

HOME NEWS.

The Circus was largely attended. The fire limits have been laid out. Trinity Church was consecrated last Sunday.

The Albany Register has just closed its fifth volume. There are twenty-six Farmer's Granges in Oregon.

Nowhere up the valley have the crops been damaged by the recent rains. The overland mail now reaches Astoria in ten days from New York city.

There are about 35,000 bushels of wheat in the various storehouses at Corvallis. A ledge of pure chalk has been found in the vicinity of Latta creek, Clatsop Plains.

The Linn county Fair commences on the 23d of September, and continues four days. The Jackson county Fair will commence on the 24th inst., and continue four days.

The Monticello steamer will leave this city hereafter at 7 A. M., instead of 8, as heretofore. The last shipment for the season of Oregon salmon was taken to Astoria on Friday last.

The new school books adopted by the Board of Education are now coming into market. The assessed valuation of Clatsop County as equalized by the Board last week is \$345,069.

The South Portland saw-mill was burned Saturday night. The fire was the work of an incendiary. A reward of \$1,000 is offered for the apprehension of the person or persons who caused the fire of August 21.

The State Fair will commence on the 9th of October. Large premiums are offered for all branches of industry. The Gussie Telfair brought down a piece of copper belonging to the ill-fated steamer George S. Wright. It was found in Queen Charlotte Sound.

J. M. Fryer has re-opened at his new store on First street, between Madison and Jefferson, and will keep a large assortment of general merchandise.

The public schools of this city will open one week from next Monday. On account of the small-pox being in the city, no children will be admitted until having been vaccinated.

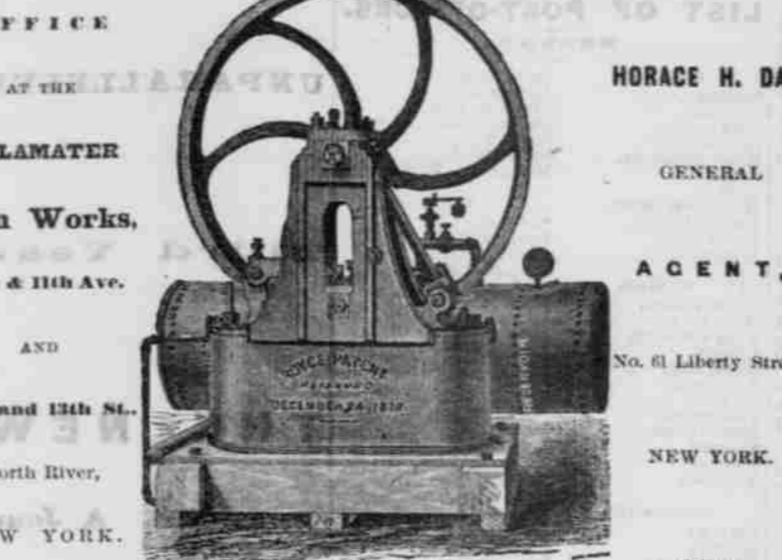
