

**HOME NEWS.**  
Pacific University has 130 students.  
A reform school is to be established in this city.  
Albany has a city election one week from next Monday.  
John Burnett has been appointed City Attorney for Corvallis.  
The mills at McMinville are shipping large quantities of flour by rail to this place.  
About fifty buildings have been erected in Baker City during the past season.  
At Baker City on the 13th inst., the snow was six inches deep, and on the mountains a foot more.  
It is reported that McFadden, lately sentenced to the Penitentiary from Linn county, is likely to die.  
Coss Bay coal mines sent 26,168 tons of coal to San Francisco during the first ten months of this year.  
The fire company of Corvallis is to be presented with a beautiful banner, made by the ladies of that town.  
John R. Beas has been appointed Commissioner of Deeds for this State, to reside at St. Louis, Missouri.  
A little girl was poisoned the other day at La Grande by eating wheat that contained sulphate of copper.  
The Republicans of Salem will hold a convention at Salem to-morrow for the purpose of nominating a city ticket.  
The Corvallis Gazette is making arrangements for the publication of the "Benton County Almanac for 1873."  
The Register says the roads are getting very heavy around Albany, but that wheat still continues to come in.  
The Grand Jury of Jackson county recommend the people to build a new jail, court house and Sheriff and Clerk's office.  
The line of hacks heretofore running between Jacksonville and Linkville has been discontinued, owing to bad roads.  
Wells, Fargo & Co. have closed their office in Lafayette and opened an office in St. Joe, appointing Judge Watts their agent.  
Circuit Court for Polk county, Judge Bonham presiding, is in session this week. A pretty full docket is to be disposed of.  
The resignation of General Palmer, Indian Agent at Siletz, has been received by Superintendent Oeneal and forwarded to Washington.  
The mail stage from the south by way of McMinville connects at St. Joe with the train each day, the mails being delivered at Lafayette by a special carrier.  
The Salem paper says: "The excellence of our public schools is attracting attention in many quarters, and contributes largely to the growth of our city."  
Two hundred and fifty men are wanted to sustain the \$100 each to the stock of the State University, and the committee are going to work immediately to find them.

Work on the Albany and Santiam Ditch is still progressing with vigor, and will be pushed forward until it is completed unless the heavy rains should cause the Santiam to overflow its banks. There is now 800 feet of ditch finished, and 1,250 feet dug to the depth of eight feet. The cutting averages twelve feet in depth, twenty feet wide at the bottom and sloped one by one.

The subscribers will be placed on their credit, and if enough names are not received during the year to procure the premium desired, they can choose a lesser premium, or they will be entitled to receive twenty-five per cent. in cash of the amount remitted for their labor.
