OREGON STATE TEMPERANCE CONVENTION.—The following circular has been forwarded to us, with the request that we publish, which we sincerely do:

Our last State Temperance Convention adjourned to meet in Salem, February 23d, 1872, ten o'clock A. M. The undersigned were appointed a committee to make full arrangements for the meeting. They recommend that all Temperance and Literary societies, all Unions and Schools, elect at least one delegate for every twenty members; that communities hold mass meetings and elect representatives. These should be men and women of sound judgment and of known temperance habits and principles. All authenticated friends of the Temperance cause are invited to send in the Convention. They are also asked to send in themes for discussion and suggestions about the programme, as it is considered by all best to have an outline of business, and persons appointed to lead the discussions. Those feeling a deep interest in any Temperance topic should, without fear of being considered egotistic, inform the Committee of their desire to present the matter to the Convention.

We would be greatly obliged for the names of capable speakers and essayists. Those acquainted with such should forward their names and the themes they can most profitably present.

Friends of the good, the holy cause of Temperance, to all in your power to make the coming Convention a telling one; large, intelligent, enthusiastic and efficient.

Papers proposed to be presented to the Convention should be short, not occupying more than twenty minutes in reading—comprehensive and pregnant with facts and arguments.

Degates should come in time for the morning session and intending to remain over the following day if the convention should demand it. A very interesting programme is being prepared for a two days session.
