THE "OREGONIAN" ON COUNTY EXPENSES.

Our contemporary of the *Oregonian* has a huge-sized elephant on his hands in the shape of clearing up the muddle of the Multnomah Ring, and we deeply sympathize with him. Of course he is bound, by the rule of party politics, if he would retain a position of prominence or ill public position of ease and emolument, to defend his political friends, right or wrong. But we are sorry he does not meet the issue squarely and fairly. Usually, however, he has enjoyed the reputation of being quite an adept at figure; but then we must take into consideration that it is something of a task for even so experienced a politician as the editor of the *Oregonian* to present a plausible defense of the Multnomah Ring. Here is the way he starts with his figuring:

"The expenditures of the county for the fiscal year ending July 6, 1871, were \$54,475.25, against \$45,862.24 for the previous year. Here is an increased expenditure of \$8,613."

Notice the unfairness of the manner in which this statement is put forth. Nothing whatever is said of the payment of a judgment against the county for \$4,820.70 in 1870, the particulars of which we gave in our last issue, and which swells the increase in our county expenses proper to \$12,735.61. Further on we come to this:

"The last item, rewards for capture of criminals, is exceptional, and was incurred in ridding the community of the worst gang that plagued and terrorized it."

Accepting this statement as correct, for the sake of the argument, Mr. Overton, permit us to inquire why you did not state that the amount of the judgment against the county, paid in 1870, was also "exceptional"? Be candid, brother.

Allowing that the expenditure of \$119.61 for capture of criminals was correct and proper—and we wouldn't for the world touch that it was—the increase in county expenses would still be \$12,616.61.

There follows a labored but unsuccessful attempt to justify these expenditures.

As the statistics given in the table have been taken from our columns and published in a garbled manner—sharing the fate of the Grand Jury Report—we present again the items, showing where in there has been increased expense and the amount:

It will thus be seen that outside of these items the county expense for 1870 was greater than for the year following. Our county officials have not managed their embassies discreetly. That there should be a decrease in the other expenditures and such an extraordinary increase in these is remarkable, and is susceptible of but one reasonable explanation.

We are curious to know why the *Oregonian* skipped some of the items—like, for instance, the militia, fuel and stationery. Rather hard things to "explain," aren't they, neighbor?

We close this article by asking the *Oregonian*, as it has assumed the role of apologist for the Ring, what it has not seen fit to answer heretofore: Why did not our County Clerk publish the usual financial exhibit this year? It will be no answer to say that the books of the county are open for inspection, as it is out of the question for the great majority of the tax-payers of Multnomah to examine them.

We wait for an answer.

## SMOKED OUT.

## THE "OREGONIAN" TURNS TO EX-PLAIN."

The *Oregonian* of Wednesday contains a long and studied article upon the county administration, which is the first ever apparently honest handling of the matter by the daily press which has yet come to our notice, we present, in the main, to our readers this week; and we ask any and all honest, candid, sensible men, who read these columns, if they do not see the necessity of a reform in our political management—a reform which shall be inaugurated irrespective of party or sex? Says the *Oregonian*:

"The court and jury rooms and the various offices are all to be swept and put in order daily, work to be performed in and done to be kept up. For this service we will pay our fore-juror \$125 a month."

Now, we speak of what we do know and testify of that which we have seen when we declare that the court and jury rooms are the farthest possible remove from all political ideas of good "order."

"And, but for this item from the *Oregonian*, we should never dream that 'sweeping and putting in order daily' was any part of the official programme. We know many women in Portland who would be glad to be allowed to do this work, and do it well, for half the money."

To show that the expense does not result from the extreme virtue of Democratic influence, and also to prove that Democrats think these expenditures are all right, when their hands are in the office crib, the *Oregonian* says truthfully:

"As to the \$600 allowed the Clerk for keeping the county books, the *Oregonian* have this explanation of paying it, since he is saying it to come out like this, that it is not part of the official programme of the Clerk by law. We may add that to the last Clerk (who was a Democrat) the sum of \$200 a year was allowed for this service." It strikes me that if there was a Tammany Ring here now, there was a very strong flavor of Tammany.

Then the foreman of the late Grand Jury, who was then editor of the *Herald*, had no indignation at that time to expand on the subject. Expenditures like

these were not "prodigal and unwaranted" when they were made (and at higher rates than now) by his own party.

Last year and the year before when the county was in Democratic hands these expenses were paid out of the treasury with great publicity and without a protest or opposition from the government who in his recent "report" characterized them as "prodigal and unwarranted," though he was then editor of the journal which now thinks that the county authorities which allow them are a "Tammany Ring."

Tax-payers of Multnomah county, don't you see that it is not merely Republicans alone or Democrats alone who waste your money? Cannot you see that both are guilty of gross extravagance? And do you not clearly see that men alone are making bad work of our national house-keeping? Women have exposed these matters, one our Tammany Ring would have yet gone on, increasing these extravagances, until there is no telling where they would have ended. We add, that Mr. Pennoyer assures us, that the Grand Jury, in their opinion, the report was not his, but was that of his (Pennoyer) friend, who was their reporter to whom he, Pennoyer, addressed his report to the Jury, and no one dissented. There can be, then, no doubt that it was and is a genuine document. As Mr. Pennoyer says, the report is not a partisan document, the majority of the Jury being Radicals, while Mr. Pennoyer is a Democrat. These facts, which have been the subject of some debate in social circles and in the newspapers, are now all settled and set right.
