—A new coal bank has been discovered near Oysterville on Yaquina Bay. About three bushels were tested at a blacksmith shop last week, with complete success. It burns freely, with little residuum.

DROWNED.—Mr. and Mrs. Ed. Chamberlain's child, whose mysterious disappearance we noticed last week, was drowned. The parents have the sympathy of the community in their terrible bereavement.

RAPIDLY FALLING.—The Willamette and Columbia rivers are rapidly nearing low water mark. It is thought that the boats will have difficulty in reaching Lewiston, I. T., much longer.

McMINVILLE COLLEGE.—An effort is to be made to secure \$50,000 to endow the Baptist College at McMinnville. R. C. Kinney proposes to give \$2,500, and W. T. Newby \$1,000.
